Gospel: John 2:1-11


Jesus and his mother were invited to a wedding feast at Cana. There he performed the first of his great signs, changing water into wine. Thus he revealed his glory to all.

Dear Brothers & Sisters in Christ,

The Church holds Christmas as the second most sacred celebration after Easter. Liturgically, Christmas refers to the memorial of Christ's Nativity and His early manifestations which include His baptism as an adult. Thus, today's Feast, **The Baptism of the Lord**, is still part of Christmas celebration although it concludes it. We are so used to think only of Jesus as an infant during the Season that it doesn't come to mind so often His adult image as part of Christmas. In fact, all the daily Gospel readings, from last Sun-



day's Feast of Epiphany to this Sunday, are all adult images of Jesus portraying different qualities of His person in order to reveal what kind of God who became man He is in relation to us. Those portrayed images of Jesus are called His *Epiphanies* or His manifestations in order the answer the question asked in the famous carol *"What Child is this?"* The ultimate answer to the same question is now given in today's feast; given not by prophets or sages but by God the Father Himself: "This is my beloved Son...Listen to Him." On that note, Christmas is concluded and we are now to listen to the beloved Son of the Father and follow Him.

The Feast of the Baptism of the Lord is an opportune time to reflect on our own baptism. Most of us were baptized as babies and don't have the privilege of recollecting this momentous event of faith journey like those in the RCIA program. However, our baptism is not an event of the past. Rather it is an ever present reality, a constant and an on-going sharing in the life of the Risen Christ. We can and we must reflect on our baptism as an ongoing and daily spiritual exercise. Turning to the very words used for the rite of Baptism is an excellent source of help for a most fruitful reflection:

God the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ has freed you from sin, given you a new birth by water and the Holy Spirit, and welcomed you into his holy people.

At baptism, God through Christ has set us free from the bondage of original sin, made us into a new creation through the Holy Spirit by transforming us to become His sons and daughters and brought us into His family, the Church.

He now anoints you with the chrism of salvation as Christ was anointed priest, prophet, and king.

At baptism we were configure into Christ in His three-fold function as priest prophet, and king so that as we strive daily to come closer to God in worship and prayer, we also do our roles as helpers in Christ work of salvation.

As we renew our baptismal vows during this most solemn feast, let us be led by the Spirit to seek the Glory of God in everything that we do. For one last time this year: Merry Christmas to you! And may God bless you.



VOCATION CORNER

Winter: perfect pruning time

This time of the year, after the holidays, seems that there is not a lot to do. Life in the parish slows down; in most of the parishes there are not special activities or events, lines for confession and Mass attendance comes back to its regular numbers. Even nature seems to take a break during the winter season; trees lose their leaves during fall, and look barren the whole winter season. But life is still there.

Winter season is a time to prune trees. Some branches are cut off because they are dead; others are prune if they had been damaged by a winds or storm; other branches are prune to make trees more beautiful and fruitful. Just like the trees we also can take advantage of this time of the church (ordinary time) to cut off whatever is dead in our lives, or brings death to our lives (i.e. a vice or a bad attitude towards others); We may also take a look to those relationships damaged by the storms of hate and misunderstanding in the past; or we make just look at ourselves and see in what ways we can be more beautiful and fruitful.

Be aware! A tree that is not prune may cause damage to our property. A broken or dead branch that is not taken care of may fall in our home or car. A tree that is not pruned does not bear much fruit. The same thing happens with our lives, in particular with our vocation. If we don't look constantly into ourselves to cut off whatever is dead or broken within us we may be risking that a dead branch may collapsed our vocation. It is also true that if we don't leave behind the things that does not allows us to be more beautiful and fruitful, our vocation eventually will be like an old barren tree. Responding God's call is a continuous process of growth, let us ask God's grace to keep growing in his friendship and love.


