BEING DISCIPLES OF JESUS

A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

There are two Saints the Church celebrates this week that are worthy of notice. First, Monday July 3rd is the Feast Day of St. Thomas the Apostle. The next day, July 4th, in addition to being our Independence Day, is the Feast Day of St. Elizabeth of Portugal.

We know St. Thomas' name very well as "Doubting Thomas." In many ways, it is unfortunate that St. Thomas has earned that nickname. Generations of Christians before us and generations after us will forever consider St. Thomas to be the one who refused to

believe the news of Jesus' Resurrection without first being able to touch the marks of Jesus' wounds with his own hands. However, St. Thomas' doubting was not without reason.

For one, we have to remember that all of the Apostles and disciples were filled with doubt immediately after Jesus' death. They were hearing the news that people were seeing Jesus all over the place. In many instances, there were multiple disciples claiming to have seen Jesus at the same time but in different locations. All of that was perhaps a bit too hard to believe without evidence.

Second, St. Thomas' doubt was perhaps more of a defense mechanism than anything else. Again, St. Thomas and the others were witnesses to Jesus' death. That death took them by surprise because they never expected things to happen in that way. They were thinking that Jesus was going to go into battle with the oppressive forces and come out victorious. St. Thomas and the others were not expecting Jesus to die on the cross in such a cruel manner. After seeing their friend and master die in that way, they were devastated. St. Thomas rightfully did not want to believe immediately the reports of Jesus' resurrection simply because he did not want to get his hopes up once again only to have those hopes once more dashed against the rocks.

What St. Thomas ought to be celebrated for is simply the fact that he did not remain in doubt. He verbalized his doubt. He accepted his reluctance to believe. But, once that doubt was alleviated, St. Thomas moved directly into a complete and wholehearted dedication to Jesus. Did he ever experience doubt again after that moment? He must have faced challenges during his own ministry that filled him with as much doubt as before. The only difference was that the power of the Resurrection made him more convinced that following Jesus was the absolute right choice for him. Perhaps that is what we must learn from him today.

The next Saint is St. Elizabeth of Portugal. She was a member of a royal family that has become an example of patience and being an instrument of peace. She was born in 1271. As a young child, she was raised with many healthful influences both socially and spiritually. All of that seemed to prepare her well for her future. At a mere age of 12, St. Elizabeth was given in marriage to Denis the King of Portugal. Even as the wife of a king, St. Elizabeth never forgot her upbringing. She lived a life of charity and love serving the needs of everyone who crossed her path no matter who that person might have been. Regardless of peoples' status in society, St. Elizabeth was a model of generosity and charity.

St. Elizabeth was also a model of patience especially when it came to her husband. Denis was rather unfaithful to his wife which was a major scandal. Despite this, she persisted in becoming an instrument of peace for her husband. This finally came to fruition when he gave up his sinful ways. St. Elizabeth was a peacemaker in every sense of the word even in many other relationships and circumstances.

As we honor these two Saints of our Church, may we be inspired by St. Thomas' confident resolve to follow Christ. Let us also be guided by St. Elizabeth's example and build or restore the bridges that connect us one to another.

I find it imperative to continue with our conversation on the ever present reality of pain and suffering in this world. It needs to be emphasized that we are not called to seek out suffering and pain. We are called to seek God's grace for ourselves and for others to stay faithful to responding to, and sharing to others, God's love amidst inevitable pain and suffering.

We continue to meditate on this. It is hard to follow Jesus Christ, to be a Christian, but it is worth it. That sums up the message our Lord is trying to communicate to us in today's Gospel passage. It is a message that we constantly need to be reminded of. At first, it almost seems like Jesus is trying to discourage us from following him. He warns that friendship with him is demanding. To be a true friend of Jesus Christ means that everything else has to be put in second place. Everything has to be put on the table, even personal dreams, even family ties. The demands of our friendship with Jesus Christ will require us to carry a cross, to sacrifice self-gratifying desires, maybe even to endure great suffering. That sounds hard, painful, maybe even unreasonable. However, God knows what he is doing. If he calls us to this kind of life style - which he does - it is only because he knows that this is the path to lasting happiness. If we are truly living for God, to give him glory and to build up his Kingdom in the world, then God will take care of us. We will not lose our reward. St Paul understood this. This is why he tells us in today's Second Reading that to share Christ's life the life of the redeemed soul, the new life of grace won for us by Christ's passion and resurrection - we must also share Christ's death. We have to die to self, to put to death all selfish and self-centered desires, in order to rise with Christ, to live the life of the Spirit, the life that gives true meaning and satisfaction to our lives.

Yes, it is hard to follow Jesus, but it is worth it – nothing else even comes close.

TODAY'S READINGS AND REFLECTION

<u>First Reading</u>: "I know that Elisha is a holy man of God. Since he visits us often, let us arrange a little room on the roof and furnish it for him with a bed, table, chair, and lamp, so that when he comes to us he can stay there." (2 Kgs 4:9-10)

<u>Reflection Question</u>: The Shunammite woman is rewarded with the promise of a newborn son for her generous hospitality to the prophet Elisha. To whom could you show a good measure of charity this week?

Psalm: For ever I will sing the goodness of the Lord. (Ps 89)

<u>Second Reading</u>: Are you unaware that we who were baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? We were indeed buried with him through baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live in newness of life. (Rom 6:3-4)

<u>Reflection Question</u>: In Paul's view, since Jesus defeated death in his resurrection, he challenged the believers in Rome to think of themselves as "being dead to sin and living for God." How often do you think of ways to put your faith into action?

<u>Reflection Question</u>: Jesus teaches his disciples about the challenges and rewards of following him. What do you personally find most challenging or rewarding in following Jesus?

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ST MARIA GORETTI-FEAST JULY 6TH



Have you heard of the patron saint of purity? Born to peasant parents in southern Italy, St. Maria Goretti was a devout girl whose life was marked by difficulty. Her father died when she was nine, leaving her single mother with six mouths to feed. Two neighbors helped on the family farm, including a young man named Ales-

sandro. He began making crude comments towards Maria. She repeatedly denied him. After several years, Alessandro attacked Maria to force himself on her. She resisted and, in his anger, Alessandro stabbed her. Maria died from the wounds' infections, but her last words were "I forgive Alessandro Serenelli, and I want him with me in heaven forever." While he was in prison, Maria appeared to Alessandro with a bouquet of roses, one for each wound he inflicted. In a true miracle of mercy, Alessandro experienced repentance, became a Franciscan brother after his release, and was later present at Maria's canonization. St. Maria Goretti, pray for us!



PRAYER TO ST THOMAS THE APOSTLE-FEAST JULY 3



CATHOLIC REFLECTION OF THE WEEK

As a boy my favorite board game was "Chutes and Ladders." The players roll dice to move from the start to the finish, from the bottom of the board to the top. If you land on a chute, you slide back and down. It was a bummer. Land on a ladder, and you jump well up the board and near the goal. It was a thrill to find a ladder and draw closer to the goal. That's life, isn't it? At every moment, we're either moving closer or farther from the goal of our lives.

How do we win? Jesus tells us the secret of life's chutes and ladders hinges on getting our loves rightly ordered. What we love in life is meant to be a ladder, drawing us up into God's love — including our family, friends, work, play, food, and drink. Even to give your water to someone out of love for Christ leads to a sure reward.

But those ladders of our loves can become chutes. If we love even our family members more than Christ, we slide down and back. If we love the persons and things in our life for the sake of Christ, He says we "surely will not lose our reward." The key difference between a chute and ladder, between our spiritual regression and advancement, is our willingness to renounce everything - even our own life for the love of Jesus. To allow everything and everyone we love to draw us to love him more — that's the difference between chutes and ladders. — Father John Muir ©LPi

WHY DO WE DO THAT?

Question: Is the Catholic Mass really celebrated the same throughout the whole world?

Answer: One of the truisms of the Catholic Faith is that "wherever you go in the world, the Mass is the same." In fact, the answer to this question is both "yes" and "no." On the one hand, the essential elements of the Roman Rite are the same. The structure of the Mass as it is presented in the Roman Missal is consistent and this is one of the beauties of belonging to a liturgical tradition. On the other hand, however, there are elements of celebrations that can vary depending on the country or even local region you might be in. For example, in certain parts of the world, certain feasts and solemnities are celebrated on different days (even here in the United States the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord can be celebrated on Thursday of the Sixth Week of Easter or it may take the place of the Seventh Sunday of Easter, depending on what diocese you are in). Whether it is the use of certain liturgical colors, local celebrations of regional saints, special seasonal blessings of crops or produce, or the use of dance and processions all demonstrate a sort of organic variety that can exist even within our established liturgical tradition. While we always respect what is essential to the rite, such local variations and traditions are very much in keeping with the vision of liturgical renewal and adaption envisioned by the Second Vatican Council's Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy (nos. 37-40). ©LPi

RECOGNIZE GOD IN YOUR ORDINARY MOMENTS

"Move back in with us until you save enough for a decent house," my mother told me over and over again as the birth of my second child neared.

My little family was quickly outgrowing our rented space, but the housing market in our area was a nightmare for firsttime homebuyers. As appealing as the offer was, I kept refusing, convinced that my mother didn't understand the chaos, disruption, and loss of personal space that such a move would mean for her and my dad.

I was wrong — she did. And eventually she wore me down. When my son was three months old my family of four moved back into my old bedroom. My parents made an office space for my husband in the basement, and they converted their den into a playroom for two of the loudest children you will ever meet. They told us we could stay as long as we needed to (it ended up being two years). They greeted us with love and warmth every morning and never made us feel like we were an inconvenience.

Today's first reading always reminds me of my mom, not because I consider myself a prophet (hardly) but because of the way she received me — specifically, in whose name she received me.

I've always tried to understand exactly what makes my parents' acts of love — toward me, toward each other, toward perfect strangers — feel so genuine. I think, after more than 30 years, I've finally realized the secret: my parents love God more than they love me. They love God more than they love anyone.

Like making room in their life and their home for me and my boisterous family, these acts originate in sacrifice. They don't come cheap. They come from the cross. -- Colleen Jurkiewicz Dorman ©LPi

CARE FOR CREATION

Cool Efficiently. Nearly half of the energy used in your home goes to heating and cooling. So making smart

decisions about your home's heating, ventilating, and air conditioning (HVAC) system can have a big effect on your utility bills - as well as on fossil fuel energy consumption and Creation Care! Cooling tips include:

- Cover windows with drapes or shades especially on south and west facing windows.

- Weather-strip doors and windows, then add adequate insulation to keep the heat out.

- Regularly maintain home HVAC equipment and change filters. Programmable thermostats also save money.

- During the hottest part of the day, turn off anything that produces heat such as stoves, dishwashers, lights, etc. Also, consider turning up the thermostat temperature several degrees.

- If your AC is old, consider replacing with an Energy Star System. Better yet, see if replacing it with a highly efficient heat pump will work for you (which can both heat and cool your home). For more info:


