
Hofland continued...Mr. Hofland, who works as a consultant with Public Administration Associates (PAA) has served over 35 years in municipal leadership roles in Little Chute, Grafton, and Sheboygan. As the chief appointed administrative officer, Hofland will be responsible for planning, organizing, coordinating, and directing the day-to-day operations and activities of the Town of Greenville. The Town Board has also hired PAA to assist them in the recruitment of the next administrator. It is the Town Board's goal to have the new administrator in place by the end of March.

Town Chairman

Welcome to Winter Greenville! I hope all are finding something to be merry and bright about. 2020 has been an unusual year to say the least. As the Town Staff, civic organizations and you do our best to maintain a course of normality, we all know there has been very little normal about the past year. In this issue of the Greenville Gazette I would like to get your feedback on local speed limits, discuss changes to our local recreational trails, fill you in on significant projects for 2021 and finally discuss next steps for incorporation.

Speed Limits

As Town Chair, I am often approached by citizens of Greenville regarding their concerns. The topic of vehicle speeds on roadways and safety of all users is one I hear about regularly. The concern most have is for the safety of motorists as well as bicyclists and pedestrians. There is no denying more and more people utilize our roads, many designed as narrow rural roadways, to get some form of exercise or take the family dog for a walk. The Town's Comprehensive Plan does have the foresight to add bike lanes and pedestrian facilities as roads are reconstructed in the future, but in the meantime we are faced with formulating a solution that creates a safe roadway for all. I am looking to propose a town wide policy for roadways limiting speed within the sewer service area to 35 MPH and for areas outside the sewer service area to 45 MPH (see map). The exception to this policy would be state and county highways (STH 15, STH 76, STH 96, CTH BB, CTH CB, CTH JJ). I am asking for your input to this proposal and if you might have other suggestions for creating a safe road facility for all users. Recreational Trails

Over the course of the past few winters, the Town Board and our Town Staff have received numerous requests to plow more of our recreational trails so they can be utilized year round. In April 2020 the Town Board adopted a winter maintenance policy for trails and sidewalks. Based on observed use, town recreational trails have been prioritized for snow removal following clearance of roadways. It was also determined some trails will be left uncleared as they are used for cross-country skiing trails or do not have the required amount of usage at this time.



In addition to snow removal, Town Staff will be installing crossing flags for pedestrian's use on a trial basis at the crossings of STH 15 at Hyacinth Lane and also at Lily of the Valley Drive. The flags will be stored on posts near

the crossings and can be carried by pedestrians as they cross the roadway to signal to drivers. Pedestrians can then place them in the containers on the other side of the road as they complete their crossing.

2021 Significant Town Projects

Our 2021 budget has been approved with several significant projects of importance.

Greenwood Road Urbanization: This urban collector will see over 4500 feet of roadway reconstructed with a wider roadway including bicycle lanes and sidewalks on each side. To accommodate this wider road, surface ditches will be filled in and stormwater will be treated at newly constructed facilities. In addition, improvements will be made to the water service and sanitary sewer service in the area.

As the Town of Greenville continues to grow, Greenwood Road becomes a more heavily used roadway for vehicles, bikes, and pedestrians. By installing sidewalks and bike lanes on this section of Greenwood Road, the Town can provide a safe means of movement for bike users and pedestrians.

Lift Station 2 Reconstruction: Improvements to Lift Station 2 will continue into 2021. The wet well is being upsized for 20-year growth with a divider also being included so we can shut one side down while performing maintenance on the other side. Additionally, a by-pass pump is included to ensure continued service in the event of station flooding or pump failure.

Everglade Dredging Phase 2: Bear Creek is being dredged to reduce flooding impacts to Town infrastructure. This project is located north of Everglade Road. The project starts on the north side of Everglade Road east of Donna Drive. The project will dredge 2700 linear feet of Bear Creek with the channel dredged to 10-12 feet in width and approximately 1.5-2.5 feet of sediment buildup removed in places of the project zone.

Fire Station Conversion to Public Works Offices and Garage: This project remodels the interior of the old fire station and converts it to the new Municipal Services Center administrative offices and customer reception area. Pick-up trucks, lawn mowers and other smaller equipment will be moved to the re-purposed building providing a more efficient use of space in the current public works garages and cold storage.

Kimberly Court Trail: Paving of approximately 250 feet of the 10 foot wide trail along the south edge of Kimberly Court to connect to the existing trail system. Roadside ditches will be filled and storm sewer will be installed through this section allowing for a dedicated off-street path. The existing trail route along Kimberly Court is unsafe, especially during school drop-off and pickup times.

Pebble Ridge Area Storm Water Retrofit: A complete stormwater retrofit starting at the Town-owned Pebble Ridge Park Stormwater Pond downstream to School Specialty Dry Basin is planned. The existing system was originally built in the late 1990's to comply with the Town's Flood Control Ordinance at the time. Later retrofits added a wet pond component to Pebble Ridge Park. This proposed retrofit project will design and build a stormwater system that meets today's more stringent

flood control and water quality requirements mandated with the Wisconsin DNR and Federal EPA.

Jennerjohn Park Parking Lot Reconstruction:

Reconstruction of the parking lot and drive entering the park from Rickey Lane is planned for 2021. The parking lot will be redesigned to be more efficient. Stormwater infrastructure will be installed to collect and divert water to stormwater facilities onsite.

Water and Sanitary Sewer Services Study: The water study will tell us how large of a population we can serve with existing infrastructure. Do we have enough water in towers at all times? In the future do we drill another well or put up a tower? Where should we loop the system? Are bigger water mains needed? The study will help us figure out if we are going deep enough with the sewer lines or if we are going to need to put in any lift stations. Also, are we putting in the correct size pipe while installing the new sewer main?

Incorporation Update

On November 3, the electors of the proposed Village voted to move forward with the incorporation of a portion of our community as a village. You may be wondering what's next. There are many details that need to be covered and I will try to summarize for you. Soon our Clerk of Courts will submit the election canvass to the State DOA who will need to certify the incorporation. Intergovernmental agreements will need to be drafted and agreed to between the Village of Greenville and the remnant Town of Greenville. Elections will be held to fill vacant positions on both the Village and Town Boards in February. In March, the Village Board will adopt its Charter Ordinance. In the spring we will host public informational meetings on the process to reunify the Village of Greenville with the remnant Town of Greenville. This will be followed by an Intergovernmental Cooperation Agreement between the two entities and culminate with an ordinance being adopted to adjust the Village municipal boundaries to make Greenville one municipality. It is a lot of work for our staff but will be well worth the effort.

Moving into a new year, 2021 gives each of us a chance to start anew. It is a time to reach out and love those close to your heart, to forgive those needing forgiveness, and to do something unique and special with the talents you have. To once again quote the late Fred Rogers, "It's not so much what we have in this life that matters. It's what we do with what we have."

Plow Infractions

The Town of Greenville has an ordinance that bans the depositing of snow in public right-of-ways. Any snow that is plowed on private property may not be deposited on any street right-of-ways, including ditches, paths and walkways. Pushing snow across or into Town roads is also against this ordinance. All snow that is cleared from your driveway must be deposited onto your own property. The Town of Greenville may issue citations for violations. Citations start at \$25 and may reach up to \$250 for repeat offenders.

Yard Waste Site

During our office closure due to the move to our new offices, stickers will not be sold in-person. Yard Waste Site Permits can be purchased using the Purchasing Form found on our website. Completed forms and the \$20 payment can be returned by mail or in the Town Hall drop box. Permits will then be mailed back to you. Additional sticker in the same household are sold at a discounted price of \$10 per sticker. Permits are good for one calendar year. The Yard Waste Site Policy, along with accepted material and current regulations, can be found on the Yard Waste and Brush Pick Up page of the website. The Yard Waste Site hours are as follows:

Keep Your Pipes From Freezing

Water expands as it freezes, putting pressure on the pipes containing it. Expanding water can cause even metal pipes to break, especially those exposed to harsh, low temperatures like ours in Wisconsin.

- Check water supply lines in unheated areas



Winter Safety Reminders

- Keep all exterior exhaust pipes for your furnaces and water heaters clear of snow so there is not a danger of carbon monoxide backing up into your home
- Extinguish all candles when they are unattended
- Please keep a 3 foot radius around fire hydrants clear of snow

GREENVILLE FIRST RESPONDERS

The Greenville First Responders responded to 333 calls for service as of 11/30/20.

Dress in Layers — You should wear three layers of clothing to keep yourself warm in winter — the base layer, the middle, and the outer layer. The base layer is the most important of the three and will act as a second skin. Make sure that the clothing fits snugly. The more you sweat, the colder your body will become. As such, this layer of clothing should wick away the moisture and keep your skin dry. An ideal material for the base layer would be merino wool, which is lightweight and has excellent breathability. The mid-layer clothing should focus on retaining heat and should be breathable. Wool is a good option since it can retain heat. For people who are budget-conscious, fleece is a decent alternative unless you get wet. The final layer is the insulation layer. It is the outer layer that protects your body from harsh elements like snow, rain and wind. Look for something that is breathable and waterproof.

Fabrics to Avoid — It is best to avoid cotton during winter even if it is comfortable. Not only does cotton fail in insulating the body properly, it will not wick away moisture. This means your body will be wet and cold during wintertime, thus increasing the chances of hypothermia. Synthetic fibers like acrylic, rayon, and polyester are not breathable. Instead, they will make the body sweat by trapping in heat. However, certain types of synthetic fibers do have excellent insulation qualities. Fleece, made from polyester, is one such example.

Head, Hands and Feet — Cover your head with a thick hat or cap. Coats should have a hood. Ensure that the one you choose covers your ears. In addition, it is recommended that you use earmuffs if you do not have a hood. Use gloves to protect your hands. The gloves must be waterproof and have thick padding. Ensure that the cuffs on the gloves extend beyond the cuffs on your coat to avoid exposing the wrists to the environment. Leather gloves are best avoided since they are thin and not waterproof. Where feet are concerned buy a pair of thick socks. Avoid cotton socks and opt for those made from wool. Plus, get a big pair of boots. They should ideally be bigger than your regular size and must be long enough to cover your ankles.

Although it seems like most calls we go on are COVID related, we have been very fortunate to keep a good supply of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE). The shortages have not affected any of our care to our patients and as we mentioned before, it will take us only a few extra minutes to get our equipment on so everyone is as safe as possible. The Greenville Responders wish is that everyone does everything they can to stay safe and hopefully, when summer comes, we can get back to our normal lives and be able to attend some of the many summer events Greenville has to offer.

Rezoning Project

Greenville has been in the process of implementing its new 2040 Comprehensive Plan since adoption in 2019. Since then it has completed major projects including a complete rewrite of its Zoning Ordinance. With the ordinance complete, the next major project to undertake is to proactively rezone properties having conflicting zoning and land uses.

In November, the Planning Commission and Town Board approved the rezoning process. The process includes an evaluation of properties to be rezoned by staff and the Zoning Committee, which is comprised of the Planning Commission and Town and Village Boards. Once the evaluation is complete, public informational meetings are held with property owners, whose property may be considered for rezoning, in order to explain the process and next steps. A public hearing is required with notice sent to property owners and their neighbors about the rezoning.

Accomplishments

Since the adoption of the 2040 Comprehensive Plan in 2019 Greenville has been busy. Staff presented the annual Comprehensive Plan report to the Planning Commission and Town Board in December 2020 to review its accomplishments since adoption. Major projects completed include a complete rewrite of its Subdivision and Zoning Ordinances and development of Sub-Area Plans to help guide future development within specific areas of town. While the plan is a 20 year plan, the above table quantifies the status of action items identified for the first couple years of the plan (2019-2021). Greenville has completed 79 percent of projects identified, with another year to go to try to complete the remaining items. While priorities and projects within any plan may change over time, the elected and appointed officials and members of the public should be congratulated on the plan's success so far. Keep up the great work Greenville!

With the adoption of the 2020 Sub-Area Plan: <http://cms3.revize.com/revize/greenvillewi/Sub%20Area%20Plan%202020.pdf>, the Town Board authorized development of its second Tax Incremental District (TID) for the Heritage District. The purpose of a TID is to spur economic development in an area that otherwise would not see development or growth. This process is expected to be completed by September 2021. A public hearing will be required before the Planning Commission with approval by the Village Board and finally the Joint Review Board. 



We are happily leaving 2020 behind and are hopeful that 2021 will bring better times. We would like to highlight some exciting projects for the New Year:

Hoffman Property Master Plan:

The Hoffman Property is an approximate 7 acre parcel that was generously donated to the Town for the purpose of developing a neighborhood park. The parcel is located along Pricilla Lane in the southeast part of Town. We will be engaging the neighborhood and the greater community in 2021 as we begin the master planning process for this future park.

Jennerjohn Park Parking Lot

Reconstruction: The main parking lot for Jennerjohn Park is in poor condition and will be reconstructed this coming year. The new parking lot will be redesigned to provide a more efficient parking layout and constructed to capture stormwater and divert it to the pond, mitigating some runoff issues.

Expanded Snow Removal on

Trails: In recent years, residents have increasingly requested additional snow removal on our trails. In response, the Town Board adopted a Winter Maintenance Policy for Sidewalks and Trails and an official map identifying which trails will receive snow removal. This winter the Town will be increasing the mileage of recreational trails that we will be removing snow. Visit our website for details.

Lions Park Street Lighting: You may have noticed that the street lights at Lions Park have deteriorated recently. They have reached the end of their useful life and will be replaced in 2021. We will be working with We Energies to replace the existing lights with a more efficient LED model.


