RSVP of Dane County receives the 2022 Governor's Service Award - AmeriCorps Seniors Program of the Year!

"Founded in 1972, RSVP of Dane County has grown into one of the largest RSVP programs in the nation. RSVP of Dane County AmeriCorps Seniors volunteers have contributed over 8 million service hours to Dane County over the last 50 years. Despite the challenges caused by the COVID-19 pandemic, in 2021 alone, 1,021 AmeriCorps Seniors volunteers served 121,777 hours helping Dane County residents in need. Through service at numerous programs and over 90 sites, AmeriCorps Seniors RSVP volunteers serve people of all ages, help nonprofit and public agencies maintain and extend their services, and help older adults remain independent and in their own homes."

Also, during the Governor's Service Awards ceremony on May 26th, twenty-six RSVP of Dane County volunteers were recognized for volunteering 20 years. These awards represent the dedicated service of our wonderful volunteers, board, and staff! We are honored to receive this recognition during our 50th Anniversary year!

Hilda is part of the Middleton Glen RSVP group which is composed of volunteers who reside at the Middleton Glen Retirement Community. Hilda says this new group, which started during the pandemic, serves a wonderful purpose because the knitting can be done at home.

Hilda moved to Middleton Glen 22 years ago to be closer to her daughter after her husband passed away. Prior to the move, she lived in Washington, PA, near Pittsburgh. In college she majored in home economics and after marrying her husband, Jim, she moved with him to the Washington D.C. area where Jim served at Fort Meade and the Pentagon during WW II. After the war Hilda and Jim moved back to Pennsylvania. She was a busy stay-at-home mom, but she found time to help with a poverty program at Penn State University, and she also volunteered for more than 20 years at Washington Hospital. Coming from a poor, rural area and living through the Great Depression and the war, Hilda knew that her volunteer service was needed. In addition to four children, Hilda has seven grandchildren and eight great grandchildren.

Hilda learned to knit when she was in high school but had not knitted for many years. She was amazed that when she started knitting again it "came right back." And knitting can be therapeutic. One woman who just started knitting at Middleton Glen says she needs this activity to help her hands; it is better than using an exercise ball! Hilda heard about this knitting group at Middleton Glen through Jo Hershberger (a fellow resident), who started this informal group of neighbors after realizing that there are many people who love to sew, crochet, and knit right in their community! 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RSVP Vets Helping Vets and Great Lakes Dryhootch by Lorrie Hylkema

Great Lakes Dryhootch officially opened its doors on November 26, 2021, but due to the COVID-19 pandemic it was not able to have its grand opening until June. Great Lakes Dryhootch is a meeting space for active military, veterans, and families or supporters that is meant to be free of drugs and alcohol. RSVP Vets Helping Vets (VHV) has had a long-standing partnership with Dryhootch to provide services to veterans.

On April 15th, VHV volunteer drivers participated in a gathering at the new Great Lakes Dryhootch space at 1324 E. Washington Ave. on the first floor of The Valor building. Joseph Frey, Great Lakes Dryhootch's Transportation Manager, graciously greeted RSVP veteran volunteers and staff. Frey also gave us a brief but spectacular tour of his space, which includes a coffee bar, large conference room, and an open space for social gatherings. The walls are full of military related murals for each branch of service, and the entrance way even includes pictures and a history of the founding of Great Lakes Dryhootch by Vietnam combat veteran Bob Curry. Frey explained to us that this space is already holding at least two groups a week for veterans who have PTSD. Thus far, 20 of the 63 units designated for veterans and their families to live in townhouses or standard housing units behind and above the gathering space are occupied. Since opening the doors, Frey has

been working to hire another driver for veterans and family members to take to appointments and necessary stops such as at a grocery, food pantry, and for banking. Frey also hired a veteran barista full time for the coffee bar, David Walenbach. David was able to be present at the open house and graciously made coffee for us that day.

A total of eight RSVP veteran volunteer drivers attended this gathering and were able to meet up, share a meal and drink some uplifting Great Lakes Dryhootch coffee or water. Pictured above are five out of the eight veterans who attended. Bob Topel gave a brief history of the founding of VHV program in 2012. He highlighted the help and support the VFW Post 8216 in Middleton has provided from the beginning of the VHV program.

On May 16th, the first open house for local Quartermasters and Commanders of the American Legion (AL) and Veteran of Foreign Wars (VFW) posts was also held at the Great Lakes Dryhootch in Madison. The purpose of the event was two-fold: first, to talk about and tour the new Great Lakes Dryhootch gathering space. The second purpose was to introduce and talk about the need for more volunteer drivers for the VHV program. Attendees included Stan Hook, Commander of the AL Post 385 in Verona; Denise Rohan, former first female National Commander of the American Legion and current member of AL Post 385; and Ron Loresch, Quartermaster of VFW Post 7591, located on Cottage Grove Road in Madison. In addition, Dave Mahoney, who is a volunteer driver for RSVP's VHV and Home Delivered Meals at the Colonial Club, was also present. Dave is a member of the VFW Post 9362 in Sun Prairie and a First Sergeant of the Wisconsin Chapter of the National Sojourners.

Each FGP selected a picture to keep, and a couple of these pictures will be displayed in the RSVP office. This has been a fun connection between these students and our Foster Grandparents!



Computer Buddies at Deerfield Elementary School by Jen Roth

"Penpals" is what we called ourselves in olden days when we corresponded with a potential new friend through letters. Remember the thrill of receiving an envelope from some distant place and opening it to find a handwritten letter full of news – just for you? Remember the thrill of responding to that letter with one of your own and mailing it off to Paris, or Miami, or Tokyo, or some other distant, exotic place?

"E-penpals" is what we might call ourselves nowadays when we're communicating with a special someone far away via email, texting, or blogging. And it's still a thrill to correspond back and forth; only today it's much easier: all you need is a computer! Communication is always right at our fingertips.

For many years, RSVP has hosted an "e-penpal" program we call Computer Buddies, pairing older volunteers with elementary students in Deerfield, DeForest, and Cambridge schools (and hopefully more in the future as our program evolves). How does it work? Once a week our volunteer, say "Anne," blogs to a designated student, say "Izzy," who reads and responds to Anne's message. Blogging is safe and secure since it takes place through a platform mediated by RSVP and the classroom teachers as well. The exchange might go something like this:

Student Izzy: "Good news. We got the Hibiscus! I love it so much! It makes it look so tropical even though it's just Wisconsin. Your neighbors have flowers; mine have pigs, birds, egg chickens, meat chickens, even bees! They are so cute; I love the pigs the most. They raise them from babies. I love them!

Volunteer Anne: "Hibiscus plants and their flowers are gorgeous! I agree about them giving a lovely tropical feeling. Many of my neighbors have flowers out on their balconies now, too, and it is so amazing to see the different colors and shapes of the plants."

Our Computer Buddies program was especially valuable during the pandemic when schools weren't open to volunteers. This past semester, 45 RSVP volunteers developed a blogging relationship with 49 students at Deerfield Elementary School, corresponding with them weekly "from computer to computer". Was it fun? Interesting? Meaningful? Yes, indeed! Here are a few responses from our Buddies:

Says Kate: "Imagine the cross-generational conversations! What fun it is to communicate via a blog with a 4th grader! It is one of the highlights of my week. When before (if ever) have I been asked, 'what is your favorite childhood candy?' How often does anyone inquire, "Kate, what do you like to do in your free time?" My buddy and I have developed a great rapport this semester—exchanging thoughts, for example, about children's books we both have read. I am learning so much from my buddy, Alexis."

Says Betsy: "I enjoyed the interactions with the students, watching our relationship grow, and their writing skills progress. I'm glad we didn't meet until later, so they didn't have any preconceived (stereotypical or negative) ideas about older adults. Then it was fun to meet in person, after months of exchanging messages about each of our respective fun and activity-filled lives."

Computer Buddies at Deerfield Elementary School

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Says Anne: "Canaan wrote often about playing outside, playing computer games, and doing things with his dad. When I met him, it was fun to see what he looks like, and how energetic he and his friends are ... When I asked if he was looking forward to summer, he said, 'Not really. I like school ... well, not really math, but the rest of school."

Under the pavilion, on that cold May day, Buddies young and old grouped up to learn more about each other and then shared with the entire group assembled. It was a magical experience!



Says volunteer Lucy: "On the day of our "Meet and Greet" at the end of the year, my buddy entered the park shelter calling my name over and over. His classmates helped him locate me and it was a great experience... mile."

The program would not have been possible (nor successful) without the leadership and fullhearted support of the three fourth-grade teachers at Deerfield – Kim Hansen, Rory Meyer, and Nate Karraker – who learned the tech aspects of the blogging platform, built the program into their curriculum, set a designated time in class each week for blogging, and monitored the activity.

Says Kim: "I loved the relationships that my students made with their buddies. Many of them wanted to continue writing each other after the program is over. I also loved that they felt comfortable sharing things with their buddies that I didn't even know about."

"The computer buddy program developed into one of my favorite activities. I began the semester with one buddy who was a great writer and I got to know her pretty well over the course of the semester. Late in the semester I got a second buddy who was more of a reluctant writer but wrote much more about himself as the weeks passed by. I really enjoyed watching his growth."

Each crafter would knit/crochet a square (or several squares) and then they would crochet the squares together to make a blanket. Every blanket was a heartfelt piece of art that connected each member of the group to the blanket's recipient. The group slowly grew in members, eventually reaching an RSVP volunteer, Lorna Everson, who shared her experiences about RSVP. Before long, the group members were officially RSVP volunteers. They continue piecing squares together to make blankets and shawls, but they now also make whatever they like from the Group Projects Request Form, and their efforts are able to reach more people in the community. Because of this group, Hilda has "gotten to know so many new people and it's a rewarding activity!" The group shares their life stories and have the common thread of both residence and craftsmanship. Hilda says, "Friendships start with ASKING questions, then asking again and again until you really know someone!" She is a skilled scarf-maker but also a skilled friend. We are fortunate to have Hilda and ALL the members of the Middleton Glen group in our RSVP family. Hilda, thanks for proving that you are never too old to start volunteering with RSVP!

It is both an honor and a privilege for the Area Agency (AAA) of Dane County to write this letter of support and wholeheartedly endorse the nomination of RSVP of Dane County for the 2022 Governor's Service Award in the category of AmeriCorps Senior Program of the Year.

The first senior volunteer program in Wisconsin, under the Administration on Aging as part of the Older American's Act, RSVP of Dane County was established in 1972 – and celebrates 50 years of service to Wisconsin this year. A milestone reached by few organizations, it is a testament to the agility of the organization to repeatedly invent and sustain meaningful opportunities for older adults to contribute, lead, and thrive through volunteerism in our community.

The AAA and the entire aging network of service providers could not provide the level of services needed to older adults without RSVP volunteers. This has been true since the inception of home delivered meals, congregate meals, driver escorted medical rides, cooperative education regarding elder abuse through TRIAD volunteers, foster grandparents, and intergenerational opportunities with youth in our schools. Their involvement is even more critical today.

As the COVID-19 pandemic continued during 2021, the risk of social isolation among older adults reached all-time highs. Volunteering has been proven to reduce isolation and ease loneliness by connecting older adults to people in need. During 2021, over 900 RSVP volunteers and 16 Foster Grandparents were instrumental in delivering meals and groceries to impacted older adults, private vehicle rides to essential medical appointments, and helping our youngest read by using remote learning platforms. Making facemasks, warm caps, mittens and blankets continued without a beat. Without the involvement of senior volunteers recruited and trained by RSVP, our older adults in need throughout Dane County would have suffered to meet even basic needs.

RSVP has long been a critical partner in making services available to older adults in Dane County. I cannot think of another agency more deserving of recognition. The RSVP Senior Volunteer Program matches those who can with those in need to the benefit of both. Thank you for considering the outstanding and critical work of RSVP Dane County for a 2022 Governor's Service Award.
