While I miss him terribly, he was such a lucky dog and we were all lucky to have him. He was our parish dog and has left us with so many good memories. Amidst the tears that still happen when I think of him, I can't help but remember so many good things about our Monsignor. Below is a list of a just few things that come to mind as I reflect upon having Jackson in my life. Before that list, thank you all for the love and kindness you have shown him over the years. A dog couldn't have more love and treats in his life than Jackson. I really want to thank Laura and Peggy for all the love they have given Jackson-they were special people in his life and one of the sources of his

joy in the morning when he would see them at the beginning of the day. In these final years of aging decline, Big Mac managed to get on Jackson's A list of human beings.



- Why Monsignor? I have to pick up after him. If he were a Deacon he would be picking up after me.
- The Morning Mass at the chapel—he loved our daily community and visited everyone in the chapel and then made himself at home usually in front of the altar.
- All the treat givers—He knew many of your cars and couldn't wait to greet you.
- Playing in the snow. Jackson loved wintertime except for the ice.
- His willingness to be dressed up by the staff. (see below)
- Happy mornings, almost a daily occurrence except in these last months of pain
- His romping into the office in the morning to greet Laura or Peggy



Our Masses are so beautifully enhanced by your participation in the prayers and singing, and we'd like to make participation simpler and even more accessible for you. The JumboTron[™] was used to great success during COVID to supplement our worship when we were not able to have hymnals in pews. Things like the creed really "boomed" when folks didn't have to try to find it in the hymnal - which was great!

We appreciate the viewpoint which sees the potential for distraction or the feeling of a "mega-church" if the JumboTron[™] is not used tastefully. This is why the slides have been formatted simply with plain

white text on black background. Since the restriction on hymnals in pews was lifted, the use of the JumboTron[™] has been scaled back to a static slide with hymn numbers for the Mass. While this has been simpler logistically (requires no advancing of slides), it seems the JumboTron[™] could be used to even greater effect aiding participation at Mass.

As we continue to ponder which parts of the Mass would benefit from more use of the JumboTronTM, we are again looking to build up a ministry of volunteers willing to advance slides for Mass. 


Acts 1:12-14 Then they returned to Jerusalem from the Mount called Olivet... and when they had entered, they went up to the upper room, All these with one accord devoted themselves to prayer, together with the women and Mary.

Their "nine days of prayer" for an outpouring of God's Grace form the origins of the devotion called the "Novena."

There are many various types of novenas that can be prayed devotionally. Here are two that could be recited each day for the nine days in preparation for the feast of Pentecost.

O Lord Jesus Christ Who, before ascending into heaven did promise to send the Holy Spirit to finish Your work in the souls of Your Apostles and Disciples, deign to grant the same Holy Spirit to me that He may perfect in my soul, the work of Your grace and Your love. Grant me the Spirit of Wisdom that I may despise the perishable things of this world and aspire only after the things that are eternal, the Spirit of Understanding to enlighten my mind with the light of Your divine truth, the Spirit on Counsel that I may ever choose the surest way of pleasing God and gaining heaven, the Spirit of Fortitude that I may bear my cross with You and that I may overcome with courage all the obstacles that oppose my salvation, the Spirit of Knowledge that I may know God and know myself and grow perfect in the science of the Saints, the Spirit of Piety that I may find the service of God sweet and amiable, and the Spirit of Fear that I may be filled with a loving reverence towards God and may dread in any way to displease Him. Mark me, dear Lord with the sign of Your true disciples, and animate me in all things with Your Spirit. Amen.



Lord Jesus, I ask you to baptize me in your Holy Spirit. I want to receive all that you have for me. Holy Spirit, I ask you to take the reins of my life, to lead me, to guide me, and empower me to live a new way of life. I welcome whatever gifts you desire me to have for the building up of the Church and for the mission to which you have called me. Come Holy Spirit!

Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Jesus tells his disciples, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give it to you." The peace that Jesus gives is far different than the kind that comes from the absence of war, conflict, or affliction. The peace that God offers is found alongside suffering and hardship, not necessarily in their absence.

St. Teresa of Avila offers us a bit of wisdom regarding peace: "May today there be peace within. May you trust God that you are exactly where you are meant to be. May you not forget the infinite possibilities that are born of faith. May you use those gifts that you have received and pass on the love that has been given to you. May you be content knowing you are a child of God. Let this presence settle into your bones and allow your soul the freedom to sing, dance, praise, and love. It is there for each and every one of us."

In order for us to experience the divine peace that Jesus offers, we have to allow God's presence to settle into our bones! It is only when this happens that we can be truly taught by the Holy Spirit to discern the true path to peace and find ourselves with untroubled hearts. The world and our lives are so unpredictable and changeable. If we look for a source of lasting and real peace only there, our search will never be satisfied. Something will always unsettle and disturb us. The Jewish disciples could really relate to what Jesus was saying about peace (shalom). They already knew that it was more a matter of achieving wholeness and wellbeing than anything else.

Wholeness and wellbeing are precisely what is uncovered when we begin to really see and know the height, depth, and breadth of God's presence and promise. The elegance of God's Divine life flows through our blood and the marrow in our bones. It is that close and deep. As we breathe in and exhale God's life, peace becomes what we know within and what is exhaled out. This remains in the midst of intense conflict, persecution, suffering, rejection, and even death.
