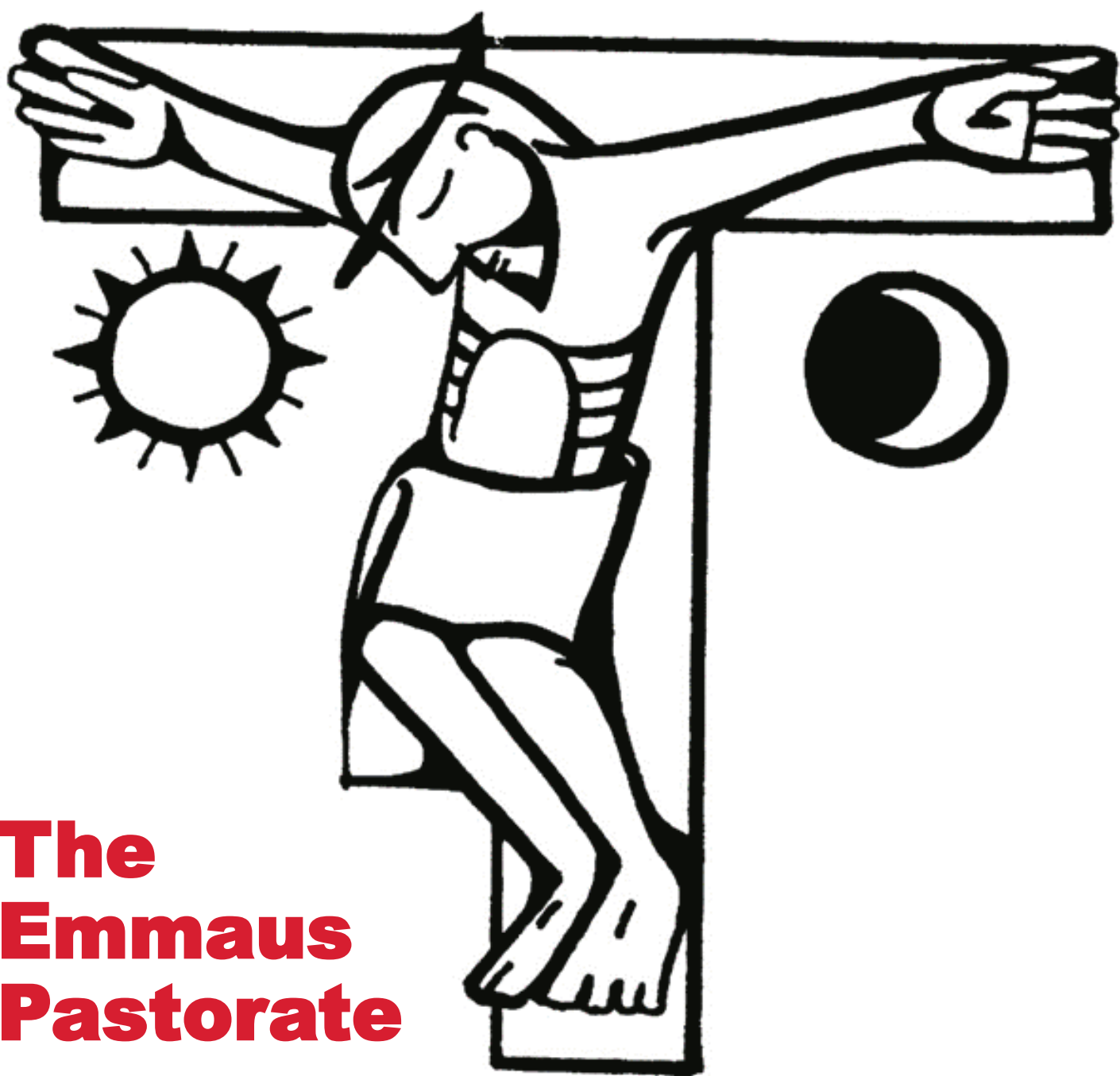

WHAT ABOUT THAT SYNOD SURVEY? Last Friday we received an initial report from the Archdiocese of Dubuque concerning the SYNOD SURVEY.

We wanted to pass along the news of this great response, as they take on processing the mountain of information. Note that *the average percentage of the Archdiocese was 21%, which the Emmaus Pastorate parishes surpassed with flying colors!* Thank you for your interest and concern as we look to the future of faith in these 450 square miles that we call “home.”

Emmaus Pastorate Results

- Sacred Heart/Volga—40 returned (56% of registered households)
- St. Mark/Edgewood—152 returned (52% of registered households)
- St. Joseph/Elkader—116 returned (42% of registered households)
- St. Patrick/Colesburg—38 returned (40% of registered households)
- St. Mary/Strawberry Point—46 returned (28% of registered households)

We had 15,577 lay surveys returned which represents 21% of all registered households in the archdiocese. In addition, there were 195 ordained surveys returned (100 deacons, 95 priests), plus 205 from religious communities. There were a total of 15,977 surveys returned. This is an excellent return rate, especially given the length of our survey. This far surpassed what we expected.

Mass Changes in the Shadow of COVID-19

Let me say that nothing in seminary ever prepared me or any of my confreres for the challenges of a pandemic! Everyone (including me) had their opinions about what should or should not be done. Tensions ran high, we were deluged with information and changing directives. There were spirited discussions about Holy Water, Holy Communion reception, masks, social distancing and the like. Early on, I enlisted help from professionals (whom we called "COVID CENTRAL") who could track, interpret and give advice regarding Pastorate practices. Three nurses and an administrative professional for a school district gave much time and effort to monitoring weekly infection rates and balancing directives from our own Archdiocese, as well as translating CDC information into something I could understand. I am indebted to these women for their care and concern for our parishioners, as well as their invaluable advice. And while some people made it abundantly clear what other parishes were doing, at all times I followed the directives which came from our archdiocese and Archbishop Jackels, in consultation with our COVID-Central committee. We wore masks. We social distanced. We received Holy Communion in the hand (only) and discontinued receiving from the cup. This was not the time for individual personal piety, but for the safety of the common good. We sanitized pews and bathrooms. We ran the furnace and ceiling fans and aired out the churches after each Mass. We shut off water coolers. I admit, it wasn't pretty, and some people were angry and went elsewhere—some stopped attending altogether. I am sorry if you found yourself in that category. Please know that I did what was asked of me, not my opinion or what others were doing. Our Pastorate did everything it could to help mitigate this scourge, and there were even some folks from other places who came to us because they felt safer than in their own parishes. Thank you for doing as well as you did during those challenging months. Christ will bless our charity.

But the times, they are a changing.

The Congregation for Divine Worship in the Vatican, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops and our Archdiocese of Dubuque are loosening pandemic guidelines and any restrictions which were in place for Holy Week 2021.

Practically speaking, this means:

- Holy Water will be restored to fonts at Easter
- Holy Communion may again be received on the tongue or in the hand
- Beginning Holy Thursday, communicants will again have the option of receiving Precious Blood from the cup if they choose

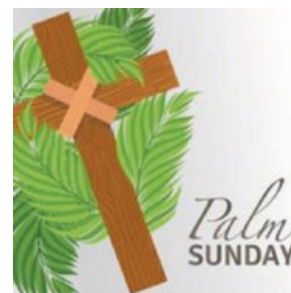
- And as always, those who are sick should stay home, or not receive Holy Communion on the tongue or from the cup, as common sense would dictate. Those who are immunocompromised or have other concerns are still welcomed to wear masks and our Christian charity will not judge.

Let us enter in to this Holy Week 2022 with more prayer and zeal than ever before.

Have you heard about the changes recently announced at the Vatican?

The new plan, a 54-page document issued Saturday (March 19), is titled "Praedicate Evangelium" (Preach the Gospel). It replaces "Pastor Bonus" (Good Pastor), promulgated by St. John Paul II in 1988. It consolidates several offices, opens major roles to laity and urges greater decentralization. "The Roman Curia," the document states, "does not stand between the pope and the bishops, but rather places itself at the service of both in ways that are proper to the nature of each."



The Vatican bureaucracy has always had a reputation for moving at a glacial pace because of bureaucratic inertia and a general opposition to change. Every Vatican bureaucrat has traditionally opposed reform, or any reduction in his responsibilities and power, citing his familiarity with the issues and the likelihood that change will cause catastrophic problems.

Incremental changes have been introduced in the Curia since "Pastor Bonus" in 1988, occasioned by financial and clerical sex abuse scandals. The Congregation for Doctrine of the Faith took on the horrendous task of dealing with the latter, while Pope Benedict XVI agreed to align the Vatican bank with Moneyval's anti-money laundering rules and the Supervisory and Financial Information Authority (ASIF) was created to prevent and counter money laundering. A new Secretariat for the Economy was also created under Pope Francis in 2010 to supervise and strengthen Vatican finances. He also ordered the Secretariat of State to give up control of its investments to APSA, the Vatican's sovereign wealth manager, two years ago.

During his papacy, Francis has also merged offices. The Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development combined four pontifical councils: Justice and Peace, Pastoral Care of Migrants and Itinerant People, Pastoral Assistance to Health Care Workers, and Cor Unum. More mergers are in the latest reform, for instance, the merging of the Council for Promoting the New Evangelization with the Congregation for Evangelization of Peoples. This office is to reflect on "the history of evangelization and mission, especially in their relations with the political, social and cultural events that have marked and conditioned the preaching of the Gospel." It will also help local churches in the "process of inculturating the Good News of Jesus Christ in different cultures and ethnic groups, and helping their evangelization, with particular attention to expressions of popular piety." The creation of the new Dicastery for the Service of Charity reflects Francis' concern for the poor.

Potentially the biggest change in "Praedicate Evangelium" is its opening of top positions in the Vatican to laypeople. This could have monumental impact if truly implemented. Underlying all of these changes are the values Francis has been preaching since the beginning of his papacy: his desire for a more inclusive and listening church that is missionary in outlook. Francis wants a Curia that listens to and serves the whole church in its mission of evangelization and service to the poor. He believes that authority should be more decentralized in the church, which means that bishops' conferences should be taken seriously. If these values become inculturated in the Curia, then his reform will be a success. Francis has tried to reform the culture and organization of the Vatican, but like the church, it should be "semper reformanda" — always reforming.

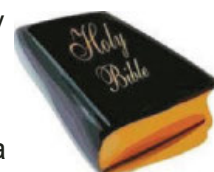
Prayer Service for Ukraine—

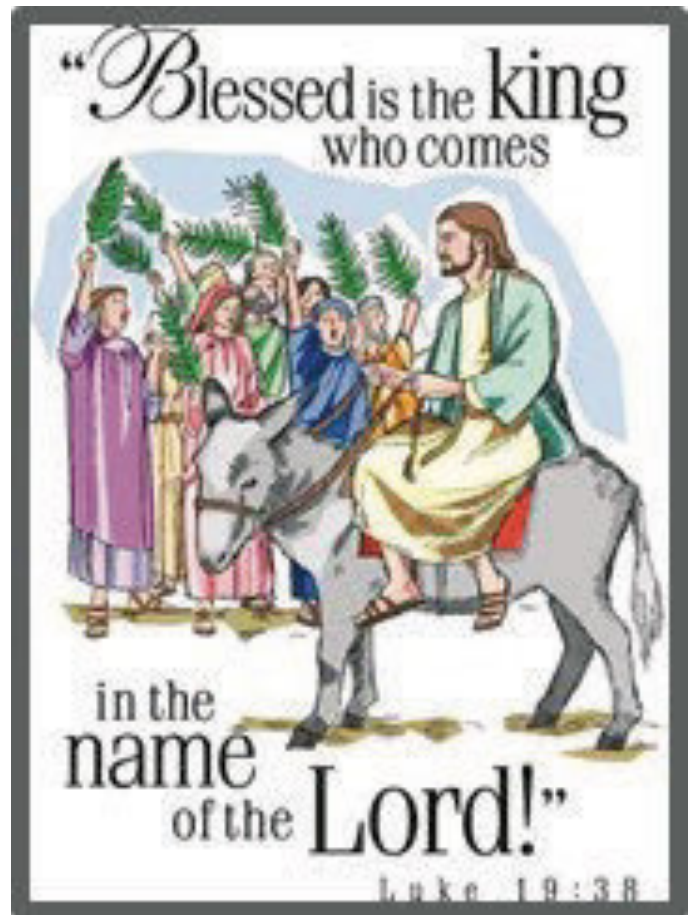
