On this Side of the Kingdom



In the Gospel this weekend, Jesus is presented with the issue about some Jewish Galileans who were executed at the hand of Pontius Pilate. The implication is that they must have been “sinners” to have such tragedy befall them. Jesus responds that those people were no more sinful than anyone else, including others in another town who tragically had a tower fall upon them in an accident.

Tragedy happens in our lives just as good fortune happens. Jesus is teaching that any tragic or difficult things in our lives has nothing to do with sinfulness. We have seen war waged in Ukraine and Gaza, and their sin has nothing to do with it. We have seen wildfires and hurricanes take the lives and property of people, and sin has nothing to do with it. We live on an earth which, itself, is alive and sometimes the earth rumbles and burps and storms where people are living. People who experience such tragedy are no more sinful than anyone else.

In his conversation, Jesus seeks to “re-frame” sin. He tells a parable about an unfruitful fig tree. Jesus is saying that sin has to do with not being fruitful with the lives God has blessed us with. The parable shows God as patient with us “trees”, and is willing to cultivate and encourage our fruitfulness. Yet after all the patience and cultivating, our fruitfulness, or lack thereof, will be judged.

In this repenting season of Lent, and in the light of God’s patience for us, we reflect on our lives. We don’t reflect on the unfortunate things that have befallen us but rather we look at our fruitfulness. Being fruitful is not only how much we volunteer or give to charities, but being fruitful is also about how much we radiate God’s light in our lives even in small ways. Our daily lives with co-workers, with friends, with family, with strangers, are filled with moments to be fruitful. Those daily moments in our lives are not about donating but about radiating and being light in the world....living the Good News. We can be fruitful (we can be Light) in the line at the store and in the car while patiently driving. This shows forth in our patience, forgiveness, and compassion, our gratitude and how we live the Beatitudes.

God is very patient, accepting, and forgiving of us. We are reminded of this in the familiar story of Jesus meeting the Samarian woman at the well. As she comes to the well for water she encounters Jesus, who shows to her that he knows even the darkest details about her life. He is patient, comforting, and welcoming to her, offering to her “life giving” water. Filled with new life, she becomes his follower along with many in her town. That is the fruitfulness we are called to.

In this Season of Lent, reflect on your own fruitfulness - do you reflect the light, patience, and compassion of God in your everyday life? Are we caught up in taking sides over issues in our nation and forget to be Christ-like with one another? Are there people we can “be light” that we otherwise struggle with? Take a walk with Christ and reflect on your fruitfulness.

Encourage Deeper Understanding of the Scriptures

My childhood best friend was Xander Price. He was the fastest runner in school, an excellent baseball player and Jewish. Though his family wasn't intensely religious, I felt totally at home with them despite our religious differences. Everything about their Judaism seemed to undergird and strengthen my own experience of being a Catholic. I knew they didn't believe in Jesus like my family did, but I intuited somehow that Jesus was "hiding" in their religion. Like a cat moving under a blanket, ready to emerge at any moment, the Lord was hidden there in a special way.

In the Gospel for this third Sunday of Lent, Jesus says, **"For if you had believed Moses, you would have believed me, for he wrote of me"** (John 5:46). Stunning words, those. Moses wrote about Jesus. The way therefore that we come to know and believe in Jesus is to discover him lurking in Moses' writings. The Hebrew Scripture is the wonderful womb in which Jesus gestates within a host of images: Adam, Isaac, David, Melchizedek, the Temple, sacrificed lambs, prophets and so on. Right now, in your parish's OCIA program, soon-to-be baptized people are carefully studying where Jesus is in the writings of Moses, so that they may believe in him. This works for all of us, too, who wish to deepen our knowledge and love of Jesus.





THE ORDER OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS Scrutinies: Examining Our Lives



This Sunday the elect of our parish will receive the first of three rites called Scrutinies. The following excerpt from the Catholic Update: Lenten Customs Baptism Is the Key, March 2002, provides an understanding of these rites within the OCIA process and our parish.

"The primary way that the Church assists the elect in this conversion process during Lent is through the celebration of the rites called Scrutinies. These ritual celebrations on the Third, Fourth and Fifth Sundays of Lent are communal prayers celebrated around the elect to strengthen them to overcome the power of sin in their lives and to grow in virtue. To scrutinize something means to examine it closely. The community does not scrutinize the elect; the elect scrutinize their own lives and allow God to scrutinize them and to heal them."

"All of us are called to continuing conversion throughout our lives, so we join with the elect in scrutinizing our own lives and praying to God for the grace to overcome the power of sin that still infects our hearts."

Please continue to keep our catechumen and candidates for initiation in your prayers and greet them with words of love and encouragement.




