The Season of Christmas comes to a close today on the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. Just as Jesus' baptism by John began his public ministry, so too all of us who have been baptized are called to make the presence of Jesus known in our world. May we live each day this New Year as faithful Missionary Disciples! Thanks to all who made our Christmas celebrations so wonderful and beautiful: those who decorated the Church; our Lectors, Communion Ministers, Servers, and Greeters; Peter and Steve and our wonderful choir, cantors,

and musicians; and all who worshiped with us over these weeks. Finally, thank you to all who sent cards, treats, and cookies to me over the Christmas holidays. I'm grateful for all the wonderful homemade goodies that I share with family and friends and staff, and I will remember all of you in prayer and with gratitude in this New Year.

This month of January brings the return of Ordinary Time, and a few special occasions and remembrances. On the third Monday in January, our nation remembers the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and his commitment to justice and non-violence. The Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, an annual remembrance, begins on January 18, and we pray for unity in faith and belief among all the Christian denominations of the world, fulfilling Jesus' prayer "that all may be one." On January 22, we remember the sad anniversary of the Roe vs. Wade decision. As we pray that the lives of the unborn will be protected in law, we also work to change minds and hearts to the beauty and dignity of human life, and we vow to protect and care for all women and children. In 2019, Pope Francis declared that the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time, this year on January 23, be observed as the Sunday of the Word of God; this would be a fitting time to recommit to the reading and reflecting on the Bible as part of our daily prayer. Catholic Schools Week begins on January 30 and ushers in a week of fun and activities for our parish school community, including an Open House at School on that Sunday. Finally, we celebrate some amazing Saints this month, including the Americans St. Elizabeth Ann Seton and St. John Neumann; the Canadian St. Andre Besette; as well as St. Agnes, St. Francis de Sales, SS. Timothy & Titus, St. Angela Merici, and St. Thomas Aquinas.

Our Holy Father's intention for the month of January is for true human fraternity. Let us join Pope Francis in remembering this petition this month: We pray for all those suffering from religious discrimination and persecution; may their own rights and dignity be recognized, which originate from being brothers and sisters in the human family.

Our COVID protocols remain in place at St. Margaret, and we should be ever vigilant as variants arise. If you are sick or have symptoms, are COVID positive or awaiting test results, please stay home and do not come to Mass. Face coverings (masks) are to be worn inside Church at all times. Holy Communion should be received on the hand, and will only be given on the tongue by the priest presider. Let us continue to pray for those who are sick, those who are caring for them and for hope and healing for our world.

January is often a dreary and cold month, but it's special to me as I celebrate my birthday and the anniversary of my Ordination to the Priesthood! I will be taking some time off away from the parish this month, after the Christmas holidays and before Lent begins, so please welcome the priests who will be here over the next weeks to celebrate Mass, including Fr. Charlie Bouchard, Fr. Jim Ramacciotti, and Fr. Jeff Puthoff, SJ. I will return to St. Margaret on January 22. Let us pray for one another!

Big News for the Parish!

Dear Friends,

I am pleased to announce the creation of a new endowment to benefit St. Margaret of Scotland Parish through the Roman Catholic Foundation of Eastern Missouri. This fund has been established with my support and the advice and support of our Parish Finance Advisory Committee.

Archbishop Carlson created the Foundation and it has been further endorsed by Archbishop Rozanski. It is a separate 501(c)(3) organization from the Archdiocese of St. Louis and has been designated as the long term financial and planned giving resource to the parishes, schools and ministries of the Archdiocese. After a mere 7 years in existence, the Foundation has more than 225 individual funds and more than \$68 million dollars under management.

The endowment will provide an annual distribution to the parish, which will be used for general support of the parish. The fund is perpetual and will provide on-going income to our parish for generations to come.

Additions to the fund can be made by anyone, at any time, and in any amount. Therefore, I encourage you to consider making gifts to the endowment through the Roman Catholic Foundation for birthdays, memorials, anniversaries, or any other special event. You can also make a planned gift, which will be added to the endowment after your lifetime!

GROWING IN FAITH

Today marks the end of our Christmas season. I know many of us have already taken the Christmas decorations down and tucked them away so that the house feels fresh and ready for a new year; everything is back to business as kids resumed school this week. But the Church celebrates Christmas until now. I wonder why that is, especially since the story of the Lord's baptism isn't part of any of the infancy narratives we have about Christ. It seems like an odd thing to make sure to include in the season, especially when we do have a story of Jesus being presented in the Temple as an infant. Why is this?

A little light googling led me to an interesting read and a short video worth listening to. I am including the link at the end of this piece, in case you would like

to hear it for yourself. I especially gleaned a lot about the beauty and importance of the Lord's baptism, when it is clear to all of us that Christ doesn't **need** to be baptized (in the same way that we need to be baptized in order to be freed from the death of sin to have eternal life with God). But there were two important notes for me about why this important moment, 30 years after Christ's birth, belongs in the Christmas season:

- Because Jesus does not, in fact, need to be baptized to have eternal life with God, his baptism is a true act of humility. In this moment, Jesus models for us his submission of his will to the will of the Father, and his desire to devote his life to fulfilling the Father's plan. Since the Nativity of the Lord is also a celebration of Christ's humble sacrifice so that we may be reunited with the Father, it is fitting that we remember these great feasts together.
- There are three major revelations about God in the Christmas season. The first is the Incarnation: that God would allow himself to be born as one of us. The second is the Epiphany, when Jesus is revealed as the Messiah and the king of Israel. And the third: the revelation of the Trinity, which is shown to us in the moment of Christ's baptism. We hear the Father speak, the Holy Spirit shows his presence, and Jesus is declared the Beloved Son. The inclusion of this moment in the Christmas season means that God reveals all parts of himself to us throughout this season something I don't often consider. This season isn't **just** about the baby.

There is so much more that we can ponder about the wonder of Baptism - how it changed Christ's life, and how it changes ours. In a season of resolutions to do better, be better, it is worth considering how we can better fulfill our Baptismal call moving into this year. 
