

Then taking the five loaves and the two fish, and looking up to heaven, he said the blessing over them, broke them, and gave them to the disciples to set before the crowd. - Lk 9:16

A Deeper Understanding of Scripture

Jesus went to those most in need. He forgave the sinner, ate with the outcast, defended, and fed those who were poor and hungry. He worked for true justice, risked being unpopular, willingly accepted suffering and death, and always stayed connected with his Abba, Father. Jesus also consistently reminded folks that God's compassion, love, and mercy trump everything, even the law. This is the Christ that the Eucharist calls us to be. As we look around our churches, our towns and cities, and our world, there are many people who need to see the face and body of Christ. Some of those most in need may be right within our families. But it is always in the poorest of the poor and those most vulnerable that we find the greatest need. There are many who cannot function on their

own. When the gift of the Eucharistic Christ takes root in our hearts, we can more readily see the face of Christ in others.

Many people are vulnerable. Highest on that list are the homeless. They show us the face of Christ. Whatever the cause, to have no place to go and no place to call home takes a toll on the human spirit. For Jesus when there were hungry people, they were fed. God asks us to do the same ... feed people. There are many who are hungry physically, emotionally, and spiritually. Gifted by the Eucharistic presence of Christ, we can bring them Christ. Who are the hungry around us and how can we feed them?

When someone is hurting, you comfort them. When someone is hungry, you feed them. When someone needs clothes, you provide them. When someone is cold, you warm them. When someone is in prison, you visit them. With over a million people who are homeless and over a quarter of them children, it is important to ask the question, "why?" and strategize for ways to lessen or alleviate the problem. Nevertheless, we are not off the hook for responding to the immediate needs that present themselves at our doors. Whether a person's current station in life is self-imposed or the result of being victimized, they are sacred vessels. We cannot lock the door and send them away and still believe we bear the Eucharistic presence of Christ. It doesn't work like that.

The Source and Summit

Dear Parishioners,

Blessed Feast of Corpus Christi! Today we gather to celebrate what the Church hopes will become the source and summit of our lives as Disciples of Jesus Christ. Our baptism into Christ is so that we can approach the altar with confidence. We gather around the altar in hopes of one day joining the angels and saints on the other side for eternity. So many things occur during Mass that we forget that ultimately we are worshipping the

living God with all those who already share in the fullness of communion with God.

Much like the mystery of Our Lord's Incarnation, at every Mass we encounter that wondrous mixture of Divine and human. In past ages our liturgies have often emphasized the Divine aspect and "otherness" that is encountered at every Mass. Latin, incense, and the orientation of the priest facing the altar invited us to that awareness of Our God who is completely Other. After Vatican II we entered a period of worship that often emphasized the human and horizontal aspect of Mass. All the things that defined the experience of Mass for the last few centuries changed seemingly overnight. For many in my parents' and grandparents' generation it was a welcome if not jarring experience. That our God is perceived as less punishing is a good thing. In fact it is essential if you ever hope to actually love that God instead of just fearing or placating Him. At the same time you don't want the God you once respected to become irrelevant and inconsequential. It was jarring for my parents' and grandparents' generations since they had been taught that the Mass never changes. Many seemed to roll with the changes, others found it to be too much and left Church. Many, many more left the Church in this slow attrition in the West that saw each generation less interested and invested in the



Mass or the Church that celebrates the Sacrifice of Redemption.

At its heart, the Mass has not changed, but the changes in language—and to some extent the form of Mass, a culture that no longer supported faith, the growth of unimaginable materialism—all took their toll on the faithful. The God we once needed now became the God we can choose or not choose. The act of choosing, with the emphasis placed on us, spells disaster for a faith where we

once humbly acknowledged that we were chosen by God, not the other way around. (By the way it is still that way once your faith matures. Only the immature still naively think they are choosing to worship.) The Mass cannot be the source and summit of our lives when we treat it as an optional and occasional reality to fit into our schedule or to attend when we feel like it. Those attitudes do not lead to communion with God, but rather away from Him. That is the road to Hell and it takes no effort to walk it. Better to be a person of no faith and be surprised by Christ than a person of lukewarm faith who treats God with contempt. Not a fun realization, nor a fun future to contemplate.

I am not, nor will ever proclaim that we live lives of spiritual and moral perfection. We should strive, but we all know we will struggle with sin until the end of our days. But struggle implies effort, not surrender. No one discovers the Source without seeking it nor does anyone ascend to the Summit without climbing. No one wants to help us seek and climb more than Our God. The holy Trinity desires our communion without ever needing it. There is no greater or freer love we can hope to discover than this.




The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ—Year C

On the first day of the Feast of Unleavened Bread, when they sacrificed the Passover lamb, Jesus' disciples said to him, "Where do you want us to go and prepare for you to eat the Passover?" Mark 14:12

On the night of the Last Supper, as in the embrace following a wedding feast, Jesus gave His Bride, the Church, Himself—"This is My Body." Fulfilling all the "types" of the Old Testament, particularly the Passover meal, our Lord united Himself to us by way of a Communion meal, leading us out of the slavery from sin. Think of these "types" of the Eucharist in the OT and how Jesus has fulfilled them. The tree of life. The offering of Abel. The offering of Isaac. The offering of Melchizedek. The offering of the Firstborn / Passover Lamb. The Manna in the Desert.

We thank the Lord for the many years of Eucharistic Adoration around the clock Monday through Friday, here at IHM.


It is an amazing experience throughout the weekend and teens from all over the USA will be attending.

Spiritual Cifts (Charisms) of the Holy Spirit (1)



This is a series of articles on Spiritual Gifts. We are encouraged to know about such gifts as well as how the Spirit desires to breathe, "make music" through the instruments of our lives.

1 Corinthians 12:1,7 "Now concerning spiritual gifts, brethren, I do not want you to be uninformed. To <u>each</u> is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good." (Read CCC 799-801)

Dr. Mary Healy writes, "Charismatic gifts or charisms are distributed by the Spirit in different measures to different persons. They are not primarily for personal sanctification but for building up the body of Christ. They are by definition gifts that are to be given away, gifts to be used for others.

"Charisms are also distinct from human talents. A charism is not a natural ability but a supernatural gift of the Holy Spirit. It can enable one to do what is humanly impossible (such as prophecy or healing) or elevates a natural endowment (such as teaching or hospitality) and a supernatural level of efficacy for building

up the body of Christ.

"Paul lists some of the more obviously supernatural gifts like healings, prophecy and miracles in 1 Corinthians 12:8-10. In other passages he lists gifts that seem more ordinary but are no less important: service, teaching, exhortation, contribution, administration and acts of mercy (Rom 12). Paul refers to charisms as manifestations of the Spirit (1 Cor 12:7). That means that every time you exercise a charism God is operating through you. It is not something you possess, only yield to. Like a musical instrument, the more yielded you are the more freely the Spirit will play.

"Paul insists that every Christian is endowed with one or more charisms for building up the body of Christ: 'To each" is given a manifestation of the Spirit for the common good.' (1 Cor 12:7) Each is given charisms that perfectly correspond to his or her unique role. 'As each has received a charism, use it to serve one another, as good stewards of God's varied grace' (1 Peter 4:10, Roman 12:6-7).

"Many people do not exercise charisms because they have no idea that they even have them. But this is a great loss to the body of Christ. It is a major reason for the weakness of many efforts at evangelization and parish renewal. Paul exhorts not only to use the gifts they already have but to strive eagerly for the spiritual gifts, especially those that are most useful (1 Cor 14)."

Lord Jesus, I ask You to baptize me in your Holy Spirit. I want to receive all that You have for me. Holy Spirit, I ask You to take the reins of my life, to lead me, to guide me, and empower me to live a new way of life. I welcome whatever gifts You desire me to have for the building up of the Church and for the mission to which You have called me. Come Holy Spirit!

"The gift of the Holy Spirit must be accompanied by our free choice to follow His inspiration and guidance. If we do not choose to resist sin, the Spirit cannot help us, for He will not violate our freedom. However, if we make even a weak resolve to struggle against temptation and sin, the Holy Spirit can rush into us and fortify that weak resolve, giving us enough strength to resist the deadly sins with greater effectiveness." —Fr. Robert Spitzer, S.J. from his book Escape from Evil's Darkness

Answers to Catholic IQ

- 1. a Begun in 1882 in New Haven, Connecticut, the Knights build up unity among members and contribute to special causes.
- 2. b Ruth and Naomi were poor widows who went back to Bethlehem, where Ruth married Boaz. She became the great-grandmother of King avid and an ancestor of Jesus (see the Book of Ruth).
- a St. Augustine of Hippo (354-430) was blessed to have a mother, St. Monica, who prayed for 30 years that he would become a Christian. Her prayers were more than answered: he spent almost 40 years pastoring the Church in Africa and writing many books. His feast day is August 28.
- 4. a We say "Thanks be to God" after the First Reading and the Second Reading, but "Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ" after the reading of the Gospel.
- 5. c John, the "disciple Jesus loved," was the only Apostle to stand by Him to the end. All the others ran away. From the cross, Jesus entrusted His mother to John's care (see John 19:25-27).
- 6. a This was known as the "Babylonian Captivity" of God's people. The prophet Ezekiel was one of those exiled to Babylon.
- 7. a After the Ascension the disciples didn't know what was going to happen. They didn't understand about the Holy Spirit. Sometimes the upper room is called the "cenacle," which is its Latin name.
- a Palm Sunday, or Passion Sunday, the Sunday before Easter, is the day we read the long Gospel. We alternate reading Matthew's, Mark's, and Luke's version in a three-year cycle. John's version is read every year on Good Friday.
- 9. b This word is used at the e4nd of the Book of Revelation (see 22:20). It is another word that is a prayer all by itself.
- 10. a Built on the site of the Jewish Temple, the Dome of the Rock is a holy place for Moslems.
