SOLEMNITY OF THE EPHIPHANY OF THE LORD

JANUARY 02, 2021

Today we celebrate the feast of Epiphany. It is an important feast because it teaches us that Jesus coming to earth and living among us is not just for the elite and CHOSEN few. When God reached out to Abraham, Israel became the CHOSEN people. God promised that he became the CHOSEN people. Because of this, the Israelites thought they had an exclusive right to God and that no other people would be saved. When Jesus comes, this whole idea is questioned. At his birth, the poor and abandoned were the ones who initially had contact with him, and with the arrival of the Wise Men, this whole

theology is turned on its head. These Wise Men are pagans from a foreign land. They know nothing of Abraham and the Israelite heritage; they were inspired to follow the star; they were promised a meeting with a newborn king, and this promise was fulfilled. This feast is for those who feel they are not invited to sit at the table with Jesus. This feast shows that the Salvation that Jesus brought was not meant for a chosen few, but all.

One of the things I have been most impressed with in my time at the Rock is the hospitality and kindness we show visitors. Just like the feast today in which the pagan or Gentile world got the first glimpse of Jesus, we must continue to be open to "other" people coming to worship with us. We do this well. We just never know who might be coming to worship with us, and we also don't see how God might be leading them to us. In the same way, the Magi were guided by the star to Jesus. Others who might be strangers to us, through the inspiration of God, might be visiting us this day. As I have already stated, I think we do an excellent job with this, and it is one of the things I am most proud of; and I hope that the quality of our church family never changes.

I want to commend everyone who visits us at the Rock for taking seriously the facial coverings that we ask you to wear. I, for one, am sick of wearing the mask, but I still think it is essential for the time being. I still hear some people saying that they have a right not to be vaccinated or not to wear a mask. They say they have a right and that the government cannot force them to do these things. Well, maybe it's not the government telling us to do anything, but the VIRUS ITSELF. I think the VIRUS is still the one in control and telling us what to do. It is saying to us that "unless you all get vaccinated, I am going to continue to be here. In fact, I am only going to get stronger and live longer." I do not believe we will be rid of the virus anytime soon because some people are too selfish. The virus will continue to mutate, and those trying to comply with the regulations are just going to have to wait until everyone in this country is on board. May God give us patience.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION...

BAPTISM GUIDELINES:

Newborn - 6 years old. A parent or legal guardian and godparent(s) must attend a Baptism preparation class, instruction materials are provided.

Ages 7 - 10: The child must attend special Baptism preparation classes and the parent(s) or legal guardian and godparent(s) must attend a Baptism preparation session prior to the ceremony.

Ages 11 - 17: The young person must enroll in the Rite of Christian Initiation for Children (RCIC) program.

Age 18 and Older: The Candidate must enroll in the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA) program.

MATRIMONY – Engaged couples, seeking to be married at the Rock Church, must meet with the Pastor before setting a date.

RCIA/RCIC – ARE YOU SOMEONE OR DO YOU KNOW SOMEONE WHO...

- Has expressed an interest in becoming Catholic?
- Has a child over the age of seven who has not been baptized?
- Was baptized Catholic as a child, but has not celebrated the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist?

We offer an opportunity to come together in a group to learn more about the Catholic Faith. Sessions focus on the teachings and experience of the Church and prepare individuals to celebrate the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist. There are separate sessions for children and youth. You are welcome to participate in the process with your questions, insights and your faith story in a warm accepting setting.

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LITURGY NOTES...



Today the Church celebrates the **Solemnity of the Epiphany**. The Solemnity of the Epiphany is celebrated either on January 6 or on the Sunday between January 2 and January 8, inclusive. The young Messiah is revealed as the light of the nations.

The feast of the Epiphany, which was kept in the East and in certain Western Churches before being observed in Rome, seems to have been originally a feast of the nativity; January 6, for those

churches where it was kept, was the equivalent of Christmas (December 25) in the Roman Church. The feast was introduced at Rome in the second half of the sixth century and became the complement and, so to say, the crown of the Christmas festival.

Epiphany means manifestation. What the Church celebrates today is the manifestation of our Lord to the whole world; after being made known to the shepherds of Bethlehem He is revealed to the Magi who have come from the East to adore Him. Christian tradition has ever seen in the Magi the first fruits of the Gentiles; they lead in their wake all the peoples of the earth, and thus the Epiphany is an affirmation of universal salvation. St. Leo brings out this point admirably in a sermon, read at Matins, in which he shows in the adoration of the Magi the beginnings of Christian faith, the time when the great mass of the heathen sets off to follow the star which summons it to seek its Savior.

That is the meaning, too, of the wonderful prophecy from Isaias which the liturgy appoints to be read in the first nocturn at Matins and at the Epistle of the Mass. This same thought of universal redemption the Church returns to as she sings, in the antiphon to the Magnificat at 2nd Vespers, applying the words to herself, of the union with Christ typified by the wedding feast at Cana, by the baptism of her children foreshadowed by that of Christ in the waters of the Jordan. Formerly the Epiphany was an additional day for solemn baptisms.

The Gospel for the Epiphany of the Lord is a beautiful one. It beckons us to consider how we pay homage to the Lord in our own lives. We are certainly not kings in the sense that the Magi were. We do not rule nations. But we do share in the kingly office of Christ as a result of our Baptism. This means we must rule as He ruled: offering everything we have to God and being generous with our possessions and treasures. These treasures might not be gold, frankincense, or myrrh. They might instead be our time and energy spent more intentionally for prayer and service to others within our parish and within the wider community. As Pope Benedict XVI said in his homily for World Youth Day in 2008, "The Church needs your faith, your idealism, and your generosity, so that she can always be young in spirit." **archstl.org/dynamic**


