A Meditation on the Immaculate Heart of Mary

In contemplating the Heart of Mary, we enter into her interior life, symbolized by the beautiful image of her heart. It is often depicted as pierced with a sword, in flames, wreathed with roses or with the crown of thorns of her Son. Mary's pure and open heart is the reflection of our beautiful Christian life of union with God; a reflection of sacrificial love for Him and all humanity, on fire with the Holy Spirit, flowering with every grace, blessing and virtue.

Following in her heart beats, we are to be directed by the love of God: wholly pure, wholly given, fully human. Jesus said, "Blessed are the pure of heart for they shall see God," because when we are pure of heart, all we see is God. Her heart is utterly pure beyond our comprehension, pure as Eve's before the fall; then made even more beautiful by Mary's heroic merits, her sacrifices, her complete alliance with God, her total love, and her compliance with His will and plan. Oh the willingness of this heart to trustingly suffer in order to love Christ bravely, to grow in love and go on loving even to it's own destruction! She believed all things, she endured all things, she hoped all things! Therefore she received all things.

How can we imitate Mary by heart? We are so often unlike her inside. Sometimes we seem hopelessly off track. Mary's heart's simplicity and hidden life in Christ are hard to cultivate, but this is what true holiness is, loving God as she did; in stark faith, hope, and love, in simplicity of heart. We walk with Mary in simple faith and learn Christ from her. We listen, we let go and let God, trusting in His grace that He will complete the good work he has begun in us. It all began with our Most Holy Mother saying, "I am the littlest of the servants of God. Let it be done to me as you have said." And Jesus was conceived in her. This is what happens in the spiritual life if we allow God to work with us, and Mary to teach us. We become more and more attentive to His Word in our lives. We learn to be in silent communion with Him in the quiet of our hearts and we become more and more aware of His indwelling. It takes training ourselves to be quiet and commitment to spend time with God every day in whatever way we are capable of.

May our Holy Mother pray for us that we can mirror her heart with our own. May we too be simple, humble and free of heart for Him, that we may run lightly in His paths and wear the gentle yoke of Jesus with a joyful humility.

Hearts Formed by Faith

Dear Parishioners,

This weekend we celebrate our patronal feast day for the parish. We rejoice in the intercession of the Blessed Virgin Mary and celebrate her maternal love for us. Today as a parish family we ask the Blessed Mother to lead each of us to a deeper union with her Son, Jesus Christ.

As disciples of the Lord we strive for two essential elements in our life of faith: personal relationship and confident articulation. All of us strive for a personal relationship with Jesus Christ that is formed by the Church, nourished by prayer and embraced in our service to God and neighbor. A personal relationship with Jesus Christ is not a matter of emotional subjectivity, but a genuine religious experience. We are bound to Christ through our religious experience and expressed faith. The Holy Spirit and Holy Mother Church act as safeguards for shaping and molding the various misconceptions and distortions that all of us are prone to encounter as we seek the Lord. Sacred Tradition and Sacred Scripture help us to weed out the bad seeds that would contaminate our relationship with Jesus. One of the real dangers of professing a personal relationship with the Lord apart from the community of the Church is to make the Lord little more than a mirror for our own needs and personality. One can worship the God of themselves without ever realizing it.

Our faith is indeed personal, but it is lived in communion with the Church.

The second element in our life of faith is confident articulation. Call it professing your faith if you want, but the goal is the same. We want to know our faith and what we believe as Catholics. We want to have an answer for ourselves first and foremost. That doesn't mean we have to know everything about our faith, but we want to strive for a growing confidence that we understand the what and why of our beliefs. Few things will be more painful or potentially dangerous to our growing faith if we are caught in a conversation where we cannot answer simple questions about it.

We can be confident about our faith without being belligerent or arrogant about it. We can love and treasure the richness of our faith without denigrating what others believe. At the same time we should strive to free ourselves and others from the many misconceptions about the faith. Knowing our faith empowers us to address the many issues of life. The Church does have an answer and response for many of the choices we make in life. We can make our choices in union with the Church or ignore her at our own peril. Our choices will lead us to possessing hearts formed by faith or hearts formed by self or others.

We pray: that we build God's Church to glorify His name and not look for prestige and honor for ourselves.



Who Forgoes other Necessities to Remain Housed?




Housing is considered unaffordable if it costs more than 30% of a household's income.

Spiritual Gifts (Charisms) of the Holy Spirit (2)

This is a series of articles on Spiritual Gifts. We are encouraged to know about such gifts as well as how the Spirit desires to breathe, "make music" through the instruments of our lives. 1 Corinthians 12:1,7 "Now concerning spiritual gifts, brethren, I do not want you to be uninformed. To <u>each</u> is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good." (Read CCC 799-801)

To be informed about the gifts, it is first wise to know what they are. Scripture offers various listing of gifts. While not exhaustive, these lists are a good place to start the discernment process.

1 Corinthians 12:4-11

"Now there are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit; and there are varieties of service, but the same Lord; and there are varieties of working, but it is the same God who inspires them all in every one.

"To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good. To one is given through the Spirit the utterance of wisdom, and to another the utterance of knowledge according to the same Spirit, to another faith by the same Spirit, to another gifts of healing by the one Spirit, to another the working of miracles, to another prophecy, to another the ability to distinguish between spirits, to another various kinds of tongues, to another the interpretation of tongues. All these are inspired by one and the same Spirit, who apportions to each one individually as he wills."

Romans 12:4

"Just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, so in Christ we who are many form one body, and each member belongs to all the others.

"We have different gifts, according to the grace given us. If a man's gift is prophesying, let him use it in proportion to his faith. If it is serving, let him serve; if it is teaching, let him teach; if it is encouraging, let him encourage; if it is contributing to the needs of others, let him give generously; if it is leadership, let him govern diligently; if it is showing mercy, let him do it cheerfully."

- b This honor, the highest civilian award in the United States, waws posthumously awarded on December 6, 1963, by President Lyndon Johnson for John XXIII's behind-the-scenes influence during the Cuban Missile Crisi8s.
- 2. a <u>Cuerpo de Cristo</u> is Spanish for "Body of Christ," a phrase made more familiar by the growing Hispanic community in the U. S. Church.
- 3. a From the Greek word for "split, " a schism is a formal break-off of a group from Church unity, as in the Great Western Schism (1378-1417), when there were several men who claimed the papacy.
- 4. d This unconditional promise was made in Genesis 15:5, and so we call Abraham the father of our faith.
- 5. c From the Greek words *doxa* ("glory:) and *logos* ("word"), a doxology is a short prayer of praise.
- 6. a This feast was changed from the third Wednesday after Easter to May 1 to counteract the influence of communist celebrations of May 1, and to advance the dignity of human work.
- 7. d Luke is the author of both his Gospel and the Acts of the Apostles, which can be found following the Gospel of John in the New Testament. It is generally accepted that the book was written after the destruction of Jerusalem and the Temple (80-90 A.D.), and it gives an account of how the Holy Spirit led the early Church.
- c Pentecost comes from the Greek word for "fifty." Pentecost occurs 50 days after Easter (Acts 2:1-41). Pentecost is often referred to as the "birthday of the Church" because this is when the Apostles began preaching and teaching and spreading the Good News of Jesus Christ to the world.
- 9. a The word "cardinal" comes from the Latin *cardo*, which means "hinge." The cardinal virtues serve as hinger for other lesser virtues. The list can be found in the Book of Wisdom (8:7).
- 10. c. Fired upon at close range by Mehmet Ali Agca, the pope was critically injured. He later visited his would-be assassin in prison to forgive him.
