

Father Mike's Homiletter – August 15, 2021 The Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary

Scripture: Revelation 11:19a, 12:1-6a, 10ab; Psalm 45:10-12, 16; 1 Corinthians 15:20-27; Luke 1:39-56

As a parish dedicated to Mary, the Mother of God, under the title of her Immaculate Conception, we should be welcoming this Sunday's celebration of our patroness. It isn't often that a specific feast which falls on a Sunday replaces the Sunday readings, and when it does, it should be a clue that the Church thinks the feast is very, very important. And the feast of the Assumption of Mary *is* very important, but since it comes during the busiest part of the summer/back-to-school season, usually on a weekday when we are squeezing Mass into an already packed schedule, we may not appreciate the feast as much as we should.

When we think about the end of Mary's life, it is worth giving some thought to the practical realities she faced on earth. We know she was a relatively young girl when the angel Gabriel brought God's message asking her to become the mother of Jesus Christ. Since Jesus lived thirty-three years, we can assume Mary was probably no more than 50 when she saw her Son executed in the most horrendous way the Roman Empire could find. She lived on after his death, with the disciples at first, but in the care of St. John for the balance of her life, in accordance with Jesus' last instruction – "Son, behold your mother." Knowing the plight of a widow without a male to care for her, Jesus shared His mother with John, who could protect her – and who represents all of us.

Our first reading from Revelation presents a collection of surreal images which are difficult to understand individually, but together present a picture of salvation history. In our second reading, Paul explains that when Adam sinned, one man brought punishment on the entire human race, and thus, when Christ suffered and died, offering His life for humanity, one man, fully human as well as fully divine, brought salvation to all of humanity. The bare fact of Jesus' death on the cross should stun us into shock at how much God must love us – there is no human logic which would cause a divinity to become human, with all its disadvantages, in the first place, let alone die a terrible death for humanity's sake. Our Gospel records Mary's visit to Elizabeth, Mary's cousin and mother of John the Baptist. Since Gabriel had said Elizabeth was six months pregnant, and Mary stayed with Elizabeth three months, Mary may have stayed to help Elizabeth when John was born. When Mary arrived, Elizabeth knew something "out of this world" had come, and their greetings indicate they both knew God was with them, though they didn't know what that would mean.

Most images of Mary portray her as young, beautiful, sheltered, innocent, almost fragile. Yet, if we examine the realities of Mary's life which we know, few as they are, we find a very different person. Her reaction to Gabriel's appearance is wise beyond her years. In agreeing to Gabriel's – God's – plan, she demonstrates an extraordinary ability to trust in the unknown, to trust God's providence, without knowing where it would lead. Her willingness to agree to bear a child in her circumstances undoubtedly subjected her to some not-so-innocent speculation and gossip when she was found pregnant. She sets off to visit her cousin Elizabeth, also with child – that's a roughly 70-mile journey from Nazareth - quite the trek for a pregnant young woman. After returning to Nazareth three months later, she makes another 70-mile journey with Joseph to Bethlehem when she was days from giving birth. Then came the flight into Egypt to avoid Herod's murderous search for the child. After raising her child to adulthood, with all the normal challenge that presented, she follows his journeys as an itinerant preacher – and by then she was no longer young by the standards of the time. Finally, Mary stands at the foot of the cross until the bitter end. Reading the realities which lie between the lines of Mary's life, we have to come to the conclusion that Mary is not fragile – she is one tough cookie!

Yet she lives quietly, patiently. She endures what comes, what God sends her, without complaint, though there must have been times when she wondered how it all was going to end. Not well, in human terms, as we know. Yet, through it all, Mary trusted in God's Providence, letting it lead her, not knowing where, but somehow confident that it would go where God wanted it to go. And in the end, it led back to God. Mary, representing all of us, returned to God – assumed *body and soul* into heaven after her death, to be with her Son once more. She provides the ultimate example to us of where it will all lead – back to the God who made us, who loves us, who keeps watch over us, who guides us, and who is waiting for us to come home to Him. What a wonderful ending – and what a wonderful feast!
