



Deeper Understanding of Scripture

“Spiraling out of control,” is a phrase that can easily describe the current display of human existence. In addition to the violence, unrest, uneasiness and turmoil that are common elements of our daily news, other essential pieces are misplaced or missing. Many lack an objective center around which to order and structure their lives or a clear set of definable goals or mores to act as guideposts and life directives. It appears that “feelings” have become a “new god” and traditional structures and ideals set aside. It is almost as if history only shows that we got this whole thing wrong and many are determined to finally set things right. The real truth, however, is that while wrongs and errors are certainly a part of our often-checked past, it is hardly the case that all was wrong. It is not our task to rewrite the history of our lives, but to learn from mistakes that were made, and preserve the

perennial wisdom at the root of our successes. Learning is an essential part of being human.

The question becomes, however, from whom do we learn? Some have such a hard time placing God in that position, but that is precisely where God needs to be. God is the Master Teacher from whom all of humanity learns and gets its cues. It is in and through this relationship with the Gardener of Life that we are fashioned and pruned into the people we are intended to be and can be. It is only in God that we are able to find our best selves. Sadly, many think that religion too, as well as history in general, has also gotten all this wrong. Yet, our resurrection faith tells us differently. We are reminded, today especially, that we are meant to remain in Christ as Christ remains in us. We are also reminded that Jesus, the Incarnate God, is the vine upon which we grow, the branch-

es that flow from the source of God’s life.

Giving up our will to God’s can be a painful endeavor. It is not easy to set our own desires and wants aside and allow God to step in and direct and guide our growth. But this is the only way to prevent deadly weeds from overtaking us and bringing us to a place of self-destruction. God’s commandments are the very guideposts and benchmarks we need, yet many seek to remove them from all public view because they appear to limit self-expression and suppress what is considered by many to be “human freedom.” They are the only way we can find freedom, however. And, until we learn this fundamental lesson, we will continue to spiral out of control, never really knowing who we are, what our potential can be or how life really can be lived. We will not know peace.



Only united with the vine can its branches bear fruit

Jesus uses the image of the vine and the branches to describe our relationship with him. The image is rich in meaning. Anyone who has visited a vineyard can readily grasp the richness of this image. If you go as harvest approaches you will see vast lines of carefully tended vines full of grapes. Rows and rows of deep green vines riddled with clusters of fruit ready to be picked.

If you go in the months following harvest you will see large numbers of laborers cutting the vines down to their core. It is pruning time, a necessary step in the cycle of growth. The pruning process allows the vines to mature so to bear a better quality fruit in the following season.

If you go in the winter the vines will have been pruned and the stumps protrude from the earth like gnarly stumps or dead trees. The vines look barren but they are alive. At this time of year the old vines are clearly distinct from the newer ones. Grape vines can live up to 150 years. As they grow the base becomes large and the branches look like those of trees. The younger ones look fragile and delicate.

What we don't see is the growth below the earth, roots that can get to be as long as 15 feet. These roots hold the plant firmly in the earth from which they draw water and nutrients for the vine.

"I am the vine, you are the branches," Jesus says to his disciples past and present. The image captures the reality we celebrate, in a special way, during the Easter season. We have become one with Christ through our union with him in baptism.

Looking at the vine in full growth we can distinguish branches from stem but cannot think of them apart. We see it as one unit, one plant. Indeed if the branch is somehow severed from the vine it will wither up and die. The

branches going forth from the vine will grow and bear much fruit precisely because they are connected with the vine. It is through the vine that that plant is hydrated and fed. A cut in the connection will damage the flow of nutrients. A break of the connection will lead to death.

The image brings to mind the union we share with Christ Jesus and the life that flows from him to us. The relationship is life giving.

Jesus further says: "Whoever remains in me and I in him will bear much fruit, because without me you can do nothing." The life that flows from Christ to us is one that in addition to giving us life produces something in us. The relationship is not only sustained through this union but can grow.

Just as the vine grows strong and great over the many years of its life, our relationship with Jesus can grow and develop. One of the amazing things is that in this relationship the fruit that is borne will become a source of nourishment and help for others. When Jesus speaks of this fruit he is speaking of qualities such as compassion, mercy, faithfulness, kindness, hopefulness, charity and love.

Jesus also speaks of the pruning process. He says: "You are already pruned because of the word that I spoke to you." His word and commands do the pruning. The pruning begins when we hear his word and allow it to penetrate our lives. When we ask him to take away those things that either stunt growth or cause harm we open ourselves to new growth and better quality fruit.

Jesus' image of the vine and branches is a powerful reminder to us of the love that binds us together with him, and each other. In union with him we have life. In union with him we are nourished for the journey of life. In union with him we bear fruit. And so he exhorts us: "Remain in me, as I remain in you."

The movie ends with Marcello studying a decaying fish on the beach. Cut off from the sea, it has died, as a branch cut off from a vine dies, as Marcello cut off from Jesus is dying.

To what extent can I relate to Marcello? How can I firm up my bond with Jesus?

Unless there is within us that which is above us, we shall soon yield to that which is about us.



From the Parish Library: Grand Hall







Pope Francis declared a Year of St. Joseph through December 8th 2021 on the occasion of the 150th anniversary of St. Joseph being proclaimed as Patron of the Universal Church by Pope Pius IX in 1870. Throughout this special year we will include various insights, past and present about St. Joseph.



Pope Pius XII declared a feast of St. Joseph the Worker on May 1, 1955 to highlight the dignity of work. Work is a means of participating in the work of God. We are called to sanctify work and see it as a means of co-creating with God.

There are several key Church documents addressing work and labor. Here's one. *Laborem Exercens*, meaning “Through Work” by Pope John Paul in 1981. He highlights, in particular, the “Spirituality of Work.”



St. Josemaría Escrivá, founder of Opus Dei, promoted Saint Joseph as the model of the sanctification of ordinary, daily work. He wrote of a threefold meaning of work:

- 1). That we are called to the *sanctification of work*, being excellent in what we do.
- 2). The second is *sanctifying oneself in work*, becoming personally holy through our work.
- 3). The third is *sanctifying others through work*, helping others to become holy through our influence and shared collaboration with them in work.



How many of us even have it on our radar, in our thought process, on our mental landscape, that one's work, one's workplace, one's co-workers put us on holy ground. We can't be schizophrenic with our “church life” and our work life. They go hand in hand. Work is regarded not merely as a means of earning a living but as a daily expression of love. It is a daily

expression of co-working, co-creating with God. And this includes all work, as we say in our family, whether it is perceived as above or below the neck, intellectual labor or manual labor.

St. John Chrysostom in the 4th century said that “Mary was wedded to a carpenter because Christ the bridegroom of the Church wished to accomplish the salvation of all mankind and to fulfill all His work by means of the wood of the cross.”

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
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
