


Not only do these trips help teach participants how to navigate the bus system, but these trips also facilitate the integration of all participants forming a wonderful community promoting friendships, support, and understanding The program was on hold during 2020 due to the Covid-19 pandemic. In 2021, the program resumed with one trip to the Madison Senior Center for the Health and Resource Fair. Sarah is both a survivor and a victim who has experienced lifelong injuries yet has never received compensation. As stated in The Fifth Little Girl: "Sarah is a living legend that is currently cleaning homes to pay for the ongoing medical bills that still remain as a result of the bombing." Despite this Sarah is still glad to be a helping hand: "Sharing my story with the youth and teaching them that even through tragedy and struggle, there is always hope during the journey of life."

Mary Odell used Dick's information with Lori Kalnicky's assistance to create the PowerPoint presentation.

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Outreaching Dane County – FGP's Postcard Pen Pal Program By Dick Russell

Like so many activities in 2020, our Foster Grandparent Program's in-person tutoring came to a quick halt. RSVP, FGP, and so many other volunteer organizations had to pivot to new and varied ways to engage volunteers and keep them in contact with RSVP and each other. In the midst of this backdrop, a beautiful opportunity appeared and presented an unforeseen collaboration.

Local Beginnings

As the 2021-22 school year was starting, Chávez Elementary School and our Foster Grandparent Program (FGP, for short) began a paper-and-pencil postcard pen pal exchange. Every other week FGPs



send postcards to five Kindergarten classrooms, and every other week they receive responses from the students. The pen pals share things about themselves like hobbies and interests, and they also discuss themes like food, favorite activities, and talents. This exchange has promoted both reading and writing skills and has been a wonderful outreach opportunity for our FGP's. When this exchange began, no one had any idea how far it could actually reach.

Broader Outreach

The five Kindergarten classrooms FGPs exchange postcards with are part of the Dual Language Immersion Program, which means students learn both English and Spanish. One of the Kindergarten teachers in this program is Ms. Ana Luisa Roque Espinosa, and her sister, Ms. Blanca Estela Espinosa, an employee of Arthur Martorell Elementary School in Puebla, Mexico. Over the holidays, these sisters had conversations about this postcard exchange between Chávez Elementary and the Foster Grandparents. Upon returning to Mexico, Blanca discussed this program with her students in grades 4, 5, and 6. These energetic students wrote cards and Valentines and pleasantly surprised the FPGs! The FGPs sent cards in reply, and the students sent a couple pictures of themselves and a short video greeting in March. In early April, the FGPs will send bags that will contain some local postcards, colored pencils, and stickers, and the actual bags have been made by our Group Projects volunteers!



Waunakee Driver Believes in Service to Others By Mary Schmelzer

What measure Waunakee driver Leroy Adler has paid his rent in full! At the age of 17 years old, he graduated from high school and immediately signed up for the Army Reserves. He put in six months of active duty, celebrating his 18th birthday at boot camp. Within a month of returning from his six-month stint of active reserve duty, he was hired by American Family Insurance. He worked there while he fulfilled his reserve duty and eventually retired from American Family after 41 years of employment.

Around the time of his return from active duty, he reconnected with high school girlfriend Virginia. They were married in 1965 and enjoyed 51 years of marriage before Virginia passed away in 2016. The pair raised 2 daughters and a son and welcomed seven grandchildren and one great grandchild along the way.

As often happens, couples involve each other in one another's pursuits, which was the case when Virginia worked as an activities coordinator at a local nursing home and recruited Leroy as a



driver so the residents could attend Waunakee Community Band concerts. Leroy may have returned the favor during his 20-year involvement with the Lions Club, where he received their highest award for service.

"After I retired, I was talking with Jim Hellenbrand, who delivered meals, and he thought this would be a good job for me. I thought, 'You're right,' so I signed on," Adler said. "It wasn't long after that when someone asked me to drive passengers and I've been doing it ever since."

"You meet so many nice people doing this," he said. "They are so grateful. After you've given someone a ride a few times you develop a comfort level. And it's funny how things circle back to you, and you end up knowing someone in common. It's a small world, even though it's a big country."

In addition to driving passengers, Adler can often be found at the Waunakee Senior Center cookouts throughout the year acting as grill master. And he has devoted around 15 years to tending the landscaping around the four "Welcome to the only Waunakee in the World" signs – charged with planting annuals, replacing roses, trimming the grass and painting – sort of a "green thumb ambassador" to Waunakee!

Adler encourages people to consider driving. "It's doing a great service to people who need the extra help to get places," he said. "Consider it helping a neighbor or helping a friend!" The Driver Escort and Vets Helping Vets passenger services need drivers in the Waunakee area and in all Dane County communities. Drivers are offered reimbursement at .58.5 cents/mile and additional liability insurance. RSVP provides PPE supplies. Drivers and passengers must be fully vaccinated. The service operates weekdays, 8:30-am to 3:30pm.

Meet the Fitchburg Quilters!

he Fitchburg Quilters are one of thirteen active RSVP Group Projects groups that are currently meeting and producing handcrafted donations for Dane County. As the name suggests, this is a group of RSVP volunteer quilters that meet weekly at the Fitchburg Senior Center. Their meetings are not only a great social time, composed of worldly and warm volunteers, but they are highly efficient and organized! There are various quilting stations set up in their designated room within the center. There's a station for ironing, one for cutting, a couple for sewing, one for picking out backings/sorting fabrics, and one for tying and binding. It's a well-oiled machine. They are famous for making beautiful quilts that are 60" x 72", though they also make smaller quilts and contribute to the making of tote bags or other requested donations that require a sewing machine.

Jane Burkholder has been a volunteer in the Fitchburg Quilters for over 20 years! She taught herself how to quilt when her six children were young so she could make them each a handcrafted quilt. When she joined the group as a volunteer many years later, she was able to bring her experience and skills. On the other hand, the sister-team of this group, Sharlene Palmer and Carol Sutton, had zero experience in quilting before they began their RSVP volunteer journey around a decade ago. They are now skilled quilters and continue to come to the Fitchburg Quilters group meetings, even after moving to Portage and Wisconsin Dells in recent years. Kobra Habibpour has been coming to these group meetings for the past seven years so she can visit with her quilting friends, tie quilts, and practice her English. Micky Braun speaks three languages, always has a smile on her face, and joins the group each week because, "... They are all really good friends! I enjoy the company and coming here gives me somebody to talk to!.' Marlene Gruendler makes quilt tops and comes to the meetings to admire and coordinate fabrics for quilts, but most of all, she loves the coffee break at the end of the group meetings, where they sit, talk, and enjoy each other's company.

I asked the volunteers who were present at a Fitchburg Quilters group meeting in March of 2022

what they liked best about volunteering their time. While they all professed their fondness for the craft of quilting, there was a resounding theme of friendship and togetherness. They are always welcoming new volunteers (of all skill levels) to join in their efforts. According to Dane County Extension, using mulches helps to cool and protect soil and minimize evaporation. They also recommend keeping grass 3 to 4 inches high when mowing–nothing that longer grass develops more drought-resistant roots.

Jon E. Smith, A Specific Look into a Veteran Passenger's Remarkable Life By Lorrie Hylkema

on E. Smith, a U.S. Marine Corps Vietnam Combat Veteran, was born on the west side of Chicago from 1947 until moving to Madison in 1995. At a very early age, Jon was recruited to play for Major League Baseball's (MLB) LA Dodgers, served as an infantry soldier for the United States Marines, worked for Jerry "The Iceman" Butler, fathered seven children by the age of 25, took up a lucrative hobby of drawing and eventually wrote a book about his life called <u>Seven at</u> <u>Twenty-Five: Hooked on Hitting</u> published in 2020.

What is unique about Jon's story is that through all of the hardships and bad breaks, he managed to persevere and continue to represent his courageous image. Jon was an excellent baseball player. However, when he was being recruited to play for the big leagues, he was convinced by a local marine recruiter that he should join the Marines and play for the Marines' baseball team while in service to avoid being drafted. In the end, Jon ended up receiving a waiver to only serve six months in the Marines, then was sent to Vietnam and missed the opportunity to play baseball for the MLB or for the Marines.

Jon had an opportunity, from a friend who lived in Portland, Oregon, once out of the service, to move to Portland to finish writing a book. Jon took this opportunity to move, but soon after he moved he found out that his mother had a heart attack in Chicago. Sadly, after Jon left Portland to move back and help his mother in Chicago, she passed away a few years later in 1983. Jon says he believes she died of a broken heart when he moved to Portland. This unfortunate event delayed Jon's mission of writing a book for almost 17 years.

Upon his return to Chicago to be with his mother, Jon went through a dark period in his life. In addition to playing amateur league baseball, fathering seven children from four different mothers, and working several jobs, Jon almost committed suicide. During this time, despite his troubles, Jon worked as a valet for a blues singersongwriter and Chicago politician, named Jerry Butler. As part of this work, Jon met famous people, such as Mohammed Ali, Cab Calloway, Leslie Uggams, Nancy Wilson, Dionne Warwick, and Arethra Franklin. Getting an autograph was always a challenge for Jon, since Jon

was often too caught in the moment to remember to ask for an autograph. By the time Jon was near the deep end of his journey in Chicago, Jon managed to run into a former neighbor and friend, named Evelyn. Evelyn talked Jon into moving to Madison to continue working on writing his book and drawing, which was a hobby he picked up after he returned from Vietnam. Jon says "she saved my life. I wouldn't be here today if it wasn't for Evelyn."

As a result of moving to Madison, getting established in the community, and his connection with the veteran community, Jon was able to have his own self portrait made into a mural at the Veterans Museum downtown. Jon informed me of a write-up of this mural and his story as a black combat veteran written in the Capital City Hues e-newsletters on November 16, 2020 and January 25, 2021.

Jon is truly a self-made man who struggled with making decisions throughout his life and made it his own way. Jon's life is an inspiration and reminder that RSVP VHV volunteers serve veterans with interesting and honorable lives who struggle and come out ahead, in spite of themselves and their circumstances.

Volunteer Driver Carries on Mom's Commitment to Senior Center

Seeing things come full circle can be one of life's little pleasures. When volunteer Nancy Johnson retired from her 33-year career as a teacher, she turned to the Oregon Area Senior Center, following the example set by her own mom, who had made the senior center in Marquette, MI the hub of her senior years.

"I'm not sure the public is aware of all the services available at the senior center," Johnson said. "My husband and I got advice making social security decisions, and I borrowed equipment when I had two hip replacements last year. They serve meals, provide meal delivery, exercise classes, card playing, and so much more. I know my mom went to her senior center every day and I know I'll be using this place someday in the future."

Johnson turned to the senior center to find volunteer work right away after her retirement in 2008. Starting out, she delivered meals for the Home Delivered Meal program, and within months added driving passengers



to medical appointments to her schedule. Along the way she also worked in the adult day care program, providing support to staff and program participants. FRONT DESK RECEPTION

This is the focal point of the Madison Senior Center. MUST have computer/phone/office skills and experience. Shifts needed: Tuesday and Thursday from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m.

MUSICIAN

We have a number of opportunities for volunteers to perform for special events, play in unorganized jam sessions, and offer music instruction throughout the year. There are pianos on site but encourage any instruments.

LINE DANCE INSTRUCTOR

Dancers socialize online, practice advancing their skills, and improve their mood (have fun!). Turn your love of line dancing into a great volunteer role!

MULTI-LINGUAL PROGRAM LEADERS

If you are a multi-lingual person and would like to lead a program in an area in which you have expertise, we would love to talk with you. Learning about healthy aging and making it happen, should be available to anyone. A few program ideas we have are yoga, tai-chi, art, and healthy eating.

MODERATOR/HOST FOR BOOK CLUB

Are you a person of color who is excited about advancing racial equity and social justice? Help MSC pick books, formulate questions, and lead a monthly hour-long book club. This new book club will offer different perspectives. A minimum five - six-month commitment is required. This is a grassroots program, and it will be dependent on input from the facilitator.

SEWING HELPER

Many older adults either don't sew or are no longer physically able to do even basic mending. This would be a new service at the Senior Center, and it would include things like sewing on buttons, hemming pants/skirts, replacing zippers, and making alterations. We have three sewing machines, but you could use your own. The plan is to have this be a social experience at the Senior Center, but we will adapt as needed for the pandemic.

SECOND HARVEST FOOD BANK needs lots of hands to help sort and pack food boxes to be distributed to many food pantries! Work together with other volunteers in a safe environment at the Madison warehouse or at the Stoughton warehouse. Must be able to stand for lengths of time and may need to lift products weighing anywhere between 10 - 40 lbs. No one will be asked to lift more than they are comfortable with.

COMMUNITY ACTION COALITION needs help in their warehouse sorting food, cleaning, and assisting pantry shoppers with shopping and check out procedures. COMMUNITY ACTION COALITION GLEANERS also need volunteer drivers to pick up donated food from various places and deliver it to several food pantries and community centers around Madison and Dane County.

Greet visitors, answer questions, provide directions, answer phones. Must be patient, non-judgmental, and have basic computer skills. Two-hour shifts to fit your schedule. Training and support provided.

Johnson and her husband Roger have been married for 40 years and are an active pair who put in a lot of time on the pickle ball court, walking, biking and playing cards with their big group of friends. And like many of today's grandparents, they pitch in to occasionally babysit their grandchildren. With all that, Johnson still finds time to drive passengers. "I love the flexibility of this volunteer job," said Johnson. "If you're busy you can say no, but really it doesn't take much of your day to help someone. And it is good for the soul and good for others, so it's a win-win." Johnson's mother would no doubt, love to see this connection to the senior center carried on!
