

Twenty-Seventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

Dear loving Parishioners,

On this twenty-seventh Sunday of the Church's ordinary time, we rejoice in the wonderful sacrament of marriage and the beautiful gift of family. On this occasion, I would like to share with you today the Holy Father's marriage advice that appeared in his 2014 St. Valentine's Day audience, attended by over 10,000 young couples engaged to be married. The Holy Father advised the couples that the secret for a successful marriage can be boiled down to three simple concepts: permission, thanks and forgiveness.

ONE: ASK PERMISSION

PLEASE. "Please – May I? We must learn to ask: May I do this? Would you like us to do this? We take this initiative, and that we bring up our children like this. Would you like to go out tonight? ... In short, to ask for agreement is to enter the lives of others with courtesy. But keep this in mind: to be able to enter into the lives of others with courtesy is not easy. Sometimes instead, the manners can be a bit heavy, like hiking boots!"

Quoting St. Francis, the Pope said, "Know that courtesy is one of the properties of God ... and courtesy is the sister of charity, which extinguishes hate and protects love.' Yes, courtesy protects love. And today in our families, in our world, which is often violent and arrogant, we need much more courtesy. And this can begin at home."

TWO: GIVE THANKS

THANK YOU. "It seems easy to say the word, but we know that is not always so. But it's important! We teach it to the children, but then we forget it ourselves! Gratitude is an important quality. An old woman once said to me in Buenos Aires: 'Gratitude is a flower that grows in the noble land.' Nobility of the soul is necessary to grow this flower.

"Remember the Gospel of Luke?" He continued. "Jesus heals ten who are sick with leprosy, and then only one returns to say thanks to Jesus. The Lord says, and the other nine, where are they? This is also true for us: do we know how to say thanks? In your relationship, and then tomorrow in married life, it is important to keep alive the awareness that the other person is a gift of God, and for the gifts of God to say thank you! And in

this inner attitude, say thanks to each other for everything. It is not a kind word to use just with strangers, to show you are educated. It is necessary to know how to say thank you, in order to get along well together in married life."


THREE: ASK FORGIVENESS

I AM SORRY, or excuse me. "In life we make so many errors, many mistakes. We learn to recognize our mistakes and apologize. 'Sorry if I raised my voice today,' 'I'm sorry if I went without saying goodbye,' 'I'm sorry if I'm late,' 'If I have been so unresponsive this week,' 'If I talked too much without ever listening,' 'Excuse me, I forgot,' 'I was angry and I'm sorry I've taken it out on you'... This is how a Christian family grows."

"Jesus, who knows us well, teaches us a secret: never end a day without asking for forgiveness, without peace coming back to our house, to our family," the Pope advised. "It is normal that there be a quarrel between husband and wife, but there's always something to do about it. We had a fight! Maybe you're angry. Maybe a plate flew, but please remember this: never finish the day without making peace! Never, never, never! This is a secret, a secret to protect love and to make peace."

On this day we join and pray with many of our brothers and sisters who are going through difficult times in their marriages, and pray that God will give them the strength to carry on. I pray especially for those who have been abandoned to raise their children alone. May God grant them the strength to move forward with their lives and may they find peace in taking care of their families. And for those who are getting ready to be united in this holy sacrament, may they find fulfillment in the love they profess. Also, we remember all the singles, widows and widowers in our parish/community, may they be blessed and strengthened.



Saints and Villains of the Bible: Antiochus

To shake things up a bit, let us explore some stories of saints and villains in the Bible that you didn't learn about at VBS. To begin, let us turn to 2 Maccabees 9 and learn the story of the demise of the cruel villain, Antiochus. Antiochus was a ruler of the Seleucid Empire, and ruled the land of the Jews, where he greatly persecuted them. He slaughtered many, forced worship of pagan gods, and outlawed all their religious practices, forcing them to eat pork and participate in pagan sacrifices. He was also called "the mad" because of his mood swings, rash decisions, and eccentric behavior. His rule was marked with rash attempts and subsequent failures of conquest and bizarre tortures. At a certain point, he ordered the Jews to be attacked and conquered by his generals. They failed, and Antiochus was so furious that he swore the Jews would pay. So, he set off with his army and ordered his charioteer to drive without stopping until they arrived, which would take days at least. In his arrogance he said, "I will make Jerusalem the common graveyard of Jews as soon as I arrive there." As soon as he said this, the Lord struck him an invisible blow, and he was seized with excruciating pangs in the bowels. Which, the author comments, is fitting given that he tortured so many other peoples' bowels in his barbarous torments. His hubris wouldn't let him stop, though, for he believed himself invincible. He even at one point legitimately thought he could control the seas and skies. So, he ordered his charioteer to drive faster, but he was hurtled from the chariot and every part of his body was racked from the fall. His soldiers picked him up on a stretcher. However, it got to the point that his flesh started rotting away, and no soldiers would carry him because of his rotting stench. When at last, he couldn't even stand his own stench, he came to his senses and said, "It is right to be subject to God, and not to think one's mortal self equal to God." He then vowed that the Jews and Jerusalem would be set free. He also vowed to become a Jew himself and to proclaim the power of God to every place. He realized that his health was beyond repair, and he prepared himself for death. He ended the persecution of the Jews, and wrote them a letter naming his successor and stating "my hopes are in heaven." His extreme sufferings finally ended when he died a miserable death in the mountains of a foreign land around age 50.



What can we learn from such a villain? Well, the first obvious lesson is never compare yourself to God, or let your pride grow to where you think you know better than God or can compete with God. God is God, and you are not God, so His will is best, strongest, and undefeatable. Second, we can learn that God defends those who love Him. The Bible says that all things work for good for those who love God. Let us be like the Jews who stood strong to their faith, kept the commandments and rules of their faith, and relied upon the power of God to deliver them. It may not always look like deliverance for us, but God, again, ultimately will deliver us in the end. Finally, this Antiochus was so cruel, barbarous, and evil, yet in the end he repented. No one is too far from God's mercy, so long as they receive it. Would we forgive and accept Antiochus if we were Jews in this situation? Or would we kill him at first sight for all the evil he had done? Is there someone you need to forgive? You don't want to be the person who gets to heaven, sees an enemy and leaves because you can't accept that such a person made it to heaven. Let us learn from the villain Antiochus, and never let our pride blind us from the reality that God is in control.

Because of it, he left his native Germany to serve immigrants in the United States—and soon became a Redemptorist priest. His compassion eventually cost Francis his life; he died of the yellow fever he caught from visiting the sick. "Come without fear or trembling! I promise to receive you with all gentleness," he preached. Who are the abandoned or fearful in your own part of the world? Ask Francis to help you comfort them.

MEMORIAL OF BLESSED MARIE-ROSE DUROCHER

Today's readings: Jonah 4:1-11; Luke 11:1-4

Stand with those who hold the fire line

With the increase in wildfires and chronic drought drying out our forests, we need the help of today's saint, Blessed Marie Rose Durocher (1811-49), a Canadian religious foundress. Several of her miracles were reportedly related to wildfires. One such fire, approaching a convent in Spokane, Washington, was said to have changed direction when a picture of Blessed Marie was fastened to a tree. Another facility in Washington was reportedly saved from a wildfire when the owner tossed a picture of Blessed Marie into the flames, turning it back. Ask her intercession in support of everyday miracle workers, the brave and hardworking men and women fighting the wildfires that seem stronger and more widespread by the year.

MEMORIAL OF OUR LADY OF THE ROSARY

Count on the Rosary

Today's Memorial of Our Lady of the Rosary has its roots in a story that, while not historically confirmed, is nonetheless instructive. It is said that Saint Dominic was making little headway in persuading a large group of breakaway Christians to return to orthodoxy when Mary appeared to him, encouraging the Rosary as a new form of prayer-building on the already existing "Marian Psalter." To this

day, Dominican sisters, brothers, and priests stress the Rosary, and millions find meditation, consolation, and community through it. Why not say a decade of the Rosary right now and tap into its centuries-old strength?

Today's readings: Joel 1:13-15; 2:1-2; Luke 11:15-26

God points toward hope

On October 8, 1871, winds swept across the dry Midwestern prairie and helped fan the flames of the Great Chicago Fire and dozens of lesser-known fires, including the Pestigo, Wisconsin Firestorm that ranks as the deadliest wildfire in U.S. history. Local parish priest Father John-Peter Pernin wrote an eyewitness account titled *The Finger of God is There!* His interpretation of events captures the theological struggle believers face amid tragedy: On the one hand, he sees a judging God striking down a people for their sinfulness; on the other, he sees a merciful God filling people with hope and the promise of new life. May the finger of God point you in a positive direction during your times of troubles.


MEMORIAL OF DENIS, BISHOP, MARTYR

Today's readings: Joel 4:12-21; Luke 11:27-28

Keep your head about you!

Saint Denis, a third-century bishop of Paris, is invoked for the relief of migraine headaches, possibly because he is a cephalophore, a Greek term that means "head-carrier." He was martyred by decapitation and was said to have picked up the severed head and trotted off with it under his arm while preaching on repentance. Wild though that sounds, artists depicting the saint over the centuries struggled with the question, "Where do you put the halo? Over his head, or where his head used to be?" Though we smile, a nugget of truth comes through the legend. When we give all we have to God, our life is memorable and our story ends well.

"[Jesus] replied, 'Rather, blessed are those who hear the word of God and observe it.'"
