Sunday Readings for March 14, 2021

Reading 1 2 Char 36:14-16,19-23

In those days, all the princes of Judah, the priests, and the people added infidelity to infidelity, practicing all the abominations of the nations and polluting the LORD's temple which he had consecrated in Jerusalem.

Early and often did the LORD, the God of their fathers, send his messengers to them, for he had compassion on his people and his dwelling place. But they mocked the messengers of God, despised his warnings, and scoffed at his prophets, until the anger of the LORD against his people was so inflamed that there was no remedy. Their enemies burnt the house of God, tore down the walls of Jerusalem, set all its palaces afire, and destroyed all its precious objects. Those who escaped the sword were carried captive to Babylon, where they became servants of the king of the Chaldeans and his sons until the kingdom of the Persians came to power. All this was to fulfill the word of the LORD spoken by Jeremiah: "Until the land has retrieved its lost Sabbaths, during all the time it lies waste it shall have rest while seventy years are fulfilled."

In the first year of Cyrus, king of Persia, in order to fulfill the word of the LORD spoken by Jeremiah, the LORD inspired King Cyrus of Persia to issue this proclamation throughout his kingdom, both by word of mouth and in writing: "Thus says Cyrus, king of Persia: All the kingdoms of the earth the LORD, the God of heaven, has given to me, and he has also charged me to build him a house in Jerusalem, which is in Judah. Whoever, therefore, among you belongs to any part of his people, let him go up, and may his God be with him!"

For everyone who does wicked things hates the light and does not come toward the light, so that his works might not be exposed. But whoever lives the truth comes to the light, so that his works may be clearly seen as done in God.

Reflection Questions for the Readings for March 14, 2021

Today's psalm asks, "How could we sing a song to the Lord / in a foreign land?" When in your life (either physically or spiritually) have you experienced being far from home and what sustained you in that time?

St. Paul writes to the Ephesians that we are God's "handiwork." Where do you see the handiwork of God flourishing in your family and community?

In today's gospel, Jesus tells Nicodemus, "The light came into the world,/ but people preferred darkness to light." Where do you perceive light encountering darkness in your community at this moment?



As God never forgets us, we must never forget God. Now is the time to take stock of our infidelity and return to the light, even though it is difficult to look at.

Reflection

Good News with great rejoicing. More people are returning to Mass. This past week at the 10:30am mass we filled the church, the parish hall and only had a few chairs open in the multi-purpose room. Hopefully with Vaccinations taking place, warmer weather, cases going down we will continue to see the numbers grow. With that in mind we have decided to make some changes to the mass schedule beginning Holy Week with Palm/Passion Sunday. On March 28 we will change our Sunday morning mass schedule to 7:30am, 9:30am and 11:30am. The rest of the masses will remain as they are: Saturday at 4:00pm and Sunday at 1:30pm and 5:30pm.

With the improving numbers of COVID cases, the growing number of vaccinations and the warmer weather it is going to become more difficult to abide by the current restrictions. But we are hearing from the medical professionals that we need to keep up the mask wearing, social distancing and washing our hands. We continue to ask that everyone that comes to mass please wear a face mask covering their nose and mouth. The lector, deacon and priest will remove their mask from time to time so that they can be clearly heard and understood. This is not a sign that we do not have to wear a mask or that we think it is unimportant but rather we are trying to serve the community by being heard. Let us continue to work together for the good of the whole community and the health and safety of all.

Church Roof Replacement

On Monday, March 15 the scaffolding company that is working with the roofers are to be on sight to begin the construction of scaffolding around the church. The roofers are hoping to be able to complete the roof in a 5 month period. There will be some disruption during this time, please be a patient as possible and hopefully you will not have to put up with this for another 50years or more.

They have begun construction on the storage area in the multi-purpose room. They are hoping to have this project completed in 6 weeks.

MARCH IS COLON CANCER AWARENESS

Here are 6 ways to help protect your colorectal health

Get screened for colorectal cancer. Screenings are tests that look for cancer before signs and symptoms develop. These tests can find colon or rectal cancer earlier, when treatments are more likely to be successful. The American Cancer Society recommends testing starting at age 45 for people at average risk. Some colorectal screening tests can also find and remove precancerous growths (polyps) in the colon or rectum. Polyps are not cancer, but over time cancer can start in the polyps. Removing them lowers the risk of cancer. Talk to your health care provider about when you should start screening and which tests might be right for you.

Eat lots of vegetables, fruits, and whole grains. Diets that include lots of vegetables, fruits, and whole grains have been linked with a decreased risk of colon or rectal cancer. Also, eat less red meat (beef, pork, or lamb) and processed meats (hot dogs and some luncheon meats), which have been linked with an increased risk of colorectal cancer.

Get regular exercise. If you are not physically active, you may have a greater chance of developing colorectal cancer. Being more active may help reduce your risk. Learn more about how to meet diet and exercise goals at cancer.org/foodandfitness.

Take control of your weight. Being overweight or obese increases your risk of getting and dying from colon or rectal cancer. Eating healthier and increasing your physical activity can help you control your weight.

Don't smoke. Long-term smokers are more likely than non-smokers to develop and die from colon or rectal cancer. If you smoke and you want to quit, or know someone else who does, see the American Cancer Society [guide to quitting tobacco](#), or call us at 1-800-227-2345. Getting help increases your chances of quitting successfully.

Avoid alcohol. [Alcohol use has been linked with a higher risk of colorectal cancer.](#) It is best to not drink alcohol. But if you do, the American Cancer Society recommends no more than 2 drinks a day for men and 1 drink a day for women. A single drink equals 12 ounces of beer, 5 ounces of wine or 1½ ounces of 80-proof distilled spirits (hard liquor).

Research shows that habits related to diet, weight, and exercise are strongly linked to colorectal cancer risk. Changing some of these lifestyle habits may be hard. But making the changes can also lower the risk for many other types of cancer, as well as other serious diseases like heart disease and diabetes.


