

Seventeenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Reflection

“Where can we buy enough food for them to eat?” Jesus asks this question of the disciples when a large crowd (5,000 men) is gathered. The disciples immediately seek to dissuade him because the task is futile, or at least they think it is futile. Jesus then takes what they have, five barley loaves and two fish, he give thanks to God and distributes them. Everyone there has “their fill” and the disciples gather twelve baskets of fragments that was more than the crowd could eat.

Each Sunday at Mass we bring forth gifts of bread and wine. A simple action that we stopped during the pandemic and one that often goes unnoticed. Msgr. Joseph Degrocco in his book, *Take and Eat, Living Eucharistically*, stresses the importance of this simple action. “Those gifts of bread and wine are meant to symbolize us – they represent the gift of ourselves. The central action of Mass is that everyone present unites the offering of their life to the offering of Christ, as everything is lifted up to the Father in union with his Son Jesus: through Him, and with Him and in Him. It is the sacrifice of our lives that is placed on the altar with the gifts of bread and wine.”

After the priest has prepared the gifts with prayer for the Eucharist, they then turn to the community and say, “Pray, brothers and sisters, that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God the almighty Father.” We must bring all the relationships, events, hopes and fears that make up our ordinary, everyday life and we must hand them over to God. Then we can be truly transformed to become more like Him. Our love will become God’s love; our compassion will become God’s compassion; our mercy will be God’s mercy.

Discipleship

When we prepare for Mass are we prepared to offer ourselves to the Lord? When the bread and wine are brought forward do they represent our own self-giving? Do we call to mind all the blessings that we have received along with all of the disappointments and struggles that we have gone through and offer it all to God?

I saw God

This weekend we celebrate, World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly. I was blessed to have two wonderful sets of grandparents. I was probably closest to my grandmother McBride as I was growing up because she was our neighbor. She always had Double Mint Chewing Gum in her purse or pocket and vanilla wafers in the kitchen. I remember one night when the family was going somewhere I did not want to go to and I mysteriously became sick to my stomach. I was dropped off at Grandmother McBride’s and was soon cured with Coke Cola and candy and my Grandmother’s undivided attention.

As I grew older I was able to spend more time and appreciate Grandmother Wurth. Her faith and joy of life had a big influence on my life.

World Day for Grandparents and Elderly

The gospel account of the multiplication of the loaves and the fish help us to understand how, in everyday family, whatever we possess can be a great resource for all of us. A boy brings to Jesus “Five barley loaves and two fish.” But what counts is not having a little or a lot, but presenting it to the Lord who multiplies our bread and ensures that it satisfies the desire of every living person.

If we think of our grandparents, what they often bring to our families is precisely the gift of gratuitousness. Their way of loving and pampering their grandchildren, to the point of spoiling them, may seem exaggerated to us, but exaggeration is the only measure of love. St. Ephrem the Syrian comments on this passage from John’s Gospel in words that seem to describe the attitude of a grandfather towards his grandchild. He writes, “Not only has he showered us with his gifts gratuitously, but he has also pampered us with affection. [...] He has drawn us with this food that is pleasing to the palate to draw us towards that which enlivens our souls...”

## GOSPEL MEDITATION

### Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

St. Oscar Romero said, "We cannot do everything, and there is a sense of liberation in realizing that. This enables us to do something and to do it very well. It may be incomplete, but it is the beginning, a step along the way, an opportunity for the Lord's grace to enter and do the rest."

There were a group of ladies many years ago who made quilts. They were beautiful creations reflecting inspirational designs artfully composed from the simple scraps of fabric each woman would bring to their individual pieces. There was no plan for the finished project as each finished work became the combined creation of what each woman contributed. They abounded in vibrant colors and dazzled the beholder with intricate patterns and their myriad textures. They were so beautiful that they became coveted family treasures passed from generation to generation. Those women never realized the power of their work. Countless babies rested in the comfort of those quilts warmly nestled in the legacy of tradition they were fortunate to inherit. They adorned countless homes with their beauty and brought joy and solace to many faces.

We cannot do everything. We are not meant to. Our work in life is to contribute our individual piece, a piece that reflects the unique thumbprint I claim as my own. We only have to do small things well. Then, as St. Oscar Romero reminds us, the Lord's grace will enter and do the rest. We have to trust that this is true just as those women trusted in the eventual beauty of their final work.

Eucharistic blessings are blessings that start small and multiply. We all come to life with only a few loaves of bread and a few fish. Not any single one of us has all that it takes to transform our world. Who knows what God will do with the little we have and how many will benefit from our kindness, compassion, wisdom, courage, conviction, love, warmth, zeal, faith, and hope? That young lad never dreamed that his few leftovers would do all that they did. God shows up in unexpected ways! Where would life's adventure and fun be if it were any other way? Being able to be part of bringing God's creative, transforming, healing to the world opens us up to wonder, awe, and excitement! We can all bring our little piece to the bigger work of God that can result in being a coveted jewel passed generation to generation. This is good news indeed!

Bread and wine transform into Christ's Body and Blood and we become what we eat. Trust that.

**PREP TIME** 10 minutes

**COOK TIME** 30 minutes

### Ingredients

1/2 cup unsalted butter

1 cup flour

1 cup sugar

2 teaspoons baking powder

1/2 teaspoon salt

2/3 cup milk

1 1/2 cup peaches,  
(defrost and drained if using  
frozen or drained canned)



### Instructions

Preheat oven to 350.

Melt butter and pour into 8x8 pan

Mix flour, sugar, salt and baking powder together. Add in milk and stir until batter is moistened.

Drop batter by spoonfulls on top of the butter and gently spread. Top with sliced peaches.

Bake at 350 for 30-35 minutes until golden brown. Serve warm.





## EVERYDAY STEWARDSHIP - RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

**It's All in the Basket-**St. Therese of Lisieux made a point of going the extra mile in kindness towards those people who really got under her skin. It was part of her own brand of Everyday Stewardship — thanking God for all His creation, even the parts with which, in her own humanness, she struggled to cope.

I think about this a lot when I challenge myself to give thanks for things that bother me and people who challenge me. When I do this, I envision Christ giving thanks over those insufficient loaves. How many of us would see that paltry little basket and kick a rock in frustration because we can't feed all our people? "You didn't give me enough, Lord! You didn't give me enough patience, enough money, enough creativity, enough stamina to be a good steward. If you had given me more, I could also give more!"

In those moments of despair, we need to take a good look at the life God has given us. We need to look at the trials and the challenges and the shortcomings. The hopes that didn't pan out, the disappointments that keep cropping up.
