

Tuesday ~ St. Mary & St. Mark Intention at Holy Family ~ 8:00 AM Wednesday & Thursday ~ 8:00 AM Dear family and friends of Holy Family and St. Mary and St. Mark Parishes,

We celebrate the Baptism of the Lord. The Psalmist says, "The Lord will bless his people with peace." There is no doubt that we want to experience peace in our lifetimes. Peace connotes the idea that we will have tranquility and strength of well-being, but the reality is that when we are just towards one another and preserve justice for all, then true peace will enter into our lives. The people of Israel could not experience peace until they became aware that God visited His people through the Messiah predicted to come, the Prince of Peace. When Jesus came into the world, the world was full of darkness. This darkness came from sin and death entering into the world, and thus chaos ensued. What was needed was justice, but not just any justice, God's justice. The world needed a redeemer who could save people from their sinfulness and ultimate death to their souls. We have heard the phrase shouted by protesters in more recent demonstrations, "No justice, no peace." While the sentiment is well taken, it has not led to true justice and true peace. The difference between the justice desired by human beings and the justice desired by God is that human beings make justice conditional upon their own preconceived notions of what justice is while God makes justice an absolute condition of doing what is right for all creation. This is why when human beings settle their differences between one another with rational and reasonable solutions, true peace can be achieved. We must recognize first that in order to obtain peace we need to battle our worldly desires to have things the way we want them to be rather than the way they ought to be.

In our first reading from the Book of the Prophet Isaiah, we hear, "Here is my servant whom I uphold, my chosen one with whom I am pleased, upon whom I have put my spirit; he shall bring forth justice to the nations, not crying out, not shouting, not making his voice heard in the street." When we hear that all nations will gather around the Lord, the word nations is pseudonymous with all people. For the people of Israel, the thought was that because they were the Chosen People of God, their relationship with Him was exclusive, but that was not the case. God's plan for salvation was to save all people, including the Gentiles. The Messiah was the chosen servant of God. To hear the word servant, for a lot of people today, carries with it different understandings of the word. It can be looked at as a negative word pertaining to slavery, as in the slavery experienced in the history of our nation. To be a servant of God is totally different. It means that we are indebted to Him for the ways that He comes to our rescue from the wages of sin and death. It also means that we are chosen to carry out His will for all creation and the world. To be chosen by God and to be found pleasing to Him means that we carry out His will without reservation and without grumbling because of what we are called to do. When the Messiah came into the world, he would not come with a grandiose presence, but with humility and a quiet disposition. He would go through great suffering and persecution for the sake of the people he came to save. This ties in perfectly with what Jesus came into the world to do.

In the Gospel of Luke, we hear that the people were filled with expectation when they encountered John the Baptist. They thought for sure that he was the one predicted by the Prophet Isaiah as the Messiah to come. John dispels this expectation when he says, "I am baptizing you with water, but one mightier than I is coming. I am not worthy to loosen the thongs of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire." Imagine what this brought to the minds of the people listening to John. If he was not the Messiah, then who is the one he is telling them is coming? At the baptism of Jesus, as given in the accounts of the Gospels, we hear that the clouds opened up and a voice from the heavens declared that this is my beloved son in whom I am well pleased and a dove hovered above Him. This fulfilled the prediction of the Prophet Isaiah when he spoke of the coming Messiah. Imagine being present when John was asked by Jesus to baptize Him. For the people, they would have presumed that He was human just like them and that He was anointed as the one to carry out God's will. They did not see Him as the Son of God, the second person of the Holy Trinity. His divinity was not known. This is why when people ask today why Jesus needed to be baptized, the answer is that He didn't. In fact, John asked how he could be the one to baptize the Lord. He knew by revelation that Jesus was more than a man, but a divine being. So why was Jesus baptized? It was to prepare the waters of the Jordan to be purified so that a future Sacrament could be fulfilled, His baptism of us through water and the Spirit. Jesus never once questioned His duty to fulfill His Father's will, but in all humility carried out His mission as given by His Father in Heaven.


The second reading from the Acts of the Apostles tells us that Peter, the head of the Church on earth and the highest ranked member of the Apostles had the responsibility for teaching the converts to the Way of Jesus. He says to those gathered in the house of Cornelius, a convert to the Way of Jesus, "In truth, I see that God shows no partiality. Rather, in every nation whoever fears him and acts uprightly is acceptable to him." This dispelled the notion that God had not just chosen the Jewish people as the beneficiaries of His grace but all people.

We as the offshoots of those who have come before us as disciples of Jesus also became beneficiaries of God's grace. And where did that begin? It began with our own baptism in the Church through a special Sacrament; a Sacrament that gives us the opportunity to enter into the Passion, Death, and Resurrection of the Lord. Many of us cannot remember the day we were baptized, but we can remember when we experienced a conversion from sin to new life. It is through our living in the grace afforded us by the Sacraments that we recognize that we have the Spirit of God living in us. When we experience the Sacraments of Jesus given to us through the Church, we have the eyes of our minds and hearts opened to do the will of our Father in Heaven. It is by our consciences made clean that we discover the good we are called to do for others, namely to bring them to the realization that they are claimed by God and are being saved from damnation by God's grace.

As we thank God today for the gift of these celebrations in the Christmas season, may we continue to build up in our hearts a spirit of gratitude. May we look to our own baptism as the beginning of a moment of grace given to us to be claimed by God and to carry our His divine will as we minister to others in need of God's grace.



# ST. SAVA, Bishop

# Patron of the Serbian Peoples

The younger son of Stephen I, who founded the Nemanydes dynasty and the independent state of Serbia, St. Sava was born in 1175 and became a monk of Mt. Athos in 1191. In 1219 he became Bishop of the Serbs and in 1222 Archbishop.

This saintly man organized the Serbian Church properly, using monks to do pastoral and missionary work among the neglected people. By unremitting efforts he consolidated Christianity among the Serbians and established Serbian Bishops. He also took an active part in secular affairs, contributing to the integration of the Serbian kingdom under his brother Stephen II. He died in 1325.



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
