Today is a very Blessed Day. At least here in my bulletin article, it is the first time that I can wish you a Merry Christmas. I hope all had a Blessed Christmas with family and friends. In the African tradition, today is also the From The Desk Of first day of Kwanzaa. For the next eight days, officially

called an Octave, we will celebrate Kwanzaa. Kwanzaa is a time set aside to honor our human experience and live together as a family. Kwanzaa reminds us that we are all in this together. Pope Francis has mentioned this time and again. We are not an individual inhabiting the earth;

we are all interconnected. And for the next eight days, we can allow this thought to permeate our lives. Out of the African tradition, so much of life is to be celebrated, especially as a community.

The first day of Kwanzaa brings this thought out so beautifully. This first day calls us to a UNITY OF FAMILY, RACE, AND NATION. When we look around our world and our country, there does not seem to be a unity of people. Unfortunately, we can be people of individual time and talent, wanting to better our own lives, consequently forgetting about everyone else. In our country, the idea of being an individual is part and parcel of the American experience. We have seen it acted out most recently with the COVID pandemic and the individualism that goes along with "I have certain rights of freedom in this country, and you cannot tell me what to do." Yes, we all have the right to freedom, but when does my freedom begin to affect the idea of UNITY IN A COMMUNITY negatively? Is my own personal freedom jeopardizing the future of the American people? Sometimes the pursuit of our freedom and liberty can seem so selfish. Kwanzaa calls us back to thinking about our exitance as a community of people who all need to live in peace with one another.

Finally, in the Church Calendar, today is the feast of the Holy Family. This feast seems to fall right in line with Kwanzaa. As a family, we are also asked to live in harmony with one another. The family unit seems to have suffered much in our country. Our families seem to be going in many different directions and, consequently, spending little quality time with one another. If the family, especially under the constant guidance and love of the parents, does not spend time together, it has been shown the children lack the social skills to survive in our world. If children are left to themselves with no support, it is no wonder they get involved in all kinds of unhealthy things. The feasts of Kwanzaa and the Holy Family can bring us back to how important it is for us to spend this quality time together. As a human family, we desperately need the love and attention this unit requires.

May God guide us in these crucial matters.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION...

BAPTISM GUIDELINES:

Newborn – 6 years old. A parent or legal guardian and godparent(s) must attend a Baptism preparation class, instruction materials are provided.

Ages 7 - 10: The child must attend special Baptism preparation classes and the parent(s) or legal guardian and godparent(s) must attend a Baptism preparation session prior to the ceremony.

Ages 11 - 17: The young person must enroll in the Rite of Christian Initiation for Children (RCIC) program.

Age 18 and Older: The Candidate must enroll in the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA) program.

MATRIMONY – Engaged couples, seeking to be married at the Rock Church, must meet with the Pastor before setting a date.

RCIA/RCIC - ARE YOU SOMEONE OR DO YOU KNOW SOMEONE WHO...

- Has expressed an interest in becoming Catholic?
- Has a child over the age of seven who has not been baptized?
- Was baptized Catholic as a child, but has not celebrated the Sacraments of Confirmation and **Eucharist?**

We offer an opportunity to come together in a group to learn more about the Catholic Faith. Sessions focus on the teachings and experience of the Church and prepare individuals to celebrate the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist. There are separate sessions for children and youth. You are welcome to participate in the process with your questions, insights and your faith story in a warm accepting setting.

LITURGY NOTES...

KWANZAA PRINCIPLES AND SYMBOLS



The 7 Kwanzaa Principles were designed to solidify the values of African culture. These principles are based on family, culture and community among all African Americans regardless of their religious affiliations. Known as *Nguzo Saba*, these principles are the basic foundation upon which all values are reinforced and in which a solid commitment is formed.

Umoja or Unity: To strive for and maintain unity in the family, community, nation and race.

Kujichagulia or Self-Determination: To define ourselves, name ourselves, create for ourselves and speak for ourselves.

Ujima or Collective Work and Responsibility: To build and maintain our community together and make our brother's and sister's problems our problems and to solve them together.

Ujamaa or Cooperative Economics: To build and maintain our own stores, shops and other businesses and to profit from them together.

Nia or Purpose: To make our collective vocation the building and developing of our community in order to restore our people to their traditional greatness.

Kuumba or Creativity: To do always as much as we can, in any way we can, in order to leave our community more beautiful and beneficial than we inherited it.

Imani or Faith: To believe with all our heart in our people, our parents, our teachers, our leaders and the righteousness will victory of our struggle.

The 7 Symbols of Kwanzaa -- In addition to the 7 Kwanzaa Principles there are also the 7 Symbols of Kwanzaa. Each of these symbols represents the values of the African culture and is used to reinforce one's commitment to community, family and unity.

Mazao or The Crops: These are symbolic of African harvest celebrations and of the rewards of productive and collective labor.

Mkeka or The Mat: This is symbolic of our tradition and history and therefore, the foundation on which we build.

Kinara or The Candle Holder: This is symbolic of our roots, our parent people—continental Africans.

Muhindi or The Corn: This is symbolic of our children and our future which they embody.

Mishumaa Saba or The Seven Candles: These are symbolic of the Nguzo Saba, the Seven Principles, the matrix and minimum set of values which African people are urged to live by in order to rescue and reconstruct their lives in their own image and according to their own needs.

Kikombe cha Umoja or The Unity Cup: This is symbolic of the foundational principle and practice of unity which makes all else possible.

Zawadi or The Gifts: These are symbolic of the labor and love of parents and the commitments made and kept by the children."

If you would be interested in providing a dinner, please let us know. The number of women at the shelter currently is seven.


