



God Did Not Spare His Own Son

Behind our high-altar here at St. Joan of Arc is a stained glass window, which is not visible from where most of you are seated. It is a bit dark and spooky: an hour glass filled with black sand, which is about to run out. The hour glass has wings, indicating that life is flying away, and that we each must soon depart. Also within this image is an oil stock, because this window represents what the Church used to call “extreme unction,” or “last rites.” This window reminds us of our mortality. While we all know that one day we will die, we normally keep the thought of it out of our minds, hoping to postpone death as long as possible.

During Lent this year, we are focusing on finding peace in our souls. Death is one of those things which keeps us from enjoying true peace, and yet, this season of Lent is all about exploring the mystery of death. It ends with the Sacred Triduum of Holy Thursday, when our Lord Jesus was arrested and condemned to die on the cross. On Good Friday, we stand at the foot of the cross as the Son of God lays down His life to save the world. And, on Easter Sunday, we celebrate His resurrection from the dead, and our hope in eternal life for ourselves in the Heavenly Kingdom. But even with this hope, death haunts us in many ways.

For some, the thought of no longer existing on this earth is terrifying. Or, if they are not worried about their own death, they fear the loss of those they love. Other people worry not so much about dying, but instead, they fear the thought of suffering and pain, for themselves or their loved-ones. These fears keep us from having true peace in our souls. Another aspect of dealing with our own mortality is the sense of not having enough time. As the hour glass window states, “time is running out.” Living with a sense that the clock is ticking robs our hearts of peace. Connected to this is the fear that life will end before we have discovered, or accomplished, our life’s true purpose. We fear the thought that at the moment of death, we will look back at our lives and find they had no meaning, or that life was wasted. So, how do we find peace in the midst of such fears?

In our second reading, St. Paul declares, “(God) did not spare his own Son, but handed Him over for us all; how will He not also give us everything else along with Him?” In giving to us His Son, God has given us everything! Nothing is held back from us: all that God has made, and in fact, His own life, is ours! We are full; we lack nothing. Our

mortality makes us feel limited, small, perhaps insignificant. But Jesus has entered into our human nature, and even into our mortality and made it His own. When we suffer, Jesus suffers; when we die, Jesus dies: and by His death, death is destroyed, for He is the source of life itself.

How do we fully embrace this truth and find peace? God tested Abraham (the great ancestor of Jesus) by asking him to sacrifice his only son. Because Abraham had such faith in God to give, and to restore life, he obeyed. But before the sacrifice was carried out, God provided a substitute: a lamb, which foreshadowed Jesus. God would spare Abraham's son, but He would not spare His own Son. Because of God's gift, the power of death is destroyed for us, and in Baptism, we have already passed over from death to life.

Peter wanted to stay with Jesus on the Mount of Transfiguration to keep Him from going to the cross. Peter's attempt to prevent Jesus' death was in opposition to God's plan. So, God declared to Peter, "This is my Son: listen to Him!" We only find peace when we listen to Jesus, and when we, like Abraham, offer ourselves and our loved-ones totally to Him in faith. In listening to Jesus, and by our total self-offering to Him, we find life's true purpose and fulfillment. When we offer Jesus even our death, and our fear of death, we have no more reason to fear. Instead, our hearts find abundant peace, as we trust fully in God, who did not spare His own Son.

THIS WEEK AT ST. JOAN OF ARC



Fridays during Lent are very active days here at St. Joan of Arc Church as we offer many devotions in addition to our daily Friday Mass. Adoration begins at 12:00 pm and runs until 6:00. Come join the adorers who have discovered the gift of *just being* with our Lord. (This devotion is also available on Tuesday mornings from 7:00-8:00 AM for those who prefer morning praise time.) At 6:00 PM we have recitation of the Rosary. At 6:30 PM Fr. Guy will offer Mass. Stations of the Cross are scheduled for 7:00 PM and these are followed by Benediction. The evening usually wraps up by 7:45 PM. Some parishioners and guests can stop for only fifteen minutes of adoration and others can stay for several hours. We invite you to check your schedule and pencil in some quality time with your Lord and Savior.



To continue the recommended health practice of not holding large gatherings, the North Deanery will not convene the usual Lenten Penance Service this year. However, Fr. Roberts will offer additional time to hear **confessions** on March 12, 19, and 26 from 4:30 –6:00 PM. The regular Saturday confession time begins at 4:30 PM.



We remind you that Fridays in Lent are days of **abstinence** which means those over the age of 14 years are asked to refrain from eating meat.

The Athletic Department congratulates the Boys Cadet B Basketball Team who brought home a huge trophy for their achievement of being Tournament runner-up. Now it


