St. Alphonsus Liguori founded the Redemptorists in 1732 to work with the poor and most abandoned. Alphonsus was born in Naples, Italy, where there were a lot of priests who lived in the city. Most of these priests did not have a From The Desk Of lot to do, so Alphonsus, a very hard working, brilliant man, decided to preach to the people who lived in the country where there were few priests. His ministry inspired other men to follow him, and thus the Redemptorist Congregation was formed.

I give you that background, which most of you already know because the Redemptorists have inspired millions of people worldwide to a higher relationship with Jesus Christ. The Redemptorists came to America in 1832 and to St. Louis in 1867. During this time, we have done excellent work. Many people have sat in the pews of the "Rock" and have been empowered to commit themselves to Christ. Many would say that we Redemptorists speak and act differently from other priests and brothers. We are at home being with people on a common level and consequently endear ourselves to them. As a general rule, we do not Lord ourselves over others but try to speak to people in a kind, straightforward manner. Because of this, the laity has committed themselves to helping us in our efforts. The Rock has had parishioners in the past who have helped us, especially in bringing Jesus to others. We are still doing this today.

Recently, in the Redemptorist Congregation across the world, we have invited lay folks to help us in our ministry. There is a particular emphasis whereby the laity are invited to learn about our charism and help us in our work. About six months ago, Fr. Greg May invited lay people to listen to a series of talks on the internet about the Redemptorist life and spirituality and gather together via ZOOM to talk about what they had heard and learned. Richard Buckley and Joyce Jones took part and have already enriched others with their wisdom. They have become what we Redemptorists are now calling "Partners in Mission." Today at mass, we are going to install them as Partners officially. I think this is a blessing to us all. And it is not only them but also people from across the globe who are also taking up this challenge.

In their ZOOM experience, if I can call it that, they met other lay people from around North America. In this way, we can see that this is not just a local "Rock" thing. It is important to keep in mind the other laypeople coming forth to help us from across North America. It gives me a lot of energy just thinking about the possibilities. These classes will be offered again in the future, and I hope we have others from our parish and beyond, that are willing to "Partner with us.



BAPTISM GUIDELINES:

Newborn - 6 years old. A parent or legal guardian and godparent(s) must attend a Baptism preparation class, instruction materials are provided.

Ages 7 - 10: The child must attend special Baptism preparation classes and the parent(s) or legal guardian and godparent(s) must attend a Baptism preparation session prior to the ceremony.

Ages 11 - 17: The young person must enroll in the Rite of Christian Initiation for Children (RCIC) program.

Age 18 and Older: The Candidate must enroll in the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA) program.

MATRIMONY – Engaged couples, seeking to be married at the Rock Church, must meet with the Pastor before setting a date.

RCIA/RCIC – ARE YOU SOMEONE OR DO YOU KNOW SOMEONE WHO...


- Has expressed an interest in becoming Catholic?

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LITURGY NOTES...



Wedding at Cana—The exact location of Cana is still debated by Bible scholars. The name means "place of reeds." In the present day village of Kafr Cana in Israel stands the Greek Orthodox church of St. George, built in 1886. In that church are two stone jars which locals claim are two of the jars used in Jesus' first miracle. Several Bible translations, including the King James Version and English Standard Version, record Jesus addressing his mother as "woman," which some have characterized as brusque. The New International

Version adds the adjective "dear" before woman.

Earlier in the Gospel of John, we are told that Jesus called Nathaniel, who was born in Cana, and "saw" Nathaniel sitting under a fig tree even before they met. The wedding couple's names are not mentioned, but because Cana was a small village, it's likely they had some connection to Nathaniel. This miracle, showing Jesus' supernatural control over physical elements like water, marked the beginning of his public ministry. Like his other miracles, it benefited people in need. John referred to Jesus' miracles as "signs," indicators pointing to Jesus' divinity. Jesus' second sign, also performed in Cana, was the healing at a distance of a government official's son. In that miracle, the man believed through faith in Jesus *before* he saw the results, the attitude Jesus desired.

Some Bible scholars interpret the shortage of wine at Cana as symbolic of the spiritual dryness of Judaism at the time of Jesus. Wine was a common symbol of God's bounty and of spiritual joy. Not only did Jesus produce a large quantity of wine, but the quality of it astonished the banquet master. In the same way, Jesus pours his Spirit into us in abundance, giving us God's best. While it may seem insignificant, there is crucial symbolism in this first miracle of Jesus. It was not a coincidence that the water Jesus transformed came from jars used for ceremonial washing. The water signified the Jewish system of purification, and Jesus replaced it with pure wine, representing his spotless blood that would wash away our sins.

Question for Reflection -- Running out of wine was hardly a life-or-death situation, nor was anyone in physical pain. Yet Jesus interceded with a miracle to solve the problem. God is interested in every aspect of your life. What matters to you matters to him. Is something troubling you that you have been reluctant to go to Jesus about?


