Elections

Aug. 9 and Nov. 8 are the remaining elections for the year. If planning to vote by absentee, return the ballot by mail or hand YOUR ballot directly to the clerk. Deadline for returning absentee ballots is election day before 8 p.m. If returning absentee ballots by mail, allow 4 business days for local mail and 2 weeks for out-of-state mail.

During the spring election on April 5, 1,282 electors voted for town supervisors. A big goodbye to Jeff Millikin who served the Town of Erin as a supervisor since 2008. He was:

- town representative for the Druid Lake protection area
- part of the road commission, securing state Tri-D money for reconstructing part of Druid Lake and Taylor Roads
- on the parade committee
- on the veterans committee
- involved with recycling.

Thank you, Jeff, for all your hard work!

Maripat Blankenheim served four years and had many accomplishments:

- brought Charter into Erin for wired broadband
- took the lead to have the county locate the emergency services tower in the town's pit
- editor of the newsletter
- updated the town hall to meet COVID conditions
- led the research on a road referendum
- updated the zoning code to accommodate state laws that changed in the last 10 years. Thank you, Maripat, for all you have done in your short time.

Broadband update

When will Charter services be available to my specific address?

The project area is throughout the entire six-by-six-mile Erin community. *Design and installation will take time*. Charter is currently finishing up the design phase and will be approaching the pole permitting phase. Charter is required to obtain pole permits to ensure their equipment is safely placed on existing utility poles, as needed.

When will Charter begin construction?
Construction is estimated to start at the end of 2022.

When will the project be complete? Charter is still estimating the project to be done by December 2023.

How will homeowners be notified that construction is complete in their area?

Charter will contact residents with sales information in the mail and/or by door-to-door representatives.

Chairman's Update by Dennis Kenealy

As we look forward to celebrating Independence Day with family and friends, it is important to remember and be thankful for all of those who served our country.

The Town of Erin will celebrate the 20th Anniversary of the Veterans' Memorial Monument this year. Thanks to the effort of Chairperson Beverly Schroeder, Emmett Burg, Jack Russell, James Sarafiny, Ione Sarafiny, Austin "Tag" Stapleton and Franklin Tennies, the Town of Erin dedicated the Veterans' Memorial Monument on November 9, 2002. The memorial honors past and present serving veterans who currently reside or have at one time resided within the township.

Since inception, the memorial has recognized almost 330 local veterans, with four additional veterans being added in 2022. We thank our current Town of Erin Veterans' Memoriam committee members Patrick Hansen, Jeff Millikin, Franklin Tennies and Michael Eggleston for continuing the legacy honoring our township's local service members.

Emergency Management by Bradley Bautz, Director

The last St. Patrick's Parade went very well. The weather wasn't the best. It seemed like a slightly less than normal attendance for a



weekday, but there were few problems. Thank you to everyone for your cooperation.

I am continuing to work with the school, churches and others on safety and security initiatives. I will also be continuing emergency management training.

I want to make a reminder that NO roads in the town are open to ATVs and UTVs. Per state statutes, they are not allowed on the roadway or in the right of way, with limited exceptions.

The Richfield Volunteer Fire Company is still working on a staffing plan, and once they get costs to me, I will have a better idea of what that will cost the town. The RVFC services all of the Village of Richfield, Town of Germantown, and parts of Erin and the Town of Polk. Costs would be spread out among all the communities.

With more severe weather a possibility, I want to take the opportunity to remind you about severe weather watches and warnings. A Severe Thunderstorm Watch means that conditions are favorable for the formation of severe storms, with damaging winds, dangerous lightning, and large hail. A Severe Thunderstorm Warning means these conditions are occurring. A Tornado Watch means conditions are favorable for the formation of tornadoes. A Tornado Warning means a funnel cloud was sighted or a tornado has touched down: TAKE SHELTER IMMEDIATELY. Go to the lowest level of your home or building, and stay away from windows. A weather alert radio would be an excellent way to help protect yourself and your family. They can be purchased at many electronic stores. You can also receive

weather warnings on your smartphone. There is no need to sign up, as long as your phone is WEA (Wireless Emergency Alerts) capable. You will receive warnings and they are free.

Reminder

I encourage you to make use of the brush drop-off at the town's dump site or recycling center.

Please be cognizant of conditions before you burn. We had grass fires this spring, and they were preventable. Your fire **must be attended at all times**. You must be near the fire. You cannot burn during a burning ban. Do not burn if the wind speed is greater than 9 miles per hour. Violations can likely result in a citation from the town. The rules for burning are set forth below:

- No burning permits are required.
- When fire danger is high, very high, or severe, all outdoor burning will be banned (this includes fireworks, which are already restricted by county ordinance) by order of the emergency management director, or town chairman. Outdoor cooking (i.e.

grills) is an exemption. For such a ban I will notify the sheriff's department, and local radio stations. Notices will also be found on the town posting boards and on the website.

At any time of year:

- Open fires must be attended at all times.
- The jurisdictional fire department or preferably the Washington County Sheriff's Office must be notified of any bonfire in excess of 10 ft in diameter or if a large area of grass is burned (i.e. over 1/4 acre).
- Fires can't be started on the roadway surface and only leaves and grass can be burned in the right-of-way.
- The burning of garbage, plastics, rubber, treated wood, petroleum products or anything that emits noxious or toxic odors is PROHIBITED. The DNR already bans the burning of these items as they pose a health hazard to residents if burned.
- The DNR also prohibits the burning of solid waste by businesses.

Please make your address signs visible for our emergency responders, and do not move or otherwise modify them. It is a violation of town ordinances to do so. If they get damaged or need to be replaced, please contact the town clerk for a replacement, free of charge.

Our local fire departments wanted me to take the opportunity to ask the residents to make sure their driveways stay clear for emergency vehicles. This is particularly important on very long driveways, or driveways that have brush, trees, or low hanging branches that get in the way. Fire apparatus keeps getting taller and taller, and fire trucks and ambulances need the space to avoid damaging your trees and their equipment.

Have a safe and happy summer.

Roads Department by Road Commissioner and Town Supervisor Dan Coffey

The snow plows were removed from our trucks and we are in the summer road project phase. This year's projects include mowing the road shoulders, some brush removal, culvert replacement, installing shoulder gravel after paving, and inspection for quality control of the paving projects. Dave and Nick, Erin's only road employees, do most of the equipment repairs also.

Another large cost to the town of Erin is Emerald Ash Borer tree damage. Each year we take down 500 to 1000 dead ash trees. We are making progress on tree removal but still have more to go.

The quality of roads in the town of Erin is reviewed and recorded in the state road Paser system. This requires each road to be rated on a scale from one to ten (one is gravel and ten is new). We try to rebuild and pave roads that are three or less on the Paser scale. When choosing which roads to rebuild, we consider the number of residents located on the road, the amount of traffic the road carries, as well as road condition. Unfortunately, we have almost 17 miles of roads rated at Paser ratings of three or less. Too often a road will get so bad we have to change the road rebuild schedule and address it, making other roads wait. The roads committee will put together a list of which roads we need to rebuild and the order in which we will rebuild them, depending on budget. Erin roads also requires spending money on crack filling and chip sealing of existing roads. Chip sealing and crack filling a road can double a road's life if done soon enough. This is based on

recommendations from several engineering companies.

Once a road or roads are selected, our engineering company (SEH) puts together a bid package including all the details needed to make the major road repairs. Erin then awards the bid to the lowest bidder. This year's bid was awarded to Stark Asphalt. This year's paving projects include cul de sacs in Erin Mountain Pass and Erin Mountain Court, Belfast Lane, Belfast East, Belfast West, and St. Augustine Road from Hogsback to Elmwood Road. Note that Erin Mountain Pass and Erin Mountain Court are projects left over from last year as the paving company couldn't get to them due to weather.

Financial Status by Marjorie Bruha, Treasurer

January, 2022 through April, 2022 Revenue: \$842,929 (61% of budget) Expenditures: \$324,565 (21% of budget)

This is the first in a series of educational Q & A's to appear in the Town newsletter.

How does the Town of Erin decide how much money to spend each year?

Each year a budget is developed from estimates of expenditures determined by the Town's department heads. This process begins around August and is developed from input from the Town Board, Town Clerk, Town Committees and Commissions, Town Emergency Management, etc. Then the budget is reviewed by the Town Board and presented to the electors of the Town for discussion in November at a Special Meeting. Following any revisions from that meeting, the Town Board approves the next year's budget by motion and vote.

Can the Town Board decide to spend as much as they want?

No. Since 2005, the state of Wisconsin regulates how much local governments can increase the property tax levy, compared to previous year's actual property tax levy. This levy limit sets the maximum amount that any Wisconsin Town is permitted to spend in the next fiscal year.

This increase or decrease in spending limit is determined by the State of Wisconsin based on net new construction from the previous year. (WI Statute 66.0602) For the Town of Erin, that amount was an increase of \$10,591 in the 2022 budget. Exceeding this levy limit results in a penalty of dollar-for-dollar reduction in county and municipal aid in the following fiscal year.

Kriewaldt retires from Erin School

Erin School District Administrator Dr. Kieth Kriewaldt is retiring on June 30, 2022, after serving as an educator for 32 years.

Dr. Kriewaldt was hired by the Erin School District in May 2007. Before coming to Erin, Dr. Kriewaldt was a

principal and Director of Elementary Education in the



Kewaskum School District for 12 years. Prior to administrative work, Dr. Kriewaldt was an elementary teacher in the Plymouth School District. Dr. Kriewaldt became an educator after spending a short time farming and serving in the U.S. Army, bringing skills he learned from both experiences to his successful career as an educational leader.

Taking time to listen to staff, parents and community members, greeting children at eye level (which is no small task for this very tall man), sharing his common-sense fiscal approach and rolling up his sleeves to help with any project are just some of the attributes that make Dr. K a special leader.

During Dr. Kriewaldt's 15 years in Erin, he solidified two cohorts at each grade level, providing resident students with more choices and increasing open-enrollment opportunities. This made Erin a destination school where open-enrollment waiting lists are common. Erin School earned the Wisconsin Title 1 School of Recognition and continues to rank in the highest academic achievement categories. Dr. Kriewaldt would modestly credit this achievement to hard-working teachers and supportive families.


Dr. Kriewaldt is known for his funny metaphors, his personal values and for modeling the highest standards of ethical leadership for all.

Patrick's Day Parade Committee Chairman

This year marked the 42nd Annual Erin St. Patrick's Day Parade. We were thankful for warmer weather and a great crowd to enjoy the fun parade tradition. I hope you were able to enjoy the parade! We had 25 float entries this vear, which is about average for a weekday parade.



Enthusiasm and creativity with the entries, however, were 10 out of 10!.

As a parade committee, it is extremely important that we do everything we can to leave the roadway cleaner than it



was prior to the parade. We place numerous garbage cans the day before the parade as well as hand out garbage bags to each group along the route. Despite our best efforts, there is a fair amount of trash left behind. De-

pending on the weather, our volunteers try to get out to clean the roadway the very next day to make sure we are keeping the town of Erin clean and looking its best. Of the dozen garbage bags of trash we pick up each year, 75% of the garbage is not parade related. We find that most of the trash are items that have been hiding under the snow all winter, including car parts, trash thrown out of car windows such as cans and cups, and items that blew off of trucks and trailers.
