



The Foolishness of God

St. Paul tells us “the foolishness of God is wiser than human wisdom.” Is Paul implying that God is sometimes foolish? Certainly not. God is perfect within Himself, and all that He does is the expression of perfect divine wisdom. Rather, it is human beings who are foolish, as we often think we are wiser than God, and that our way is better than God’s way. In our second reading, Paul says it is the message of Christ crucified which seems foolish to the world, and yet, Jesus Christ crucified demonstrates the power and the wisdom of God.

During Lent this year we are examining those things which keep our souls from having peace, and how we may find true peace through a life of turning our hearts back to God. Jesus once said, “No man can serve two masters.” For many of us, the problem is not serving two masters, but a multitude of masters. We stay busy trying to please lots of people, trying to look good, striving to make money, to provide for all the material wants and needs of our families, never able to stay focused on any one thing for very long. We try to live in a way which is acceptable by the standards of popular opinion, or of what is politically correct. And, when we dare to express our Catholic beliefs, or choose to follow the teachings of our faith, we are in danger of being criticized or dismissed as religious fanatics.

So, which of these two ways is more foolish: the way of the world, which is constantly changing its standards and its definition of what is true and good; or the way of God, which is always constant, and eternally true? It is foolish to try to please the world, or to seek lasting peace in worldly things. For the way of the world is continually robbing us of peace. But the way of God brings peace to our souls, for His way forms us in the image of Jesus: and there never lived a human being more at peace with God, with creation, or with Himself, than Jesus. But the world looked upon Jesus as foolish, and those who follow His teachings closely are considered foolish in our own time. So, how does following the way of Jesus, being guided by a higher law, bring us peace?

The Ten Commandments are God’s prescription for living a happy and peaceful life. The first three teach us how to live in peace with God: worship God alone, keep God’s name holy, and honor the Sabbath Day. The remaining Commandments show us how to live in peace with

one another: respect our parents, do not kill, do not commit adultery, do not steal, do not bear false testimony, covet nothing which belongs to someone else. We can change the “do nots” to “respect,” as in “respect all life,” “respect the sanctity of the marriage covenant,” “respect the property of others,” and “respect the reputation of others.” To go against any of these Commandments makes our conscience uneasy, and robs our souls of peace. Keeping them brings peace to our souls, and this peace flows outward like a life-giving stream into the world around us.

But to keep these Commandments perfectly requires more than human effort: it requires divine grace. For Jesus defines the perfect keeping of the Commandments as loving God with all our heart, soul, mind, and strength, and loving our neighbor as ourselves. He also says, “Love one another as I have loved you.” Jesus has shown His love by the total gift of His life to us. Only by removing all the clutter of worldly things from the Temple of our hearts do we have room for Jesus. And, when our hearts have enthroned Him, and His life and ours have become one, then we have lasting peace. We do not worry about pleasing the world, but only about pleasing God. Then we are serving only one Master. And while it may seem foolish to the world, it is the way of Jesus Christ: the power and wisdom of God. May His peace abide in our hearts always!

Fridays during Lent are very active days here at St. Joan of Arc Church as we offer many devotions in addition to our daily Friday Mass. Adoration begins at 12:00 pm and runs until 6:00. Come join the adorers who have discovered the gift of *just being* with our Lord. (This devotion is also available every Tuesday morning from 7:00-8:00 AM for those who prefer morning praise time.) At 6:00 PM we have recitation of the Rosary. At 6:30 PM Fr. Guy will offer Mass. Stations of the Cross are scheduled for 7:00 PM and these are followed by Benediction. The evening usually wraps up by 7:45 PM. Some parishioners and guests can stop in for only fifteen minutes of Adoration and others can stay for several hours. Dear Parishioners and Visitors,

School is hopping with a buzz as teachers excitedly share the good news about improvements in student writing. This should not be a surprise to them due to all the work we have been doing during PLCs (Professional Learning Committees) throughout the year. Over the course of several benchmark writing tests, teachers have evaluated data and prepared lessons that directly target areas for improvement. School-wide writing practices also contribute to this overall success. RACE is an acronym everyone knows to utilize when responding to a written response prompt or anytime they write, really. It stands for: Restate the Question, Answer the Question, Cite Evidence and Explain.

Student conferencing, which focuses on direct feedback during the progression of the piece rather than waiting until the product is completed has proved highly effective. We are teaching the art of revision and discouraging writing to get it done rather than writing to communicate properly. Another writing practice in place, RUTAPR, (pronounced ru-ta-per) equips students with the skills to respond to a longer writing prompt so that he or she better understands the expectation. Read the prompt, Underlying keywords, Topic, Author's purpose, Prewrite/plan and Re-read to ensure everything is covered. SJOA parents, look out for Tuesday Topics for updates and examples.


