A Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Even though Pentecost is rightly celebrated in late spring, the robust experience of a New England fall can provide a profound metaphor for reflection. A full expression of fall colors is beautiful to behold. But, with all of its majesty and beauty, the observer knows the experience of death is soon to come. Creation will be dark and barren for a while. Pentecost cannot be separated from the cross. Before God's transformative, life-giving power can bear fruit, we must first die.

Pentecost is all about leaving the lifeless dead wood behind and allowing God, through the power of the Holy Spirit, to create something new. These Pentecost creations happen repeatedly over and over again. The birthing process of the Church is ongoing. God is always bringing life out of death and creating something where there was once nothing. That is why the fall is such an apropos metaphorical season for Pentecost. In order to really receive the gift of the Holy Spirit we have to die to what we once knew and what no longer works.

When fire and wind find their fullest expression, they are in no way gentle nor kind. They have the potential to level anything in their paths. We are experiencing great turmoil in our world, nation, and our Church. Whether the result of circumstance or the work of the Holy Spirit, much of what we knew to be normal and constant is changing. Common systems and institutional structures that may have worked for a time no longer do. When the old and familiar need to be left behind, God creates something new. Change and disorder do not need to be our enemies. They always bring opportunities for something exciting and new. What we need is untiring faith, firm hope, and perfect love.

What we need is for the Holy Spirit to enlighten us to see what is important and what we must do. "*O Holy Spirit, descend plentifully into my heart. Enlighten the dark corners of this neglected dwelling and scatter there Thy cheerful beams.*" (St. Augustine) If we experience joy, even in the midst of turbulence, then we will know we are exactly where God needs us to be. If not, then perhaps there is a lesson in the decaying leaves that graciously descend to the ground on a crisp fall day.

Knowledge is the ability to judge correctly about matters of faith and right action, so as to never wander from the straight path of justice. Knowledge is the ability to think about and explore God's revelation, and also to recognize there are mysteries of faith beyond us.

Piety is, principally, revering God with filial affection, paying worship and

duty to God, paying due duty to all men on account of their relationship to God, and honoring the saints and not contradicting Scripture. The Latin word *pietas* denotes the reverence that we give to our father and to our country; since God is the Father of all, the worship of God is also called piety. Piety helps us pray to God in true devotion.

Fear of God is, in this context, "filial" or chaste fear whereby we revere God and avoid separating ourselves from him – as opposed to "servile" fear, whereby we fear punishment. Fear of the Lord is the feeling of amazement before God, who is all-present, and whose friendship we do not want to lose.

The rich history and theological, liturgical, and artistic traditions of the twenty-three Eastern Catholic churches are such an indispensable part of the global Catholic communion that, along with the Latin West, these churches are said to form one of the two "lungs" by which the Church breathes and lives. Yet even though Pope St. John Paul II called on the faithful to appreciate the treasures of the Christian East, far too many Catholics remain ignorant of them. 20 Answers: Eastern Catholic cism provides an invaluable primer, explaining the origins of the Eastern Catholic churches and how they fit

into the one Church of Christ, their distinctive prayers and practices, and some of the common misunderstandings and controversies that even today can cause unnecessary division and confusion.

- 1. d The word "shalom" is both a greeting and a lovely prayer all by itself, a wish for God's peace.
- 2. a In the pro-life movement, Jesus' seamless garment has become a symbol for the dignity of human life from natural beginning to natural end. The symbol comes from the respect that even the Roman soldiers had for Jesus' tunic.
- 3. b This is one of the Beatitudes from the Gospel of Matthew (see 5:7). Mercy is stressed in the Bible as one of the qualities of God Himself which we imitate.
- 4. b This is the wound in Jesus' side that Doubting Thomas later wanted to touch (see John 20:24-29). The water and blood are symbols of Baptism.
- 5. c The word "ciborium" comes from the Latin word for "food."
- c When Jesus called Matthew to follow Him, Matthew immediately left the customs house. He also invited Jesus to dinner (see Matthew 9:9-13).

- 7. a Charles Lwanga (d. 1886) and 19 young men of the court were asked by the king how long they would remain Christian. They answered, "Till death." They were burned alive. Within one year the number of people in the area wanting to be Christian grew to 2000. His feast day is June 3.
- b According to legend, St. Lawrence (d. 250) jokingly said to his executioners, "Turn me over, I'm done on this side." More instructive is the story that he gathered all the poor of Rome when the persecutors demanded that he turn over "the treasures of the Church." His feast day is August 10.
- 9. d Jesus' prayer in the garden was so intense He sweated drops of blood (see Luke 22:39-46).
- 10. d If you listen carefully at Mass you can hear all these facts mentioned in the prayers. We remember Jesus' gift of Himself in the Eucharist at every Mass.

Come Holy Spirit

How often do we pray for the Holy Spirit to come and stir His gifts within us as baptized, confirmed believers, sons and daughters of God?

In preparation for the Feast of Pentecost believers throughout the world often pray a "novena" in imitation of the first Pentecost, when, after the Ascension of our Lord, the early Church prayed for nine days to be clothed with the power of the Spirit that Jesus promised. Whether or not you are in the midst of making a novena, make it a practice to call on the Holy Spirit every day. Here are two prayers that can help.

Breathe in me, O Holy Spirit, that my thoughts may all be holy. Act in me, O Holy Spirit that I may love only what is holy. Strengthen me, O Holy Spirit, that I may defend all that is holy. Guard me, O Holy Spirit, that I may always be holy. St. Augustine



Holy Spirit, love of my heart, I adore you. Enlighten me, guide me, strengthen me, console me. Tell me what I must do--command me. I promise to submit myself to all that you will of me, and accept all you permit to befall me. Let me only know your will. Cardinal Mercier



In the School of the Holy Spirit

The above is a title of a book by Fr. Jacques Philippe, a spiritual guide for our times. An excerpt follows below. The shortest road to holiness is fidelity to the inspirations of the Holy Spirit. This book helps explain how to listen to the Spirit.

My Jesus, it is truly easy to become holy; it just takes a little good will! And if He finds this minimum of good will in a soul, He quickly gives Himself to her. And nothing can stop Him, neither our faults nor our falls, absolutely nothing. Jesus hurries to help that soul; and if the soul is faithful to this grace from God, she can in a short time reach the highest level of holiness that a created being can attain here below. God is very generous and does not refuse His grace to anyone. He gives even more than we ask for. The shortest road is faithfulness to the inspirations of the Holy Spirit.

This beautiful text is taken from the diary of St. Faustina. Even though it is simple and concise, it delivers an extremely important message for people who aspire to holiness — to people who want to respond as far as possible to God's love.

The major question for such souls, a question that sometimes causes them pain, is to know what to do about this message. Maybe you never have been particularly concerned about this question. Maybe you never have aspired to love God as much as He possibly can be loved. If not, I ask that you now beg the Holy Spirit to put that desire in you, and even that you beg Him to leave you restless until you have that aspiration.
