

A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

Happy Easter!

As we may have noticed, during Lent the church was pretty stark. There were no flowers and decorations to fill our worship space with the beauty of nature. Now that we have come to the celebration of Easter, obviously our church is once again adorned with colorful flowers and other

decorations reminding us of the joy this day brings. We take it for granted that when Easter comes the church will be full of flowers. But, we may not realize that there is a spiritual symbolism to it.

During Lent, the worship space was stark and almost empty. In many churches, there is still the custom of covering the statues and religious images with purple cloth starting from the fifth Sunday of Lent until the Easter Vigil. All of this is meant to convey a clear message. Our sins closed us off from heaven aka paradise. The starkness of the worship space emphasized how dry our lives truly are if we remained closed off from God's life. The covered statues and images are a visual reminder of how our view of heaven is blocked as long as we remain in the grips of sin.

Starting today, however, the worship space is full of flowers and color. The reason for this is simply because we are marking a return to Eden. When God first created human beings, everything was in peaceful order and harmony. Adam and Eve had all they needed. God provided them with food and companionship. Everyone was in right relationship with one another. But, after the Fall – when Adam



and Eve sinned – all went wrong and our first parents committed an error that caused them and us to be banished from paradise. As we journeyed through Lent, we received constant reminders to turn away from sin in order to be ready to make a return to paradise. Today, Jesus is risen from the dead and he has opened the gates of heaven once again. Today, we are returning to paradise.

The church is adorned with flowers and has been made beautiful for the Easter celebration as a visual reminder of what Jesus had done. In Jesus' death and resurrection, God Himself restored the broken relationship that resulted from our giving in to the devil's tempting. We are being reminded that all is once again in perfect harmony. God has won the war with the devil and we have once again been given access to the garden of paradise.



Our Lenten journey had first to take us to the desert where we were purified and prepared for what lay ahead of us. Jesus took us to his cross to witness his painful death. We were made to look at our Savior crucified because it was a testament to the limits to which God was willing to go in order to show us His love. Today, the tomb of Jesus lies empty as proof that there is no power greater than God's love. It is God's love that has conquered the devil. It is God's love that has given us entry back into paradise. It is God's love that has given us the opportunity once again to live life with God rather than apart from Him. As we gather in our church this weekend and in the weekends to come, it will remain decorated to be a reminder of our reentry into the Garden of Eden, the call for us now is to be constantly aware that we live in the presence of God. When we face each day with a renewed sense that we have been made one with God, it will reflect itself in the way we live our lives. The joy of knowing that God has restored our broken relationship with Him, which is the joy of Easter, will become so obvious in us that people will know that there is something different about us.

Today, we rejoice because Jesus' triumph over sin and evil has allowed us to live once again in paradise. It is not the same Garden of Eden as was the case with Adam and Eve. We may not always feel as if we are living in paradise. But, we have been given the gift of life with God rather than life without Him. Wherever and whenever we live with God, we are in paradise. As we celebrate Jesus' victory here on earth, let us again rededicate ourselves to embracing the gift that we have received in Jesus' rising from the dead. Let us stand confidently asking God to send his Spirit to be with us every step of our lives. May that same Spirit remind us always that we are truly in the presence of God whether we are here in church or elsewhere.

A Blessed Easter!

e relish this joy of Easter, thanking God for letting us share in this victory, for

giving us this hope. We do not stop there though. Let's not just enjoy Easter, let's let it change our lives. Christ's resurrection is not just a nice idea; it is the power of eternal life at work in us. Why not do something for the eight weeks of the Easter season to plug into that power?

We made an effort to live Lent in a special way. Most likely we gave something up for Lent. That was a practical way to give the special graces that God sends during Lent some room to work in our souls. So, if we gave something up as a way to help us live the penitential season of Lent, why not take something up as a way to help us live the joyful season of Easter? In the Second Reading, St Paul encouraged us to "think of what is above, not of what is on earth." Why don't we make an Easter resolution that will help us do that, that will help us keep in mind the eternal life in Christ that is waiting for us if we stay faithful to him?

It could be something simple: like inviting a friend or family member who has forgotten about Christ's victory to come to Mass on Sundays and then inviting them over for brunch or lunch; like watching a classic movie together as a family each Sunday between now and Pentecost - a joyful, uplifting movie; like having a special outing or get-together with friends on Fridays; like taking some time each evening to re-read some of your favorite books, the ones that stir up joy in your soul.

If we ask the Holy Spirit to give us some ideas, he won't be stingy. He just needs us to decide to let Easter make a difference in our lives, the way it should. Our souls need that as much as they needed the time of penance and contrition that we lived during Lent. The Church is a wise mother in giving us six weeks of Lent and eight weeks of Easter.

As we receive the risen Lord in the Eucharist, let's promise him that we will find a way to benefit from that wisdom.

Why does the Profession of Faith begin with the words, "I believe in God"? 198-199 The Profession of Faith begins with these words because the affirmation "I believe in God" is the most important, the source of all the other truths about man and about the world, and about the entire life of everyone who believes in God.

37. Why does one profess belief that there is only one God? 200-202; 228 Belief in the one God is professed because he has revealed himself to the people of Israel as the only One when he said, "Hear, O Israel, the Lord our God is one Lord" (*Deuteronomy* 6:4) and "there is no other" (*Isaiah* 45:22). Jesus himself confirmed that God is "the one Lord" (*Mark* 12:29). To confess that Jesus and the Holy Spirit are also God and Lord does not introduce any division into the one God.

38. With what name does God reveal

Himself?203-209; 230-231 God revealed himself to Moses as the living God, "the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, the God of Jacob" (*Exodus* 3:6). God also revealed to Moses his mysterious name "I Am Who I Am (YHWH)". Already in Old Testament times this ineffable name of God was replaced by the divine title *Lord*. Thus in the New Testament, Jesus who was called *Lord* is seen as true God.



OUR PRAYER LIFE

TODAY'S READINGS AND REFLECTION

<u>First Reading:</u> This man God raised on the third day and granted that he be visible, not to all the people, but to us, the witnesses chosen by God in advance, who ate and drank with him after he rose from the dead. (Acts 10:40-41)

<u>Reflection Question:</u> Peter speaks about himself and the other apostles as "witnesses" to Jesus' public ministry as well as his death and resurrection from the dead. What are some ways you could give witness to the risen Jesus this week?

<u>Psalm:</u> This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad. (Ps 118) Or Alleluia.


<u>Second Reading</u>: If then you were raised with Christ, seek what is above, where Christ is seated at the right and of God. (Col 3:1)

<u>Reflection Question:</u> Paul encourages the Christians in Corinth to see themselves as a community defined by sincerity and truth rather than malice and wickedness. Does this describe your circle of friends?

<u>Gospel:</u> For they did not yet understand the Scripture that he had to rise from the dead. (Jn 20: 9)

<u>Reflection Question:</u> The two women (Mary Magdalene and the other Mary) experience a range of emotions (from fear to being overjoyed) as they encounter first the angel and then the resurrected Jesus. How do you imagine you would react to encountering Jesus risen from the dead?







Buckets of Hope – the need is great!

Buckets of Hope is a program where 5 gallon buckets are shipped to disaster areas, *such as Mississippi*, when it has become safe for people to start the cleaning process. Each bucket contains 14 common cleaning items. We have partnered with organizations such as Catholic Charities, local disaster coordinators, The International Union of Operating Engineers and various moving companies to move filled buckets to a place of need. **To date, we have shipped 2,900 filled Buckets of Hope valued at \$87,000 worth of cleaning supplies to disaster areas.** This has been accomplished through the generosity and cooperation of many pastors, deacons, parish staff, and many interested individuals. *Thanks Be To God.*

A "Bucket of Hope" contains the following items:

- 1. Liquid laundry detergent, one 50 62 oz. bottle
- 2. Liquid household cleaner, 48 oz. mixed with water.
- 3. Dish soap 30 oz. bottle, any brand
- 4. One can of air freshener (aerosol)
- 5. One scrub brush, plastic
- 6. 18 cleaning handy wipes or reusable wipes. Two packages
- 7. One large auto-style sponge
- 8. Three to five scouring pads, one pack
- 9.36 to 50 clothes pins
- 10. Clothes line (one 100-foot)
- 11. 18 (3 packages) heavy-duty trash bags, 30-45 gallon
- 12. One package of dust masks
- 13. Two pairs of disposable waterproof gloves
- 14. One pair of work gloves (leather palms necessary)

CATHOLIC REFLECTION OF THE WEEK	RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS				
"When Jesus had risen, early on the first day of the week, he appeared first to Mary Magdalene, out of whom he had driven seven demons." (Mark 16:9) Popular Catholic piety sometimes posits that the newly risen Jesus appears first to the Blessed Virgin Mary. It is a happy thought, but it's simply not what the scriptures report. We are told quite directly that he appeared first to Mary Magdalene, "out of whom he had driven seven demons." Why would the gospel writer remind us of this unsavory detail of Mary's past? Historians tell us women were not qualified to give legal testimony. On top of that, to be possessed by not just one, but seven demons, is unsavory and terrifying. What damage had they done to her? What did she do to allow herself to be home to such evil? It doesn't seem to matter. Jesus chose Mary Magdalene to be the first one who saw him risen from the dead. He decided she was qualified. Do you think that you are disqualified from seeing and announcing the risen Jesus because of your past demons? Maybe they are the demons of despair, confusion, self-hatred, pride, addiction, failure, boredom, laziness, or other sins. Well, don't. In the light of the Risen Jesus, all these past demons make our witness that much more believable — only if we allow ourselves to be touched by the liberating hand of Christ, just as Mary Magdalene did. <i>—</i> Father John Muir ©LPi	Easter Sunday and Object Permanence When you play peekaboo with a very young baby who has not yet developed object permanence, you actually feel kind of mean. As soon as your hands obscure your face, their little eyes widen with alarm and their expression crumbles into confusion and despair. Because they can no longer see you, they believe you no longer exist. Their little brains are unable to understand that just because a thing cannot be seen, it is still there, still alive, still full of love and care and protection. Aw, man, you can hear them thinking. I guess I don't have a mom anymore. On Easter morning, Mary Magdalene sees the burial cloth but no body. Her human mind makes sense of the situation the best way it knows how, she assumes the Lord has been taken. I'm sure I would have thought the same thing, in her position. She cannot conceive, on her own, the reality that Christ has risen from the dead. It doesn't matter that he has told his disciples again and again that this will happen. They weren't ready to understand then. In many ways, Easter is when the human race really achieved object permanence. But we still struggle with it, don't we? I certainly do. So often I can be heard accusing God: "You weren't there. Where were you? I couldn't find you." But I looked for him in the flesh. I looked for him in the stale yeast of the world — in money or success or affirmation or (worst of all) convenience and pleasure.

WHY DO WE DO THAT?					

<u>Question:</u> Why Marry in a Church? Why are Catholics required to get married in a church, and not outside or at a different venue?

<u>Answer:</u> Because the sacrament of marriage is a sacred covenant between the husband and wife, the celebration of the sacrament of matrimony is much more than simply a social or family event. So, the rule that the sacrament be celebrated in a church is a way to help reinforce the deeper meaning of Christian marriage. To help make this clearer, the Church's tradition also normally includes the celebration of the Mass when the marriage is being celebrated between two Catholics, and so a church or chapel is the ideal setting. For special reasons — which vary from diocese to diocese — the local bishop can give permission for the marriage to be celebrated in another suitable place.

Today we are issuing a Decree of Canonical Establishment of the newly-formed parish of St, Julie Billiart in Tinley Park, Illinois.

In accordance with Canon 455, of the Code of Canon Law, we are pleased to appoint you herewith as Pastor of St. Julie Billiart Parish, Tinley Park, Illinois, and we heartily commond you to the good people there. The enclosed copy of the Decree of Canonical Establishment should be retained as part of the permanent records of St. Julie Billiart Parish.

You will note that the Decree takes effect on November 28, 1974, and this appointment to the Pastorate will take effect on the same date. November 28, 1974, and will be valid for a term of six years, that is, to November 28, 1980. We wish you to take canonical possession of this parish as soon as possible thereafter.

You will assume canonical possession and jurisdiction of the above-mentioned parish as soon as the Profession of Faith is taken before the Chancellor, or one of the Co-Chancellors, acting as our Delegate according to the provision of Canon Law.
