# A MESSAGE FROM YOUR REPRESENTATIVE— Speaker Robin Vos

The fall legislative session was a busy one for the Wisconsin State Assembly. We accomplished some big things and returned to some pre-pandemic traditions.



After not being able to honor them last year, this October floor session we recognized 99 first responders for the "First Responder of the Year" awards. For our Assembly District, the award went to Lieutenant Kelly Goetzke of the Racine County Sheriff's Office. Lieutenant Goetzke is a team leader for the SWAT and Crowd Control Teams that navigated through the historic civil unrest in Southeastern Wisconsin in 2020. He also played a critical role in the countywide collection and distribution of PPE throughout the COVID-19 pandemic. It's was an honor to recognize Lieutenant Goetzke for his outstanding service and leadership.

The Capitol Christmas Tree has also returned! The 32-foot balsam fir tree was donated to the state by the Menominee Nation, and the decoration theme is "hometown for the holidays." ## 2022 DOG LICENSES

Licenses are to be renewed every year. All dogs five (5) months of age or older must be



licensed according to Wisconsin State Statue § 174.05. Licenses must be obtained by **January 31st**. After that date a \$5.00 penalty will be charged. Pet owners may renew or purchase licenses by mail or drop box. Please provide proof of rabies immunization with payment and a self addressed stamped envelope enclosed along with the correct payment. Dog Licenses must be paid for separately from tax payments.

Fees are as follows:

Altered Dogs = \$10 Male or Female Unaltered Dogs = \$15 Male or Female Puppies = \$4 (license by 5 mo. of age)

Dog licenses help us reconnect you with your dog if your dog is lost and ensure that dogs in the community have been properly vaccinated. In the event you have lost your dog, please contact the Racine County Sheriff's Department non-emergency number at 534-5166.



#### LATEX PAINT DISPOSAL

Most times right after holding our hazardous waste event we get the call..........What can I do with these cans of **left over paint?!** Good news is you don't have to wait for an event to dispose of latex paint.

Latex is **NOT** a hazardous waste (it is a water-based product), but it is a liquid waste that must be properly, disposed. Dumped illegally, it can plug up septic fields, overload sewage treatment plants, and create environmental messes on the ground. Here are some options to consider:



#### 10 cans or less

- 1. Purchase a commercial paint hardener and follow the label directions. These products are available at hardware stores and improvement centers for \$1.00 to \$2.00 dollars.
- 2. Open can lids and expose paint to sun and warm temperatures. This technique works best in the summer with small amounts of left over paint.
- 3. Cans can be placed in the trash after paint has hardened.

# SAFETY MESSAGE FROM ROCHESTER FIRE AND RESCUE



As the weather gets coder, we have to adjust our driving practices. With the 40 plus years this writer has been in the Fire Service, I have responded to many traffic accidents that could have been minor or even prevented following some of the Winter Driving Rules.

Stay alert! Don't be distracted by your phone or radio. Follow the 3-4 second rule. That is to stay 3-4 seconds behind the car in front of you. When driving in slippery conditions increase your following distance to 6-8 seconds.

Do not use your crise control. The driver needs complete control. Road conditions can change in a split second. Slow down!



Check the weather conditions before you head out. Make sure your tires are in good condition and properly inflated. Keep the fuel tank at least half full in case you become stranded as road conditions worsen. Have an emergency kit in the car that contains blan-

kets, water and energy bars. This will sustain you while help is responding.

Most important is to wear your seat belt. The seat belt is designed to work along with all the other safety equipment in your vehicle.

Prepare for Influenza Season

CRCHD encourages you to prepare for the influenza (flu) season. People who have the flu often feel some or all of these signs and symptoms:

- Cough
- Sore throat
- Runny or stuffy nose
- Muscle or body aches
- Headaches
- Fatigue
- Fever or feeling feverish/chills
- Some people may have vomiting and diarrhea (more common in children than adults)

The flu is a contagious respiratory illness caused by influenza viruses that infect the nose, throat, and lungs. Flu viruses are primarily spread by droplets from coughing, sneezing, or talking. Less often, a person might also get the flu by touching a surface or object that has flu virus on it and then touching their own mouth, eyes, or nose. Individuals can help prevent the spread of flu by remembering to:

- Wash your hands: Handwashing remains one of the most important lines of defense against illness.
- **Cover your cough**: Use a tissue to cover your cough or sneeze to limit the spread of the virus. If a tissue is not available, cough or sneeze into your sleeve.
- **Stay home if ill**: It is recommended that individuals ill with fever should stay home from work or school and avoid other people until they are fever free for at least 24 hours.
- **Get vaccinated**: An influenza vaccine is the best way to reduce the chances that you will get the flu.

#### The Myth of the "Stomach Flu"

Viral infections, such as norovirus, cause vomiting and diarrhea and are commonly referred to as "stomach flu." Influenza viruses primarily causes respiratory, not gastrointestinal illness, and influenza vaccine will not protect against the "stomach flu." Reduce your risk of both illnesses by washing your hands regularly and staying home if you are ill.



# WESTERN RACINE COUNTY SEWER DISTRICT

### **Wastewater Treatment & Interceptor System Improvements**

ROCHESTER, Wisconsin – When residents in the Village of Rochester, Village of Waterford, and Waterford Sanitary District turn on a faucet or flush a toilet, they usually don't think about where their wastewater goes next. For those served by these municipal sewer systems, their wastewater ends up at the wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) owned and operated by the Western Racine County Sewerage District (WRCSD).



On November 11, WRCSD submitted its Wastewater Facilities Plan to the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR). This document presents the most cost-effective and environmentally sound alternative for WRCSD's WWTP and interceptor system for the next 20 years, considering criteria such as population growth, increased organic loading, and stricter phosphorus limits.

After evaluating several alternatives, WRCSD concluded that the Rochester Lift Station and a segment of the interceptor system should be replaced to keep up with peak flow events (i.e., heavy rainfall). The WWTP's organic capacity has already been exceeded, so WRCSD plans to increase its organic capacity by reusing tankage and installing diffused aeration to implement enhanced biological phosphorus removal (EBPR). A combination of EBPR, chemical phosphorus removal, and non-point source reductions via Adaptive Management are proposed to achieve compliance with the DNR's tightening phosphorus limits. In addition, aging infrastructure and equipment will be replaced to ensure continued operation and regulatory compliance.

The estimated total cost for the aforementioned improvements is \$14.3 million; user rates may be impacted depending on the availability of federal funds obtained by WRCSD. The project is slated for completion by December 2023. With these improvements, WRCSD will continue to meet its regulatory requirements and provide the high-quality services to which its customers have become accustomed for years to come!

# **Public Hearing**

WRCSD will hold a Public Hearing on Tuesday, December 21, 2021 at 7:00 p.m. at the District Office, located at 1020 N. River Road in Rochester. The purpose of the hearing is to obtain public input regarding the Wastewater Facilities Plan, copies of which are available at the District Office and the Rochester Public Library, located at 208 W. Spring Street, during normal business hours. Anyone interested is invited to attend this meeting.

If you wish to comment but cannot be present, please submit a written statement by 3:30 p.m. on Tuesday, December 21, 2021 to Jeff Bratz, Plant Manager, at the District Office. 


