

Deeper Understanding of Scripture

"Our families need to ask for the gift of the Spirit! Through prayer, even in the busiest times, we give time back to God, we find the peace that comes from appreciating the important things, and we encounter the joy of God's unexpected gifts. Through daily prayer may our homes become, like the house of Martha and Mary, places where Jesus always finds a warm welcome." Pope Francis

While it is necessary to attend to the details of hospitality, learning how to be present to people, experiences, and God is sometimes more important. Creating homes that are welcoming environments requires not only organization and structure but members who truly enjoy being there and celebrating life with one another. Details can often get the best of us. While attending to details is important to success, our obsession with them can be problematic. Whether wanting to make a good impression, fear of failure, insecurity, or emotional immaturity, throwing ourselves into the "details" of hospitality can distract us from being present to those we want to serve. Conversely, focusing exclusively on being present without any attention to detail also sets our attempts at hospitality up for disaster! We need a balance of both. But creating a truly welcoming space in our homes and within ourselves requires still more.

We have to be empty of ourselves. Becoming a welcoming, hospitable person is not possible in someone focused on their own needs and desires. If the one we serve is the one who looks back at us in the mirror, then there is no space for anyone else.

While Martha and Mary had different ideas of what it means to serve, they both had the inner space and freedom to do so. They were detached from themselves. Detachment becomes the challenge to hospitality and creating a God-centered, open-hearted space in our lives. When we impulsively act out of our personal agendas, violence, abuse, pride, greed, lust, power, control, passion, and self-aggrandizement encroach upon the space needed to be present to another human being. Not only can others not find a home in us, but even God cannot find a home in us!

Why you shouldn't miss Sunday Mass on summer vacation

It's tempting to skip Sunday Mass while relaxing on the beach, but summer vacation doesn't exempt us from going to church.

When traveling away from home to enjoy a relaxing time of vacation, it can be tempting to "forget" to attend Mass on Sunday.

We may want to sleep in on Sunday, or there might not be a convenient Mass time and we don't want to interrupt our activities.

Whatever excuse we may come up with, vacation seems much simpler if we skip the Sunday obligation.

However, God doesn't see it this way.

The current <u>*Code of Canon Law*</u> confirms the Sunday obligation and states, "On Sundays and other holy days of obligation, **the faithful are obliged to participate in the Mass**."

This means that any Catholic who is able to attend Mass must make every reasonable effort to be there.

At times there may be <u>exceptional circumstanc-</u> <u>es</u> that could dispense a person from attending Mass. For example, if the town you're traveling to doesn't have a Catholic parish, it would be unreasonable to expect you to find a Mass. But opting to skip an available Mass in favor of **enjoying time on the beach is not a legitimate reason to miss Sunday Mass**.

Time for God

The reason why the Church is so insistent on this

issue is that we need to make time for God on Sundays, worshiping in the way that *he* designed.

St. John Paul II urged all Catholics to renew their dedication to the Sunday Eucharist in his apostolic letter, *Dies Domini*.

It is crucially important that all the faithful should be convinced that they cannot live their faith or share fully in the life of the Christian community unless they take part regularly in the Sunday Eucharistic assembly. The Eucharist is the full realization of the worship which humanity owes to God, and it cannot be compared to any other religious experience. A particularly efficacious expression of this is the Sunday gathering of the entire community, obedient to the voice of the Risen Lord who calls the faithful together to give them the light of his word and the nourishment of his Body as the perennial sacramental wellspring of redemption. The grace flowing from this wellspring renews mankind, life and history.

While it may be easier to skip Mass on Sunday when traveling, we would be sacrificing the wellspring of grace that God wants to give to us in every Sunday Eucharist.

Above all, don't see the obligation to Sunday Mass as an imposition, but as an invitation to a deeper relationship with Jesus Christ.



(Part 2 of Motivational Gifts) – Romans 12:6-8 We have different gifts, according to the grace given us. If a man's gift is prophesying, let him use it in proportion to his faith. If it is serving, let him serve; if it is teaching, let him teach; if it is encouraging, let him encourage; if it is contributing to the needs of others, let him give generously; if it is leadership, let him govern diligently; if it is showing mercy, let him do it cheerfully.

CONTRIBUTOR (GIVER / ALMS GIVER) -one who loves to give time, talent, energy and financial / material means to benefit others and advance the Gospel; a person of faith who knows that God supplies every need, and is willing to put themselves and their resources at the service of others.

ADMINISTRATOR (FACILITATOR / LEADER) - one who loves to organize, lead or direct, knowing by faith that any project can be accomplished by bringing together the right people to do it - one that is "over others" - a person of broad vision, the administrator grasps the overall picture and sees all that is involved.



- 1. c Listen carefully the next time you go to Mass for the Holy Spirit's "job description."
- 2. a St. Faustina (1905-1938) was given an overwhelming insight of God's mercy flowing through the heart of Christ. We celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday the first Sunday following Easter.
- 3. d Legend says that Peter claimed he was not worthy to die the same way Jesus did, and requested to be crucified upside down. It is generally accepted that he was martyred during the reign of Nero (54-68).
- 4. a Pentecost, the celebration of the descent of the Holy Spirit on the Apostles, is often referred to as the birthday of the Church. The word "Pentecost" comes from the Greek word for "fifty,"
- 5. c Traditionally, red, the color of blood, represents life. The descent of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost brought life to the community of Jesus' believers. They were ready to spread the teachings of Jesus to the ends of the earth.
- 6. c The miter is two pieces of stiff triangular-shaped material attached at the side to form a headdress. Reference to Israelite priests wearing such garb can be found in Exodus 39:28. In about the twelfth century it became the custom for bishops to wear the miter as a distinctive headdress.
- 7. b Acts picks up where Luke's Gospel left off.
- 8. d Today, the Lamb of God is sung or spoken in English at Mass while the priest breaks the consecrated host. The Lamb of God ends with "grant us peace" (dona nobis pacem).
- b A deeply religious man influenced by Gandhi and Martin Luther King Jr., Chavez (1927-1993) accompanied his protests with fasting and daily Mass.
- 10. a Moses saw the promised land but never entered it. Before he died, Moses blessed Joshua, and God gave Joshua wisdom to lead the people across the Jordan River (Deuteronomy 32:48-42, 34:9).
