BEING DISCIPLES OF JESUS

A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

You have seen us wear them. You may even have commented on how beautiful they look. But have you ever wondered why we wear them and how they came to be part of the celebration of the Mass? I am referring to the vestments that we priests and deacons wear whenever we celebrate the Church's liturgies – especially the Mass.

Wearing ceremonial robes is not something unique to our Catholic experience. Virtually all major religions have their ministers use robes or distinctive clothing of some kind

whenever they are acting in official or presidential capacities. We even see it in the civic world. Judges will wear robes while on the bench in a courtroom. At graduations, the graduates are clothed in cap and gown. But, we can also see professors, faculty, and staff dressed in academic attire particular to their respective fields of study. Again, we have seen them. We have admired them. But what purpose do they serve?

In this instance, I will focus on the garments – aka vestments – that are particular to the Catholic liturgy. Understanding their development and symbolism will help us to appreciate their significance even more. Like many things in the Church, the sacred vestments find their roots in ordinary daily garb that took on more significance as fashion styles changed.

First, the priest or deacon wears a white garment known as an "alb." The word comes from the Latin meaning "white." The alb can be traced back to the ancient Roman garment worn by citizens of the Roman Empire. Originally, the Roman tunic had no sleeves but could have ornamentation made by the dye from herbs and vegetables. Purple was the preferred color of those higher up in the Roman Empire. Eventually, sleeves were added as fashion became more sophisticated.

The modern alb used as a sacred vestment must always be white in color. Sometimes, an alb may be more beige in color if it is made with pure wool which in its natural state is beige in color. It was Pope Innocent III in the 13th century that stipulated that the alb needs to be white since it represents the purity of the clerical state. For this reason, the white alb is now understood as a sacred garment that symbolizes the purity of the priesthood. However, the alb has also been described as symbolic of the baptismal garment. In either case, the alb is to be seen as a physical representation of the garment made pure white because of the sacrifice of Christ. This is the garment in which all followers of Jesus have been clothed – including priests and deacons.

Once the alb is worn, many priests and deacons will wear a rope around the waist known as a cincture from a Latin word meaning "girdle." The meaning of the word indicates its origins. The cincture is a rope — usually white in color but can also follow the colors of the liturgical season — and was meant to be a belt which would keep the alb in place. Today, when worn, the cincture represents the life of chastity to which the ordained man is called according to his proper state in life either as one who is married or one who has chosen to remain celibate for the sake of the Kingdom.

Over the alb and the cincture, the priest or deacon will wear the stole. The stole is the symbol of the particular sacred office to which a man has been ordained — that is, as a priest or a deacon. A stole is simply a narrow scarf-like garment. The word comes from the Greek that indicates a "towel." A deacon's stole is draped over the left shoulder and tied at the right waist. A priest's stole is draped over the back of the neck with both lengths hanging in front of the priest's body. Sometimes, the cincture is used to keep the stole in place.

The stole also came from a functional garment. Its origins come from a primitive scarf. While a person was alive, this scarf was used to keep the neck and upper body warm during the cold seasons. When a person passed away, the same scarf was oftentimes used to cover the face of the deceased before being wrapped in the burial shroud.

The stole represents the sacramental role of the ordained man. It is a most sacred vestment because it is a clear reminder to the priest or deacon that he was chosen not because he was worthy but because God chose him for a sacred purpose. For this reason, the priest or deacon kisses the stole before putting it on and after

taking it off as a way to give thanks to God for the gift of ordination bestowed upon him as a gift from God.

Covering everything, the final sacred garment worn by priests is the chasuble. This also has origins in everyday garments. This time, the chasuble is rooted in the poncho-like garment of the working class. The chasuble remains to this day a sacred garment that looks like a poncho. The chasuble is a vestment that only priests or bishops wear whenever celebrating the Eucharistic liturgy.

The chasuble has gone through several developments throughout the history of the Church. The origins hint that early chasubles were full length from neck to ankles and extending the entire arm span. This was more commonly known as the Gothic style chasuble. During the Renaissance, the Roman style chasuble developed. The Roman style is sometimes known as a "fiddleback" because it resembles the shape of a large bass fiddle. Many might remember these chasubles during the time of the pre-Vatican II liturgy. Today, most parishes use a more Gothic type of vestment. However, the Roman style can still be used.

Whereas the chasuble is a vestment reserved only for a priest or bishop, there is also a similar vestment that a deacon may wear which is the dalmatic. Some deacons choose not to wear the dalmatic but the option to do so is always there. The dalmatic gets its name from the region of Dalmatia in modern day Croatia along the Adriatic Sea. It was the garment of high ranking members of civil society. In the 4th century, the dalmatic became the normal garment of deacons of the Church.

As the Church grew both in numbers and in expanse, she gradually adapted many civic and cultural customs using them to enhance the worship of the faithful. Using distinctive garments during the celebration of the Church's liturgies simply helps us to remember that what we do at every liturgy is so much more than just a gathering of people. The liturgy truly is our collective effort at praising God who is alone worthy of all worship and adoration.

Jesus gives us a glimpse of his heart in today's Gospel passage, but he also gives us a glimpse of his head. His heart overflows in feelings, concern and compassion for the suffering crowds of people following Him around, but He doesn't stop at mere feelings. He does something constructive with them. He acts intelligently. He puts his mind to work, helping those people He cares about.

The first thing He does is gather His Twelve Apostles. He spends three years with them, training them, equipping them, and getting them ready to become the first leaders of His Church. This was His leadership team, His group of key players. As part of their training, He sends them out on this first missionary journey. It is not a random mission. He gives them specific instructions. They are sent preaching and healing to the Jewish towns first, not the pagan ones. This shows that Jesus had a plan. He was going to build His Church by stages, organically, in a structured way.

Do we approach our faith like that? When we want to build a business, engage in research, or achieve any success in earthly matters, we put our minds to work. We come up with a strategy, set goals, troubleshoot, problemsolve, multi-task, evaluate, report, and get very demanding with ourselves and our coworkers. Building up the Kingdom of Christ in our hearts and in those around us is a much more important and fulfilling project. Yet, in this crucial task we so often put our brains on the shelf and let ourselves be guided by vague feelings and doubtful inspirations. Christ did not. He had vision, clear objectives, and a specific plan. He gave us His heart, but He also used His head. TODAY'S READINGS AND REFLECTION

<u>First Reading</u>: "Therefore, if you hearken to my voic and keep my covenant, you shall be my special possession, dearer to me than all other people, though all the earth is mine. You shall be to me a kingdom of priests, a holy nation." (Ex 19:5-6)

<u>Reflection Question</u>: The Lord teaches Moses that Israel is intended to be his "treasured possession among all peoples ... a kingdom of priests, a holy nation." How would you react when you receive an incredible gift?

<u>Psalm</u>: We are his people: the sheep of his flock. (Ps 100)

<u>Second Reading</u>: Indeed, if, while we were enemies, we were reconciled to God through the death of his Son, how much more, once reconciled, will we be saved by his life. (Rom 5:10)

<u>Reflection Question</u>: Paul teaches the Christians in Rome that believers are reconciled to God and saved from the final wrath through the death of his Son, Jesus. What do you think we should do with this incredible message of reconciliation and salvation?

<u>Gospel</u>: Then he summoned his twelve disciples and gave them authority over unclean spirits to drive them out and to cure every disease and every illness. (Mt 10:1)

<u>Reflection Question</u>: Jesus commissioned the twelve disciples to "proclaim the kingdom of heaven is at hand" and "cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse lepers, drive out demons" — in other words, disciples are called to follow Jesus' lead. How can we modern disciples follow Jesus' lead?

CATHOLIC REFLECTION OF THE WEEK	RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS
In the backyard of the house where I live with other priests, there is a lemon tree which produces a huge amount of fruit. One evening in the spring I needed some lemons for a chicken dish. I glanced from the kitchen and saw the tree bursting with large, bright, gorgeous lemons, hanging thick on seemingly every branch. Turning to Fr. Bob (I'll change his name to protect the innocent) who sat on the couch, I said, "Father, could you pick a few lemons for me?" He said sure and into the backyard he went. He returned a few minutes later empty-handed. "John, there's no lemons. Sorry." I said, "What are you talking about?" I looked again and saw the grapefruit tree on the other side of the yard, which had recently been picked clean of fruit. He didn't see the abundant fruit because he was looking in the wrong place! Like Fr. Bob, we sadly don't see the fruit all around us. We think that the culture is spiraling down, young people avoid church, and the future looks bleak. Why go out into the world and work? The world looks like a fruitless tree.	What does it mean to be God's "special possession"? Our world is dominated by things, objects, possessions. To say we are a materialistic culture is an understatement. In that context, it can be really hard to fully appreciate the meaning of being "possessed" by God. I have so many possessions, after all. I acquire and discard them without thought. I am even overwhelmed by them. Sometimes, it feels like they possess me. But then I think of the week after Christmas in a house with small children. In that week, there is always The Toy. The Toy that won the heart of your child under the tree, The Toy to which they emotionally attached themselves in a whirlwind of twinkle lights and sugar cookies. For that one week, The Toy is all there is. There were many gifts, but The Toy is special, and there can only be one. So, what does it mean to be "possessed" by God? What does it mean to be of his people? It means you will be cherished and protected in ways you do not deserve and cannot understand. It means you are distinguished not by your own merit, but by the love with which you are beheld.
Jesus doesn't see things that way. This week he tells us, "The harvest is abundant, but the laborers are few." Look again: there is spiritual fruit hanging all around us! The lonely ready to be visited. The sick ready to be healed. The forgotten ready to be remembered. The poor ready to be treated with dignity. The sad ready to be consoled. The young ready for the Gospel. So, let's ask the Lord to send laborers to get to work. And he will. He might send you and me. change if we did.

<u>Question</u>: I've noticed that when I go to Mass at different parishes, sometimes people say and do different things. Why is that?

Answer: The Mass in its current form has taken shape over the course of 2,000 years. Over time, traditions, structures, and prayers have been put into place. There are certain rubrics for the Mass that are normative wherever you go. This means you could attend Mass in Malawi or Thailand or Italy and still watch the same basic liturgy unfold, even if you don't understand the language. There may be some cultural differences from place to place, things that aren't specifically listed. For example, in the United States most people go up for Communion in a nice, neat line. In Europe, everyone gets up around the same time. It's a bit of a free-for-all! Some people might take it upon themselves to change things individually. People may not like something that feels too "liberal" or "conservative," and they may take a well-meaning stance in the opposite direction. When people (including the presiders) do things that are distracting or change the liturgy, it introduces an element that breaks the unity of the assembled community. The important thing to remember is that we gather as the Body of Christ to celebrate the Eucharist. If you are confused, ask! If you are frustrated, pray for the spirit of charity.
