

REFLECTION ON THE GOSPEL

St. Oscar Romero (1917-1980) was a "Salvadoran Roman Catholic archbishop who was a vocal critic of the violent activities of government armed forces, right-wing groups, and leftist guerrillas involved in El Salvador's civil conflict (Encyclopedia Britannica)." As a voice of the voiceless, he was an outspoken champion of the poor who were the ones most affected by the civil unrest and violence. His advocacy provoked several attempts on his life. Nonetheless, St. Oscar Romero was convinced that before all else his faith in the resurrected Christ and the values of the Gospel trumped any earthly concern or worry. He walked with complete confidence and trust. On March 24, 1980, St. Oscar Romero was assassinated while celebrating Mass. Such is often the fate of those who challenge the socio-political agendas of the day.

We may look at the example of witness of St. Oscar Romero as something extraordinary. In one sense it is. Through the power of God, an ordinary human being did extraordinary things. But, in and of himself, St. Oscar Romero was simply a humble, loving servant of God. Oscar knew not only the power of love but the risk that comes when loving unconditionally. The beauty of God's message was able to shine in and through him because he was able to step out of the way and be a vessel. One can assume that for St. Oscar Romero, one's earthly life has no merit when faith, integrity, conviction, zeal and love are jettisoned. Fear and apprehension had no grip on this man who not only saw but spoke the truth.

Do we speak the truth? It makes us feel good to speak of God as love. But have we ever considered the ramifications of this radical message? There are assaults on human life occurring daily. More and more the value and worth of a human being is being reduced and minimalized. We are becoming widgets in the production of life. In our whole simple humble ways, we too are called to be prophets. Knowing who you are and what is within your means to do, how can you make God's love real, stand up for what is right, and give witness to the sacredness of all that is around you? ©LPi



CLOUT Update

In 2020, in the wake of the Breonna Taylor killing and the following community unrest, CLOUT chose to take on a new area of work under the title of "Community Safety and Equity," with special interest in: racial bias in policing, overall problems in the criminal justice system, and crime and violence (gun violence, homicide rate, etc.).

CLOUT's issue research committee met with the mayor's office, LMPD Chief Erika Shields, the FOP, and other local and national experts in related fields to identify best-practice solutions.

CLOUT concluded that, in order for our community to move beyond the pain and trauma of 2020, and into a future of healing and peace, Louisville should engage the services of the National Network for Safe Communities to lead this community in the process of "Truth & Transformation.".

At CLOUT's 2021 Nehemiah Action Assembly, Metro Council President David James committed to work with CLOUT toward this initiative. In June, 2021 the Metro Council approved \$600,000 funding for it. The initiative is underway and CLOUT remains directly involved to ensure its success.

SFA CLOUT members continue to work on social justice issues collectively with 20 other diverse congregations throughout the community.



The St. Francis of Assisi Middle School Science Fair is in DESPERATE NEED of 29 more judges! You do NOT need to be a scientists or even have a related degree to judge our fair. All you need is a love for children and for learning. An orientation will be held February 1 which will teach you all you need to know about judging. We are especially looking for judges who can judge BOTH the morning and afternoon sessions. Parents from ALL grades are encouraged to help as are family members, neighbors, friends, colleagues, and other Parishioners The fair is virtual/on-line this year so you can do it from home or work! Alumni are especially encouraged to join the team! Please think about judging our fair. We won't be able to have it without enough judges.

WHAT: The Middle School Science / Independent Research Fair will be held on Friday, February 4th! This year, we are hosting our fair VIRTUALLY and presenters/judges will meet using Zoom. There will be morning and afternoon sessions this year, and we desperately need JUDGES who can spend a few minutes listening to the students as they present their findings and discoveries. Since the fair is virtual, you will judge from HOME or your office and you can truly live ANYWHERE and still judge our fair. We had judges judging from as far away as California last year! HOW TO SIGN UP: Please visit

https://sfalouisville.stemwizard.com/public_site/judge_register to register as a JUDGE. There you will provide your contact information, and indicate categories that interest you. We will try to place you in a category of interest or expertise, but there is no guarantee that this will always happen. Rest assured, however, that you are doing work which is noble, essential and deeply appreciated no matter where you end up. We will respond to you the week of February 1st with instructions for the orientation zoom on February 3rd and the Fair on February 4th.

WHO CAN JUDGE: Any adult or alumni who enjoys learning or being around young scientists is invited to become a member of the 2022 Judging Team. A background in science is not necessary. If you love children and learning, then judging is a task in which you will find success. Truly, any parent from any grade, their friends, neighbors, parishioners, or family members are welcome to come. Parents from grades below middle school are welcome to judge as well to get a sense of what the middle school science/independent research fair is all about.

JUDGING RESPONSIBILITIES: Judges spend time listening to students as they present their projects. They ask the students questions and engage them in dialogue about discoveries. A rubric, and a judge's orientation and training are provided. Truly, no previous experience is required! The Zoom or Google Meets orientation meeting for judges will be the day before the fair, on Thursday, February 3rd at a time to be announced. Everything anyone needs to know about judging will be taught then. You WILL know what to do! WHEN: The virtual fair will be held on Friday, February 4th. Right now, we plan TWO SESSIONS- Choose one or both, based on your availability. 9:00-11:30 am and 12:30-2:30 pm. Please, please, please oh please, consider helping us and supporting our students by judging or by letting potential judges (neighbors, friends, parishioners, etc.) know of this opportunity. Anyone who cares about learning, loves working with young learners, or who loves being around people who can turn their curiosity into amazing discoveries is invited to attend!
