

# Father Mike's Homiletter - July 11, 2021 Fifteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

**Scripture:** Amos 7:12-15; Psalm 85:9-14; Ephesians 1:3-14; Mark 6:7-13

As I write this, work is still continuing in the effort to rescue and recover the victims of the Surfside, Florida disaster. Let us keep those who suffered in this tragedy, the victims and their families, in our prayers. We should also pray for the many first-responders who have worked so tirelessly to save any who may be alive, and bring closure to the families of those who are not.

Terrible events tend to focus our thoughts on the important things in our lives. This week's readings call our attention to the need to learn how to discern what is essential and important, and what is secondary. Amos is being thrown out of Bethel by the priest Amaziah because he has prophesied in ways which displeased the king. Amaziah is trying to characterize Amos as a hack for prophetic hire – but Amos responds with spirit – I was a shepherd and cared for trees until I was called by the Lord to prophesy to the people of Israel. Amos is all about the basics – this is what I was told to do – I'm not into the politics of the situation. Amaziah appears to be more about the king's unwillingness to hear bad news than God's displeasure with the people Amaziah should be leading to holiness. In the Ephesians reading, St. Paul enumerates spiritual gifts we have been given as God's chosen people – adoption as children of God, redemption by Christ's death on the cross, knowledge of God's plan of salvation, status as God's chosen, and the presence of the Holy Spirit to guide us into eternal life. Though Paul's language is somewhat complex, fundamentally, it is a rich inventory of God's blessings, all of them significant. In fact, it is an inventory of the essentials of salvation.

In our Gospel, Jesus sends the twelve apostles on mission, in pairs, to various villages in Galilee to teach and preach, to heal and expel demons. Jesus instructs them to travel light: no packed lunch, no extra clothes, no accessories. In other words, only the essentials – themselves, their faith in Jesus and their knowledge of what Jesus has taught. Jesus is showing His confidence in what they have learned. He tells them accept what hospitality is offered, and if none, move on. Don't try to force people to listen. Jesus is reducing the mission itself to the basics. And it seems to work – the Apostles went off and preached repentance, and they were able to drive out many demons and cure many people. Their efforts, really God's efforts, returned people to functionality, able to worship God and care for their families. They got their lives back, and one wonders how they responded to that.

Our modern lives have a tendency to be complicated – so much is broken into specialized areas, leaving us the task of coordinating multiple obligations, schedules and activities: commitments to family, health, jobs, children's activities, social engagements, home maintenance, community involvement, etc. All make demands on our time, and most will expand to take as much of our attention as it can squeeze out of us. There is a temptation to make everything equally important – after all, society expects us to keep <u>all</u> our commitments, and in many ways, it assumes the right to define what our commitments should be. The result: we can wind up spending the most time on the least important things. Prayer and worship can get pushed to the end of the list, or off the schedule entirely.

The Covid lockdown may have one benefit – over and over I have read that families have been spending more time with each other, and realizing how much it improved their relationships. Many have benefitted from streamed Masses. As we ease into a post-Covid world, it might be a good idea to sit down and review what we are – or used to be – doing, and give some thought to how important it really is. We can apply the post-Covid mantra "Build back better" to ourselves and our schedules. Which things do we really want to add back? The multiple sports teams and their events? Did take out meals really save that much time – or was cooking together more fun and almost as quick? Did we need to see every new movie right away in an IMAX theater, or would an at-home family movie night a few weeks later be more fun? Can we rejoin the worshipping community with new appreciation for gathering together and receiving the Eucharist? I encourage you to take a look at your schedules with an eye for the essentials, and consider what might better be buried with Covid. Learning to recognize the essentials is a skill that pays dividends in many areas – and our relationship with God may be the most important. Consider prayerfully how God will fit into your post-Covid schedule.

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
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# School Supplies 2021
