### A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

Totus Tuus begins again this weekend. On behalf of the entire parish community, I welcome at this weekend's Masses the missionaries that will be running the weeklong camp for teens and young children. This is an opportunity that I and others have been encouraging children and parents to take part in for the benefit of the faith journey of our youth.

For those who might need a refresher, the phrase Totus Tuus comes from the Latin meaning "Totally Yours." It was the motto of Pope Saint John Paul II. The phrase refers to a

dedication to the Virgin Mary. In becoming totally dedicated to the Virgin Mary, she, in turn, teaches us the way to belong totally to Christ.

There are five pillars of the program:

### 1. The Eucharist

Every day, all of the participants in the day program will go to Mass at 11:15am. As we have done in the past, ALL parishioners are invited to join the campers for Mass. The Eucharist is the "source and summit" of our Christian lives. The experience would be missing a great deal without this essential component.

### 2. Marian Devotion

The motto of Pope St. John Paul II was centered on a devotion to Mary. She is the preeminent disciple – the one who truly shows us the way to hear the Word of God and act on it. Marian Devotion is also another important aspect of the Totus Tuus experience. Participants will pray the rosary and learn to appreciate the beauty of this most ancient prayer to form their total dedication to Christ through their love of the Virgin.

### 3. Catechetical Instruction

A Catholic Summer Camp loses meaning and focus if catechesis is not an essential component. To become better disciples of Jesus within the Catholic Church, our younger generation needs to understand what we believe in order to live it out. This weeklong camp is not meant to replace what children will gain from either a Catholic school experience or a parish Faith Formation program. Instead, it is meant to enhance and enrich what they already are learning.

### 4. Vocation Discernment

We can all agree that our younger generation is faced with so many more distractions than before. Totus Tuus seeks to give the participants some of the tools in order to discern what are "things of the world" and what are the "things of heaven." In being able to distinguish between the two, future generations will be better equipped to discern their individual vocations. A vocation is not only a calling from God but also a way of dedicating oneself to a particular way of life through which he/she can live out one's discipleship.

### 5. Fun

The final essential component to Totus Tuus is fun. Disciples have to be "on fire" with love for Jesus and this will never happen unless they are formed in such a way where they see clearly that the life of discipleship has a direct impact on their daily lives. Totus Tuus never wants to see the children bored about their faith. Instead, we seek to see them more and more engaged.

In the coming week, I ask that we all pray for our Totus Tuus missionaries and the children and teens from both St. Julie and St. George together with all our volunteers. May we all grow in our love for Jesus.

### "For my yoke is easy, and my burden light."

- Matthew 11:30

Fr. Roy Belocura Associate Pastor frroy@stjulie.org I mentioned last week that it is hard to follow Jesus, but it is worth it. Inevitable pain and suffering is what makes it hard, like a burden put on our shoulders

- a yoke. However, once we learn to pick the yoke that is of the Lord and recognize more fully the preciousness of what is beyond this world, the joy and peace deep within us begin to transform every experience of doing what is previously considered impossible because of suffering and pain.

Christ brings peace to our souls. We have all experienced Christ's peace, at least a little bit. We have tasted the joy of his forgiveness in the sacrament of confession, the assurance that He is taking care of loved ones who have died, the consolation of knowing that He is near. However, for most of us, that interior peace is not so deep and steady as we would like. The storms of life still seem to upset the ship of faith on which our hearts sail. Is there anything we can do to experience Christ's peace more steadily, securely, and deeply? "Take My voke upon you," Jesus says, "and I will give you rest." What is that yoke? Jesus tells us, "Learn from Me, for I am meek and humble of heart." Humility is the secret to experiencing Christ's peace. The more we grow in humility, the more Christ's peace, strength, and wisdom takes over our hearts.

Like all the virtues, humility grows gradually, like a muscle, if we exercise it. There are three very easy ways to exercise humility. First, prayer. Every time we pray sincerely, we acknowledge our dependence on God - an act of humility. St. John Vianney used to say, "God commands you to pray, but He forbids you to worry," - variation of the old saying, "Courage is fear that has said its prayers." Second, speaking well of other people. Every time we observe and praise the good points of others, we loosen the shackles of arrogance and envy that bind humility. Third, obedience to God's will. Whenever we fulfill our responsibilities in life, follow our conscience, and obey God's will, we are humbly reversing the arrogant rebellion of original sin.

Jesus continues to exercise His own humility and love by coming to us in Holy Communion. We respond by allowing ourselves to long for His peace, and ask Him to lay His restful yoke of humility upon us. COMPENDIUM of the Catechism of the Catholic Church Part One - The Profession of Faith Section Two - The Profession of the Christian Faith CHAPTER ONE <u>I Believe in God the Father</u>

> The Symbols of Faith Heaven and Earth—**The Fall**

**73.** How should we understand the reality of sin? 385-389 Sin is present in human history. This reality of sin can be understood clearly only in the light of divine revelation and above all in the light of Christ the Savior of all. Where sin abounded, he made grace to abound all the more.

**74. What was the fall of the angels?** 391-395; 414 This expression indicates that Satan and the other demons, about which Sacred Scripture and the Tradition of the Church speak, were angels, created good by God. They were, however, transformed into evil because with a free and irrevocable choice they rejected God and his Kingdom, thus giving rise to the existence of hell. They try to associate human beings with their revolt against God. However, God has wrought in Christ a sure victory over the Evil One.

**75. What was the first human sin?** 396-403; 415-417 When tempted by the devil, the first man and woman allowed trust in their Creator to die in their hearts. In their disobedience they wished to become "like God" but without God and not in accordance with God (*Genesis* 3:5). Thus, Adam and Eve immediately lost for themselves and for all their descendants the original grace of holiness and justice.


#### ST KATERI TEKAKWITHA-FEAST JULY 14TH



On July 14th, we celebrate the feast of the "Lily of the Mohawks." St. Kateri Tekakwitha is the first Native American woman to be canonized. Orphaned by a smallpox outbreak, Kateri survived with severe scarring and impaired eyesight. Despite tragedy, she was a devout girl at a young age, often building crosses from sticks in the woods. When she was 18, she began secret instruction in the Catholic faith with French missionaries. Her commitment to Christianity and vow of virginity was misunderstood and ridiculed by her fellow villagers. She escaped to a nearby mission, where

she attended daily Mass, taught the children, and cared for the sick and the elderly. Sometimes the greatest

misunderstandings can come from those closest to us. Like St. Kateri, God invites us to be faithful to our commitments of faith and to always respond in love.



### CATHOLIC REFLECTION OF THE WEEK

Do you ever feel restless? I certainly do. Daily tasks and challenges, but also the more basic demand of simply existing — sooner or later, this can all feel crushing and tire us out.

Which is why Jesus' words are such stunningly good news: "Come to me all you who labor and are burdened and I will give you rest" (Matthew 11:28). How vastly weird that this man speaks as though he is capable of giving us the deep repose we desire. Is his claim the height of absurd grandiosity? No, because next he immediately proclaims that he is "meek and humble of heart."

We here touch a mystery: Jesus is capable of giving us rest because he is the one who forever reposes in the heart of God the Father. He is "yoked" to the Father in his divinity. But he is humbly "yoked" to us, sharing in our humanity.

The good news, my fellow tired-out friends: we don't have to despair in our burdens and exhaustion, no matter how heavy they feel. This week, join me in opening our hearts to hear him say to us, "Come! I will give you rest." We come to him in the Church, Eucharist, the Scriptures, prayer, in the poor. There he will give us rest.

But it's also shockingly, senselessly beautiful. It is full of physical experiences of love, joy, and peace that are so powerful they leave you breathless.


It is both these things — good and bad, hard and wonderful, just as we are both body and soul, spirit and flesh.



### Laundry Energy Saving Tips

There are two ways to reduce the amount of energy used for washing clothes—use less water and use cooler water. Unless you're dealing with oily stains, the warm or cold water setting on your machine will generally do a good job of cleaning your clothes. Switching your temperature setting from hot to warm can cut a load's energy use in half.

- •Wash your clothes in cold water using cold-water detergents whenever possible.
- •Wash and dry full loads. If you are washing a small load, use the appropriate water-level setting.
- •Dry towels and heavier cottons in a separate load from lighter-weight clothes.
- •Don't over-dry your clothes. If your machine has a moisture sensor, use it.




