

Today we celebrate the Baptism of the Lord. I have been reading Pope Francis' book about the gospel of Mark. One of the 1<sup>st</sup> things that happen in this gospel is the Baptism of Jesus. John the Baptist is introduced to us, announcing a way to God through baptism. Pope Francis makes the From The Desk Of comment that Jesus goes to be baptized and that he stands in line waiting his turn like everyone else. I think this is significant. In Jesus' humility, he waits his turn. He does not CUT THE LINE. I think this says a lot about how our attitude should be. Jesus waited in line like everyone else, standing around waiting his turn. He did not

consider himself anything special but assumed our humanity in this way.

Of course, Jesus does not need to be baptized. John announces the need for repentance, but Jesus does not need to repent. Again, for Jesus to Redeem us, he takes on our sinfulness, but because of his mission from the Father, he knows it is essential to set an example. Even though Jesus does not need to be baptized, he stands in solidarity with those who do. This is an important lesson for us. Right now, we have those in our country who want to walk alone. We need to come together as a people and learn from the Lord. Each of us is interconnected in so many ways, and we need to continue to come together in solidarity. Even though we may not think something is important, for example, getting vaccinated, we can learn from Jesus and do it anyway. We need to continue to love and support one another. We are all in this together.

The feast we celebrate today is important because it helps us focus our attention more on the Lord. Each of us has been given the gift of baptism. Except for receiving the Lord in Holy Communion, this is the greatest thing that could happen to us. I hope we can learn to appreciate this. I had said on numerous occasions that we should find out when we were baptized and celebrate this like our birthday because, in a sense, it is a birth. It is not a physical birth but a spiritual one. We are consecrated to the Lord through our baptism in a special way. Sin is removed, and we are given Sanctifying Grace to lift us unto the Lord. The Holy Eucharist is important to us, but we could not receive that sacrament without 1st being baptized. Our baptism sets the stage, our spiritual stage, for the rest of our spiritual lives. Without our baptism, we are not connected to God in this important and unique manner. And so once again, I invite you all to find out the date of your baptism and celebrate it. I was born on December 30th, and my baptism date is January 17th. I will celebrate this date until the end of my life. May God bless us always, and remember to give thanks for our gift of life in the Spirit.

### **BAPTISM GUIDELINES:**

Newborn – 6 years old. A parent or legal guardian and godparent(s) must attend a Baptism preparation class, instruction materials are provided.

Ages 7 - 10: The child must attend special Baptism preparation classes and the parent(s) or legal guardian and godparent(s) must attend a Baptism preparation session prior to the ceremony.

Ages 11 - 17: The young person must enroll in the Rite of Christian Initiation for Children (RCIC) program.

**Age 18 and Older:** The Candidate must enroll in the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA) program.

**MATRIMONY** – Engaged couples, seeking to be married at the Rock Church, must meet with the Pastor before setting a date.

### RCIA/RCIC – ARE YOU SOMEONE OR DO YOU KNOW SOMEONE WHO...

- Has expressed an interest in becoming Catholic?
- Has a child over the age of seven who has not been baptized?
- Was baptized Catholic as a child, but has not celebrated the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist?

We offer an opportunity to come together in a group to learn more about the Catholic Faith. Sessions focus on the teachings and experience of the Church and prepare individuals to celebrate the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist. There are separate sessions for children and youth. You are welcome to participate in the process with your questions, insights and your faith story in a warm accepting setting.

### LITURGY NOTES...



The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord is observed annually. It falls on the Sunday after January 6, so this year the date is January 9. It commemorates the baptism of Jesus in the Jordan River by John the Baptist. It is also known as "Theophany". The event is a distinct feast day observed in the Roman Catholic Church, the Anglican, or Episcopalian Church, as well as the Eastern Orthodox Church. Believers are invited to not only think about the baptism of the Lord

Jesus but also of their own baptism.

Baptism is not uniquely Christian — Mesopotamian, Egyptian, and Eastern religions all practiced forms of baptism in antiquity. It is a central religious rite in Hinduism, various Indigenous American nations, and Judaism. Different types of washings and purification by water are practiced in almost every other religion in the world, including Islam, Buddhism, and Shintoism. It is a central religious rite in Hinduism, various indigenous American nations, and Judaism.

The Baptism of the Lord memorializes the baptism of Jesus Christ in the Jordan River by John the Baptist at the start of His ministry. Although it was originally one of three Gospel events marked by the Epiphany, the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord was declared as a separate entity from the other two events — the coming of the Magi, and the wedding at Cana. This was done in 1955 by the then Pope, Pius XII.

This feast closes out the Christmas cycle in the Roman Catholic calendar. The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord is considered one of the most important Christian holidays, and it is well-known and looked forward to. It is seen as God revealing Himself to man as people identify with Jesus. It reminds the believer that just as Jesus moved from the baptism waters into ministry, they need to move as His disciples in their lives. On the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord, they recommit themselves to their Christian identity. Sunday School and church lessons are prepared on the topic to help congregants with this.


### Wilhelmina Hardin Center
