The Way I Heard It

To truly appreciate the 200-year legacy of faith we have inherited and carry forward to future generations we need to know a little about the faithful people who conceived the idea of the Catholic community that eventually gave birth to our parish of St Lawrence.

Most of those early Catholic pioneers who settled here were poor farmers arriving in wagons or carts with few possessions and a desire for a better life. It is hard for us to imagine what it would have been like for them coming to a totally untamed wilderness. There were no roadways. There were wolves, bears and panthers. There were also the Native Americans who didn't want people moving onto the hunting grounds. There were no churches or priests for hundreds of miles. The Catholic faithful only got to celebrate Holy Mass when the "circuit" priest arrived to their area. Sometimes it could be years before one would make it to the community.

Father Charles Nerinckx is historically given credit for the first Catholic Mass celebrated in this area. Fr Nerinckx was a native of Belgium who escaped persecution and the threat of execution during the French Revolution. He had heard of the need of priests to minister to the settlers of the Kentucky territory and requested assignment. The Bishop of the Diocese of Baltimore, which covered a great geographical area, received his request with relief. He had been having a difficult time getting any priest to take on the vast and very primitive mission. Fr Nerinckx travelled from Baltimore with a group of Trappist Monks to Kentucky by flatboat and covered wagon. When one of the wagons was damaged and caused a lengthy delay Fr Nerinckx purchased a horse and saddle for \$75.00 (that cost was probably the equivalent of a top of the line loaded pickup truck today!) and riding on alone he began his ministry. He covered all of Kentucky west of Nelson County and parts of Tennessee, Indiana, Illinois and Missouri all on horseback. He told of attacks by wolves, sleeping outdoors in all kinds of weather and encounters with men who intended him harm. Because there had been no clergy to shepherd the Catholic flock in western Kentucky, he encountered many who had given up any precept and practice of the Catholic faith. Many had not participated in the celebration of the Holy Eucharist for many years. When the faithful heard a priest was nearby, they would travel by foot or on horseback as much as 15 miles to receive the Sacraments. The priest would spend many hours in a day Baptizing, hearing confessions, performing marriages and celebrating Mass.

In 1822 Fr Nerinckx celebrated the first Holy Mass in Daviess County at the home of Ezekial and Elizabeth Rogers Henning on Aull Rd near what is now Hwy 764. Mr. Henning was not Catholic at the time but his wife was and he later converted to Catholicism. Even though Fr Nerinckx didn't actually establish the parish of St Lawrence his perseverance in his ministry helped to keep our Catholic faith community active and growing.

Presentation of Jesus

Blessed Elizabeth Canori Mora

This week we celebrate the feast of a very perseverant saint, Blessed Elizabeth Canori Mora. Elizabeth was born in Rome in 1774 to an aristocratic family. She grew up in a pious family and obtained an excellent education. She was known as being very intelligent and penitent. At age 21 she married a successful and rich lawyer, Cristoforo Mora. They had two daughters that survived infancy. Their marriage started out well, and Cristoforo was so proud of his wife that he paraded her around, calling her his "pearl of great price." But these external shows were short lived as Cristoforo became controlling and abusive. He limited Elizabeth's visits with her family, and slowly became resentful of her. He started an affair with a poor woman, and gave her all his time and money. He also squandered all his inheritance from his family. This left Elizabeth and their two daughters in extreme poverty, though Elizabeth was always faithful to Cristoforo, praying for him constantly. She became deathly ill, and no doctors could cure her, but she had a mystical experience and was miraculously healed. Her father-in-law was a doctor and also attributed the cure to a miracle. Elizabeth continued living in poverty, and sold all her jewelry, wedding dress, and whatever else she could find to pay off Cristoforo's debts and save his good name. She spent all her time caring for her daughters, praying, and helping the poor. During this time Elizabeth also received many mystical experiences and visions of Mary, Jesus, angels, and the saints. Her friends and advisors suggested Elizabeth to separate from Cristoforo, but she declined. She stated that he had been given to her through the Sacrament of Marriage, and she was entrusted with some responsibility to save his soul. So she prayed for him all the more fervently and believed their union that no

ran to her deathbed and said, "today we have lost a great bride and mother." Elizabeth's perseverance paid off as Cristoforo had a massive conversion and became a Franciscan priest for 10 years before his death. Her one daughter also became a nun, while the other married a good man. Elizabeth's life is a staunch testament to the power of the Sacrament of Marriage and the virtue of fidelity. Venerable Fulton Sheen says in his famous book on marriage that because a husband and wife become one body and soul, one spouse can have a great impact on the salvation of the other's soul, even if the other is utterly resistant. This proved true for Elizabeth. Her husband was utterly resistant, but her faithfulness and prayers brought about the salvation of his soul. He disregarded his vows and spiritual life, but Elizabeth's perseverance made up for him in their unified soul. Let us follow Elizabeth's perseverance and faith in not only our marriages, but also our jobs, parenting, and spiritual life. Blessed Elizabeth Canori Mora, pray for us!

Catholic education for a better world

On this Tuesday of Catholic Schools Week, the focus is on the student. The National Catholic Education Association encourages schools to today recognize students' accomplishments—but also have them embrace the "grounding in faith, knowledge, and service" a Catholic education provides. In a June 2021 address to Latin American Catholic schools, Pope Francis expands this vision even more. He urges "welcoming schools" that "do not retreat into a selfish elitism, but that learn to live together with everyone . . . knowing that everything is connected." His wish? That "schools have conscience and create conscience." Pray for all Catholic students today.

On Epiphany, La Rosca, a cake in the shape of a crown, is shared by family and friends in honor of the Magi, a.k.a., the three kings. The person who finds a small figure of Jesus hidden in their slice of cake is tasked with throwing a tamale party today, the day the infant Jesus is presented at the Temple. Welcome Jesus to your table today.

February 3, 2022

Today's readings: 1 Kings 2:1-4, 10-12; Mark 6:7-13 *Lift up her voice*

Servant of God Mother Mary Elizabeth Lange, O.S.P., died on this day in 1882. Born into a well-educated family of means in the Caribbean, she immigrated to Baltimore in the early 1800s as a free black woman in a slave state. Seeing the need for education among her fellow Caribbean immigrants, she taught out of her home, opened a school in 1828, took first religious vows a year later, and founded the Oblate Sisters of Providence. Mary Elizabeth and her fellow sisters devoted themselves to works of mercy and social

reform, working with communities of color facing poverty, racism, and the degradations of slavery. Nearly 200 years later, the order's work continues strong, as does the canonization process for this remarkable woman. Let Mary Elizabeth's example inspire you to respond to injustice with courageous compassion.

Today's readings: Sirach 47:2-11; Mark 6:14-29 Invest your humanity


On this Friday of Catholic Schools Week, Pope Francis offers supportive words for Catholic educators. "To educate is an act of love, it is to give life. And love is demanding, it calls for the best resources, for a reawakening of the passion to begin this path patiently with young people. The educator in Catholic schools must be, first and foremost, competent and qualified but, at the same time, someone who is rich in humanity" and able to promote spiritual growth. For this, Francis said in 2014, "it is necessary to invest." How can you help support Catholic educators today? "He added beauty to the feasts and solemnized the seasons of each year."

Today's readings: 1 Kings 3:4-13; Mark 6:30-34 Be careful what you ask for

The wisest thing Solomon ever did was to ask for wisdom. Given the chance to ask for anything, he didn't go the route of wealth, fame, immortality, but rather chose the road less traveled. For, as one biblical commentator put it, wisdom is "a bountiful crop with a meager harvest." Often personified in biblical testimony as the feminine face of the Divine, Proverbs tells us that she "cries aloud in the street, in the markets she raises her voice; at the head of the noisy streets she cries out; at the entrance of the city gates she speaks: 'How long, O simple ones, will you love being simple?'" We are Solomon, and the choice is ours to make. What will you choose?
