Meister Eckhart asks, "Who is the man whose prayers God always hears?" He answers, "God hears the man who appeals to God as God. When, however, man appeals to God, hoping for some worldly good, he is not appealing to God at all, but to what he is asking of God. He is trying to make God his servant. On this point, St. Augustine says: 'You pray to what you love, for true whole prayer is nothing but love!' Thus, we pray to what we love, and no one rightly prays to God but he who prays for God and has nothing on his mind but God."

We struggle with what we want God to do and how we want our prayer validated. Meister Eckhart is correct. We often want God to be our servant. We further struggle with trusting that

Deeper Understanding of Scripture

God knows what we need and that His will is best.

God's will is not some predetermined outcome of events that we must simply suggest. "Thy will be done" is not an invocation beckoning us to accept a particular state of affairs passively. Rather, it is the humble and confident placement of ourselves in the presence of the God we seek, whom we call "Father." We must remember that God is the God of life and light. It is from nothing that God brings something and from the darkness that God brings life. Prayer allows us to seek the One we love with the assurance that all will be well regardless of what course the events of our lives take. God is not about passive submission but the humble trust of love.

That's what makes the Lord's Prayer the perfect prayer. It provides us with proper disposition and focus, putting in line all of the essential relationships of our lives. It celebrates and fosters the ever-deepening relationship of trust we have with our Creator. It also calls us to keep open the doors of love between our brothers and sisters with the power that comes with forgiveness. If in one's darkest hour they can find the resolve to fervently pray this perfect prayer of Jesus' conviction, then there is no doubt that God will hear their plea, reach out in love, and bring them ever closer to His heart. What more does one need to weather the storms of life besides faith, hope, and love? These are God's most perfect gifts and all we really need.

Saints for special circumstances this summer ...

St. Adjutor – Keeping children safe around water

Hundreds of children die each year due to drowning, so it's no surprise that parents feel anxious about their kids in the water. Turn to this 12th century French saint who was made a knight in the First Crusade. Tradition has it that when he was captured by Muslims, he managed to flee from persecution by swimming home to France. Thanks to his efforts he managed to survive and live the rest of his life as a recluse. Naturally he became the patron saint of drowning victims.

St. Lawrence – Keeping cook outs safe, and ribs tasty

You might want to brace yourself for this one. In the 3rd century, St. Lawrence was put to death for defying the Roman Emperor Valerian. As a punishment he was literally placed on a giant griddle. But before he died, he supposedly declared, "I'm well done on this side. Turn me over." While this hopefully won't put you off a delicious rack of ribs, maybe you'll say a little prayer to St. Lawrence the next time you light up that barbecue or camping stove to keep you and your family safe from burns and badly cooked food.

St. Narcissus of Gerona – Telling those mosquitos to buzz off.

Summertime is the opportunity for mosquitoes to rejoice. For those who suffer from mosquito bites it can be an absolute nightmare. Just hearing them buzz in your ear at night as they prepare to attack you when you eventually doze off, or having them bite you in painful places – yes, between fingers is a killer – mosquitoes can make

There are distinctions, differences between the Isaiah / Traditional Gifts we hear of at Confirmation and what are described as Motivational / Roman Gifts / Manifestation / Charismatic / Corinthian Gifts – Ministry / Ephesians Gifts. The Manifestation Gifts – Corinthian Gifts (1 Cor 12:7) "To each individual the manifestation of the Spirit is given for some benefit." 1 Cor 12:7 - There are different members, but ONE BODY – all function together. These gifts are free and are dispensed sovereignly by God upon His people for the good of others. These gifts are supernatural abilities bestowed upon individuals by the Holy Spirit. They are not natural abilities. These manifestations are for the common good of the Church and are not to be used to promote the importance of the person bearing the gift. - see Catechism references above. We do not 'possess' the manifestation gifts. We are the vehicles the Lord uses for the outpouring of His blessings upon His people. We are the 'gift bearers' and must function "with humility, willingness to take risks, trust in God, and love for our brothers and sisters in Christ" - Catechism of the Catholic Church. Christians open to the manifestation gifts of the Holy Spirit, to use them for their own building up and then for the building up of the church, should know what the gifts are and pray for the gift of discernment in when and how to use certain gifts. The Manifestation gifts consist of gifts of Insight / Revelation, gifts of Communication / Utterance, and Power / Dynamic gifts.)

GIFTS OF INSIGHT OR REVELATION EXPRESSION OF KNOWLEDGE (WORD OF

KNOWLEDGE) - a supernatural revelation of facts past, pre-

sent, or future which we did not learn through the efforts of the natural mind – this is not to be confused with the knowledge we have acquired through the study of scriptures, Christian writings or other sources of information, including our own experiences. This is a supernaturally imparted Word. If we proclaim a healing or promise of salvation because of what we have studied, we are being presumptuous, not faith filled. True supernatural knowledge starts with knowing God personally, through Jesus Christ. Jesus and the disciples received many 'words of knowledge' from the Holy Spirit. See John 4:17-27, Matthew 17:27, Mark 5:36-40, Acts 5:1-9, Acts 3:1-10 (only a few!)

EXPRESSION OF WISDOM (WORD OF WISDOM / WIS-DOM IN DISCOURSE) - a supernatural insight given to the members of the Body of Christ which reveals God's timing and method of ministry in a given situation. It explains or illuminates a given revelation such as a word of knowledge, discernment of spirit or the communication of revealed prophecy. This is not the same as wisdom we gain from our experiences in life or intellectual pursuits. It is not to be confused with the virtue (Baptismal gift) of wisdom. The 'virtue' of wisdom given at Baptism and affirmed at Confirmation is a lifelong gift which increases in us as we submit to those who instruct us on our spiritual journey. But a 'word of wisdom' is a supernatural revelation of God's timing and method of ministry in a given situation.



Lord Jesus, I ask you to baptize me in your Holy Spirit. I want to receive all that you have for me. Holy Spirit, I ask you to take the reins of my life, to lead me, to guide me, and empower me to live a new way of life. I welcome whatever gifts you desire me to have for the building up of the Church and for the mission to which you have called me. Come Holy Spirit!
