A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

Happy Corpus Christi!

Recently, the Archdiocese has given permission for parishes to resume the custom of distributing Communion under both the Host as well as the Precious Blood. This weekend, we will be returning to the practice of having Communion both under the host as well as the Precious Blood. Before I explain how the procedure will be, this might be a good time to review our belief in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist.

As Catholics, we believe that Jesus is truly present in the Eucharist. The Eucharist is truly Jesus' Body and Blood made real in a mystical way. This remains true even as an alarmingly large number of Catholics do not believe it to be so. Once consecrated, the

bread becomes the Body of Christ and the wine becomes the Blood of Christ. However, there are several things that we must take into consideration.

1. Language means a lot.

The words we use to refer to the Eucharist is important. What do I mean? Many times we may hear people referring to the host as simply "bread." Or, we may hear people referring to what is in the chalice as "wine." This is really inaccurate and we need to refer to the Eucharist properly. For many, we may think it to be simply a matter of semantics. But, the words we use are a great statement of faith.

If we refer to the Eucharist as simply "bread and wine," we run the risk of forgetting the Real Presence of Jesus. God has the power to make the impossible possible. Only God can take ordinary elements of everyday life and make them into something much, much more. Before the words of consecration, we can properly refer to the gifts brought to the altar as "bread and wine." However, after the words of consecration, we need to refer to them for what they have become. After consecration, the bread is no longer bread and the wine no longer wine. They truly are the Body and Blood of Jesus.

We refer to the consecrated bread as the "Host." The word "host" comes from the Latin "hostia" which means "victim." As the Host, the Eucharist truly is the presence of Jesus who was/is the victim sacrificed to set us free and to make us holy. If we refer to the Host as "bread" after consecration, we run the risk of thinking that the Eucharist is nothing more than a symbol. On the contrary, for us as Catholics the Eucharist is not a symbol but the "real deal."

We also refer to the consecrated wine as the "Precious Blood." After consecration, again the wine is no longer simple wine. It has been transformed into the very Blood of Jesus which is more precious than anything else. By Jesus' Blood, he has won us for God. Using the term Precious Blood to refer to the consecrated wine becomes an act of recognition but also gratitude for the Blood of Jesus poured out for us.

2. Jesus is present in both host and Precious Blood.

Of course, during COVID we were unable to distribute Communion under the Precious Blood. Many made the comment that they felt the experience of Communion was "missing something." They asked "When are we going to resume the custom of Communion in the chalice?" What we must remember, though, is that Jesus is fully present in both the Host and the Precious Blood. Receiving Communion under either one of those species allows us the full experience of communing with both Jesus' Body and Blood.

We cannot speak of a body without blood. A body without blood is a lifeless body. Likewise, blood that is separated from the body is basically nothing. Blood is what carries life through the body. What we receive in the Eucharist is Jesus fully alive. Jesus cannot be fully alive if he does not have both body and blood. Receiving the Host without the chalice does not make the experience of Communion as "less than special." Other than the priest who is required to receive under both, if you receive the Host, you have consumed Jesus' Body and Blood. Likewise, if anyone receives just the Precious Blood, the same is true.

3. Jesus' Real Presence is something that needs to be celebrated.

At the moment of consecration, the mystery happens. The entire Eucharistic Prayer has also been described as the prayer that consecrates the bread and wine. This is the moment when we as a parish community ought to rejoice and acknowledge this truth. We have been doing it in several ways. For one, we have started the habit of chanting the Preface to the Eucharistic Prayer. The presider always prays the Eucharistic Prayer fully aware of what he is doing and what is happening. The altar server rings the bells to remind us that we are witnesses to the greatest miracle that can ever take place. We believe that Jesus is real and present in our lives. The Eucharist is living proof of that. Why should we not bring attention to it?

4. So how will we distribute the Precious Blood?

For the time being, we will have only two (2) lay ministers distributing the Precious Blood in front of the altar on either side of the lay minister assigned to the low-gluten host. Those wishing to receive the Precious Blood are invited to go to those ministers AFTER receiving the Host. Ministers have been trained on how to wipe the chalices in such a way that helps prevent the spread of germs. Of course, you do not have to receive from the chalice if you prefer not to do so. Also, if you are not feeling well, we ask that you refrain from receiving from the common chalice. Again, receiving Communion in either the Host or the Precious Blood is already the full experience of communing with Jesus.

Just a final reminder, if you prefer to receive the Host on the tongue, please go to either the priest or deacon. We are trying to respect the preference of some of our lay ministers who do not feel comfortable placing the Host on anyone's tongue.

We receive the Body and Blood of Christ at Communion so that we can become who we are called to be in the world. Happy Corpus Christi!

Happy Corpus Christi Sunday!

Just as the Lord became human like us, he also often uses our human experiences to talk about divine realities, especially about our relationship with the Lord himself.

I mentioned in my homily on Holy Trinity Sunday that I got asked what happened to the goat. I was referring to an anecdote I shared on Ascension Sunday. I likened the experience of the disciples, listening carefully to every word of the Risen Lord before ascending to the Father, to my own childhood experience with my two older siblings paying close attention to the instructions of mom and dad whenever they would need to be away from home for the whole day for an important task in the city. One of the instructions was to make sure to move the goat to the shade at one point of the day. What happened to the goat? Yes, we did move it to the shade. We did what we were instructed to do. In a similar way, we are called to do the same – pay attention to every word of the Lord and the sign of the cross is a useful prayer and tool to remind us always to actually do and fulfil the Lord's instructions for us, his disciples.

I guess I can continue with another episode of this childhood story of mine by telling you that when mom and dad would come home, we would be looking forward to receiving a bag of bread from the city. Imagine my siblings and me enjoying the fresh bread while reporting to mom and dad what we did the whole day while they were away. Today is Corpus Christi Sunday, and the Lord uses again a common item of human experience, that is, the basic food stuff of bread. Unlike my childhood story though, we don't have to wait for the second coming of the Lord to receive and relish the bread. We always have that opportunity going on in our lives of receiving the bread of life, the Lord himself, in the Eucharist. Every time we receive Him in communion, we are assured of being part of the body of Christ, the Church. Just as St. Paul says, "The bread that we break, is it not a participation in the body of Christ?

Because the loaf of bread is one, we, though many, are one body, for we all partake of the one loaf."

TODAY'S READINGS AND REFLECTION

First Reading: "He therefore let you be afflicted with hunger, and then fed you with manna, a food unknown to you and your fathers." (Dt 8:3)

Reflection Question: At the end of their forty-year journey in the desert, Moses instructs the Israelites not to forget how God taught them to depend on Him alone. How might you remind yourself of this important lesson in life?

Reflection Question: Jesus teaches the crowds that through his body and blood believers will obtain eternal life and be raised on the last day. This is the core of our Catholic belief about Jesus. How do you think we can best celebrate this gift of eternal life?


PRAYER SHAWL MINISTRY



CARE FOR CREATION:

Compost: Food scraps and yard waste together currently make up about 30 percent of what we throw away, so consider composting instead. Making compost keeps these materials out of landfills where they take up space and release methane, a potent greenhouse gas. Your compost can then be used to enrich soil and reduce the need for fertilizer. CATHOLIC REFLECTION OF THE WEEK

Years ago, a woman at daily Mass approached me in the communion procession. She had her arms crossed, indicating she wanted a blessing instead of the Sacred Host. She had tears in her eyes. I gave her a little blessing. She returned the next day. And the next. The same thing repeated. After a few weeks, I asked her why she didn't receive Holy Communion. She said she wasn't Catholic yet and was preparing to become so. I asked her why she wanted to be Catholic. She said, "Because I long to be in a real communion with Christ and with everyone I love." That, I submit, is a darn good reason. A few months later, she became Catholic and received the Body and Blood of Christ with unspeakably great joy and still does to this day. Saint Paul says of the Eucharistic bread, "Is it not a participation in the body of Christ?" For Paul, the answer is obvious. Yes, it is exactly that. Which is why he can say, "we, though many, are one body." Jesus is truly, really, and substantially present in the Holy Eucharist. This is no magic trick, but a mystery of our salvation. He feeds us with the Sacrament of his body so that our communion with him — and with the other members of his body — is built up and becomes mature. That's why the Eucharist quenches our deep thirst for love and communion. The Body and Blood of Christ is the best reason to be Catholic. It's our participation of love in the one we - Father John Muir love. ©LPi

LIVE THE LITURGY - INSPIRATION FOR THE WEEK:

The Eucharist is the most sacred thing in the world, and yet in his mercy, God has made it accessible. In the Eucharist, God bends to meet us. Appearing under the appearance of our daily nourishment, he makes it not just possible but simple — blessedly simple — to fulfill his commandment.

RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

"These two Sacraments were born together," wrote St. John Paul II of the priesthood and the Eucharist, "and their destiny is indissolubly linked until the end of the world."

The Eucharist is such a beautiful example of how God, conscious of our limitations, bends to meet us. He once came to us cloaked in the flesh, that we might recognize Him. Now He comes as the very means by which we nourish ourselves: food and drink, the most familiar and comforting thing in the world to us. How easy He makes it to fulfill his command that we become one with Him. How generous He is to make such a sacred thing also accessible.

We can say the same of the priesthood, and of the men He calls to its number. How generous of Him to make such an accessible thing — our sons, our brothers, our uncles, our cousins — sacred. How generous of Him to allow these human creations — who share in our own faults — to be the means through which He comes to us in the Eucharist.

Without the Eucharist, we would have no eternal life. Without priests, we would have no Eucharist. On this, the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ, let's give thanks for our priests, and redouble our prayers that God will send us good and holy ones — manna from Heaven in our wandering exile.

WHY DO WE DO THAT?

Question: How do you explain "Real Presence" to children?

<u>Answer</u>: The first Communion class is filled with excitement to the point of bursting! They are just awestruck by every new thing they learn about Jesus. Their enthusiasm is contagious as they rattle off the names of the things in church, the vessels and vestments used at Mass, and the names of their pastors and priests. Of course, they know Christ can do anything because he's God. He comes to us in holy Communion because he loves us so much that he wants to be with us. And he comes to us in the form of bread and wine. We really receive him in the Eucharist. Sometimes it is easier to explain this to children than to adults. Their faith and trust in Jesus is not limited by the questions and doubts that often come with the question of how he does it. Rather, they focus on the question "why," and the answer is something they can easily grasp:

love. Christ wants to be with us because he loves us. Nothing is purer in truth or in faith. Not even the theological explanation of transubstantiation, or philosophical reasoning or symbolic references, come close. Christ takes on the form of bread and wine to be simple and approachable, so that no one is afraid or turned away. His love for us is complete and total. We try to love him the same way in return. For a child, it is simple. For us adults, we keep trying. "Unless you turn and become like children, you will not enter the kingdom of heaven" (Mt 18:3).
