My Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ, On October 10, Pope Francis inaugurated a two-year synodal process which will culminate in a universal Synod scheduled to take place in Rome in October 2023. The following Sunday, October 17, the synodal process was inaugurated in every diocese of the world by every bishop with a celebration at their cathedral church. “Synod” comes from two Greek words that mean “journeying together.” Admittedly, the words “synod”, “synodal”, and “synodality” are not terribly familiar to us. Yet, they find their foundations in the ancient Church itself. Synods have been held throughout the history of the Church and have traditionally consisted of a coming together of a group of bishops from various regions of the world, representing the people of God of their dioceses, in order to address some particular issue facing the Church. This current experience of synod is unique in that Pope Francis is intending this process of “journeying together” be expanded to include all the baptized members of the Church. The level of listening to which our Holy Father is calling us is unprecedented. Millions of voices will be heard! Pope Francis explains that this synodal path is not about gathering opinions but listening to the Holy Spirit. It is not about administering a survey designed to change the Church’s doctrines or disciplines according to popular opinions, but to call the Church to ongoing conversion and deeper communion with each other and with God. At its core, this synodal process is about listening to one another so that we might better listen to the Holy Spirit. It is with this in mind that we begin the synodal process in the Diocese of Owensboro. During the months of January and February, 2022, each parish is encouraged to host listening sessions to which you will be invited. You will be asked to reflect on questions about your personal experience of the church and how the Church lives its mission to proclaim Christ. You will reflect upon the things you treasure most about our Church as well as the things that distress or pain you. A key component of the listening will include ways to bring to the table the voices of those who are easily ignored or marginalized. The Holy Spirit lives and works through all the Baptized, so we cannot afford to exclude anyone from the process. In March, I will be traveling the Diocese hosting regional listening sessions. Please make plans to attend. I want to hear the fruits of your parish listening so that I can communicate that to the United States Conference of Bishops for the next phase of listening to happen on a continental level. While it will be possible to electronically submit your individual reflections and contributions, I strongly encourage you to take part in your parish listening session in person and then to join me in March at a regional listening session. I am certain that participation in this synodal path to which the Holy Father has called us will bear much fruit in the life of our diocese. Please make plans now to participate, and join me in keeping our diocesan journey in your prayers by praying the Prayer for the Synod on Synodality: We stand before You, Holy Spirit, as we gather together in Your name. With You alone to guide us, make Yourself at home in our hearts; Teach us the way we must go and how we are to pursue it. We are weak and sinful; do not let us promote disorder. Do not let ignorance lead us down the wrong path nor partiality influence our actions. Let us find in You our unity so that we may journey together to eternal life and not stray from the way of truth and what is right. All this we ask of You, who are at work in every place and time, in the communion of the Father and the Son, forever and ever. Amen. Praying for God’s richest blessings for each of you.

Reflection

This weekend we celebrate the Solemnity of Mary, Holy Mother of God on January 1. The Solemnity of Mary is normally a Holy Day of Obligation but because it lands on Saturday, the obligation is dropped for this year.

Sunday, January 2 is the Feast of the Epiphany. On this day we celebrate the arrival of the Magi to offer gifts to the child Jesus. Their arrival and the gifts they bring has greatly affected the way we tell the story. Nowhere in the story do we hear how many Magi came to visit the child Jesus but because we hear of three gifts the story is told with three Magi. The gifts are unusual gifts for a child and so it is assumed that they are symbolic of the person of Jesus. Gold, Frankincense and Myrrh, gold of the kings, Frankincense for the gods and Myrrh for the burial. Jesus, the King of all Creation, the Son of the One True God, who would die on a cross in order to bring salvation to all. Gifts continue to have a big role in this season of celebrating the birth of Jesus. We spend time thinking about the right gift or asking for suggestions and then going on-line or on the road to find the right gift. It is wrapped and marked and placed under the Christmas Tree which is decorated with lights and ornaments. Some people will spend a great deal of time trying to come up with just the right gift. As the Magi brought gifts to the child Jesus, what do we bring to offer our Lord this Christmas.

The most important gift that we can offer – even greater than gold, frankincense and myrrh - is the gift of our love. We give not only our love but our willingness to suffer for our commitment of this love.

Mary's complete and faith-filled acceptance of God's plan for her brought a great deal of suffering as well as joy. John the Baptist, Peter, James, John, and the names go on and on all committed their love to Jesus and they would each die at the hands of those who did not believe.

We often say that we love the Lord but do we accept the suffering that comes from that love. Are we willing to be a voice for those who are over-looked, those who are discriminated against because of the color of their skin, their ethnic background or their legal status in our country? Are we willing to challenge the division that is tearing our country apart and seek peaceful resolutions to the issues that divide us?

Synod on Synodality

During this New Year the Church across the world is embarking on a process of Synodality. Pope Francis has called the world to enter into a time of Synod in which we look at the Church, from the pew to the Chair of Peter. We begin this process by taking time in our parish and community to ask basic questions about the church, its image in the world and its effectiveness in the mission of Jesus Christ. Our first meeting in the parish will be on January 12. We will have more information in the bulletin next weekend but I invite you now to mark your calendar for the January 12 event. We will begin with Mass at 5:30 then go through the prayer and reflection process developed by the diocese. After this meeting everyone will be invited to go out into the community and to discuss the questions with at least one other person. The idea is that you would reach out to people who may be away from the Catholic Church, or attend another faith, or have no real faith background. Pope Francis believes and teaches that we must hear from the people on the periphery of our society and this will be our attempt to reach out beyond the doors of the Church.

Following these two meetings we will send a report from our parish and community to the diocese. Bishop Medley will then hold several Town Hall Meetings across the Diocese. They will be an opportunity for the Bishop to hear from as many people as possible and address some of the issues that have been raised in the parish and community sessions. We will host one of these meetings with the Bishop here at Holy Name on March 8, 2022.

Please pray that this process will help the Church Universal to listen to and respond to issues of the Church around the world. Hopefully this process will awaken us all to issues of other parts of the world. Pray that this process will help all members of the Church and the larger community to be heard not just by the leadership but by all the church. The issues raised around the world will be very different but can help us all learn more about our brothers and sisters and how we can work together to bring the Holy Name of Jesus to all people.



And, when darkness, boredom, and gloom seem to be the order of the day, a bright new light now shines pointing us to truth and reminding us that we are loved.



SAINT OF THE WEEK

The patron saint of Catholic schools, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton (August 28, 1774 – January 4, 1821) was born in New York City to a prominent family of the Episcopal faith. When she turned 19, she married a wealthy businessman with whom she had five children. He later died of tuberculosis in 1803, leaving her a young widow. After discovering the Catholic faith in Italy, where her husband had died, she returned to New York and converted to Catholicism in 1805.

After several years struggling as a single mother, Elizabeth moved in 1809 to Emmitsburg, Maryland, where she founded the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph, the first community for religious women established in the United States. She also began St. Joseph's Academy and Free School, which started a chain reaction of Catholic-based education in the United States that continues today.

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton was canonized September 14, 1975 in St. Peter's Square by Pope Paul VI and was the first citizen born in the United States to be given the title of "saint."



GOSPEL MEDITATION

Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

In his Apostolic Exhortation, *The Joy of the Gospel*, Pope Francis references a thought from Pope Benedict XVI: "Being a Christian is not the result of an ethical choice or a lofty idea, but the encounter with an event, a person, which gives life a new horizon and a decisive direction." Today we celebrate an encounter with the Person of Jesus Christ! This simple but holy event in time dramatically changes human life, pointing it toward a new horizon and giving it a decisive direction. This is a message and truth that is not meant to be shared with only a select few who qualify but with the entire world. Pope Francis continues saying, "Thanks solely to this encounter or renewed encounter with God's love, which blossoms into an enriching friendship, we are liberated from our narrowness and self-absorption. We become fully human when we become more than human, when we let God bring us beyond ourselves in order to attain the fullest truth of our being."

Look around at people. Where is life heading for them? What gives them direction? Even we who are people of faith can get distracted and lose our focus. God, in all of His fullness, is revealed in Jesus Christ and we can encounter Him! God is tangible, real, vulnerable, poor, and full of wonders, surprises, and opportunities. For those who are struggling and lost, today is a day of great joy. All they have to do is reach out and touch the truth of Christ. This presence is revealed in the poor, exploited, and vulnerable ones who cry out for compassion and love. But it is also found in the faithful ones who see in the Epiphany of God a liberation from structures and systems that hurt us, a narrowness of mind and heart that constricts us, and an absorption in our self-agenda that prevents us from seeing anything other than ourselves as important.

We have been given the charge of preaching this Good News. If only we could find a way to be more effective, it might stand a chance of doing what God intended it to do. There is always tomorrow and our memory of that bright new light that shone so brilliantly that Bethlehem night pointing us to truth and reminding us that we are loved.





St. Elizabeth Ann Seton | January 4

The patron saint of Catholic schools, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton (August 28, 1774 – January 4, 1821) was born in New York City to a prominent family of the Episcopal faith. When she turned 19, she married a wealthy businessman with whom she had five children. He later died of tuberculosis in 1803, leaving her a young widow. After discovering the Catholic faith in Italy, where her husband had died, she returned to New York and converted to Catholicism in 1805.

After several years struggling as a single mother, Elizabeth moved in 1809 to Emmitsburg, Maryland, where she founded the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph, the first community for religious women established in the United States. She also began St. Joseph's Academy and Free School, which started a chain reaction of Catholic-based education in the United States that continues today.

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton was canonized September 14, 1975 in St. Peter's Square by Pope Paul VI and was the first citizen born in the United States to be given the title of "saint." ©LPi
