A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

Next on the list of "secret prayers" comes at the start of the Liturgy of the Eucharist as the gifts of bread and wine are brought to the altar.

First, with the bread to be consecrated, the priest says the following:

Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation, for through your goodness we have received the bread we offer you: fruit of the earth and work of human hands, it will become for us the bread of life.

As the chalice is being prepared either by the deacon or the priest himself, the following is said inaudibly:

By the mystery of this water and wine may we come to share in the divinity of Christ who humbled himself to share in our humanity.

Then, with the chalice prepared, the priest prays:

Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation, for through your goodness we have received the wine we offer you: fruit of the vine and work of human hands, it will become our spiritual drink.

In some cases—for example if there is no hymn being sung during the Preparation of the Gifts—the two prayers "Blessed are you..." may be said out loud. If so, the people would respond to both with:

Blessed be God for ever.

As with the other prayers so far, there is a lot for us to contemplate. With the two prayers that begin "Blessed are you..." we actually are reminded of our roots in the Jewish tradition. These prayers are very similar and, in fact, are based on ancient Jewish prayers which are still recited today. The foundation of these is found in what is known as the Berakha Prayers. These are formulas used by our Jewish brothers and sisters to pronounce a blessing over something that was given by God as a gift to benefit humanity in some way. Even the response of the people also has strong Jewish influence. The simple point to these prayers is to acknowledge that all good gifts come from God and our natural response to God's goodness is gratitude.

As for the prayer that the priest or deacon prays quietly as he prepares the chalice, there is symbolism and theology to the prayer. For one, many may have noticed that the deacon or priest puts a little bit of water into the wine as the chalice is prepared. Oftentimes in the ancient world, water was added to wine as an extender. That way, there would be more to go around especially at celebrations that lasted for several days.

But, even in the ancient Church, the water was given the symbolism of Jesus' humanity while the wine represented his divinity. In this way, we are again reminded of the truth that Jesus—as the Second Person of the Trinity made Incarnate—is both fully human and fully divine. Water and wine became a natural way for the early Christians to emphasize this truth. We even see this in iconography. Icons of Jesus will have his inner garment painted in red symbolizing his divinity while his outer garment would have the color blue representing his humanity. Water and wine—humanity and divinity—come together in Jesus in perfect harmony which makes Jesus the perfect and pure sacrifice that brings salvation to all humankind.

Then, after the gifts have been prepared, you might have noticed that the priest bows at the altar. At that

point, there is another "secret prayer":

With humble spirit and contrite heart may we be accepted by you, O Lord, and my our sacrifice in your sight this day be pleasing to you, Lord God.

The purpose of a sacrifice – from ancient times until now – is to create a "bridge" that connects humanity with the divine. However, it has always been recognized that humanity lacks the perfection needed to be fully in the presence of the divine. With this simple prayer, the priest prays on behalf of the people fulfilling his role as mediator between the people and God. On everyone's behalf, he simply prays that God might look with favor on the gifts we offer in gratitude for the blessings that He has shared with us.

At the end of the Preparation of the Gifts, the priest washes his hands. Some have said that this action is reminiscent of Pilate washing his hands prior to Jesus' crucifixion. However, it was rooted in a very practical necessity. In ancient times, when the congregation would bring their gifts to the priest, there could be livestock included in the offerings. Before handling the bread and wine, the priest would naturally need to wash his hands for hygiene's sake. Today, the prayer the act of washing his hands have taken on the symbolism of the priest's own sins being washed away by God's grace in order for him to be worthy enough to handle the sacred gifts of Jesus' Body and Blood. The prayer goes like this:

Wash me, O Lord, from my iniquity and cleanse me from my sin.

This once again motivates the priest to confess his own unworthiness before the altar of God. Yet, despite his unworthiness, God has chosen him to have an important and essential role – to stand as mediator between God and humankind.

"Lord, save me!"

- Matthew 14:30

In the Gospel today, Peter shows **■** both his impulsiveness and his inconstancy - two characteristics that make him easy to relate to. It's around 3 o'clock in the morning as the

Apostles battle against a stormy sea, and Jesus comes walking across the lake towards the boat. The Apostles are scared stiff - they think they are seeing a ghost. Even Jesus' reassurance doesn't allay their fears. So Peter takes the matter into his own hands and challenges the ghost to do something that only Christ could do - enable him to walk on the stormy water. And he does - for a few steps. But then Peter takes his eyes off Christ; he looks around at the waves and the storm, and he starts to sink. As long as Peter kept his eyes on Christ he was able to walk unhindered through the stormy sea. As soon as he let his eyes wander away from Christ to examine the intimidating waves, he began to sink. Just so, as we strive to make our way through the stormy temptations and challenges of life in a fallen world, only focusing on Christ can keep us afloat. Christ is always close to us in our storms, asking us to believe in Him. In His words to Peter, tinged with disappointment, we see how much He longs for us to trust Him: "Why did you doubt?" As soon as Jesus steps into the boat, the storm gives way to peace and calm. Christ wants to be our peace, our strength, and the solution to life's troubles. St. Peter didn't learn this lesson right away, but he learned it well; in his First Letter he put it like this: "cast all your anxieties on Hm [Christ], for He cares about you" (1 Peter 5:7).

What does the Council of Chalcedon (in the year 451) teach in this regard? 467 The Council of Chalcedon teaches us to confess "one and the same Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, perfect in his humanity, true God and true man, composed of rational soul and body, consubstantial with the Father by his divinity, and consubstantial with us by his humanity, 'like us in all things but sin' (*Hebrews* 4:15), begotten from the Father before all ages as to his divinity, and in these last days, for us and for our salvation, born of Mary, the Virgin and Mother of God, as to his humanity."

89. How does the Church set forth the Mystery of the Incarnation? 464-470; 479-481 The Church confesses that Jesus Christ is true God and true man, with two natures, a divine nature and a human nature, not confused with each other but united in the Person of the Word. Therefore, in the humanity of Jesus all things - his miracles, his suffering, and his death - must be attributed to his divine Person which acts by means of his assumed human nature.

TODAY'S READINGS AND REFLECTION

First Reading: His clothing was bright as snow, and the hair on his head as white as wool; his throne was flames of fire, with wheels of burning fire. (Dn 7:9)

Reflection Question: In a vision, the prophet Daniel sees the heavenly throne of God and the coming kingdom of God represented by a human figure, a "son of man." The vision speaks to God's everlasting love and ultimate control of the world. Why do you think God reveals Himself in visions?

Psalm: The Lord is king, the Most High over all the earth. (Ps 97)

Second Reading: When that unique declaration came to him from the majestic glory, "This is my Son, my beloved, with whom I am well pleased." We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven while we were with him on the holy mountain. (2 Pt 1:17-18)

Reflection Question: Peter speaks of his eyewitness to the majesty of Jesus Christ. How might you witness to family or friends this week your beliefs about Jesus?

Gospel: And he was transfigured before them; his face shone like the sun and his clothes became white as light. (Mt 17:2)

Reflection Question: The transfiguration reveals Jesus's divinity to Peter, James, and John, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased; listen to him." What would you say is the most important lesson from Jesus that we should listen to?



CATHOLIC REFLECTION OF THE WEEK

What is Christianity finally about? These days if you ask almost anyone who doesn't know the Bible you'll probably hear an answer like this: "Being a good person" or "following the golden rule." No offense to the golden rule, but our faith is simply much stranger than that. This week's feast of the Transfiguration of the Lord is a luminous example of this. Jesus becomes radiantly and overwhelmingly beautiful. The glory of God literally shines forth from his body and even his clothes. Here we see that Christianity is not mainly a moral system, but a relationship with God in Christ, one that finally makes human beings gloriously beautiful.

Now we can see our good and bad deeds in a new and de-centered way. Our morality isn't about a heaven or hell scorecard. It's about lives open (or closed) to transfiguration, lives capable of revealing the glory of God in Christ to the world. Spouses, children, friends, co-workers, priests, consecrated women and men, and so on — we are all called to let the beauty of Jesus make our lives beautiful, little by little. His beauty in us is the center of our faith.

WHY DO WE DO THAT?

Question: Why do Parishes Offer Special Masses like Thanksgiving and Memorial Day, even though they're not Holy Days of Obligation? Am I obligated to attend?

Answer: Out of respect for the various civil celebrations that take place during the year, many dioceses and parishes will host special Masses. However, while it always worthwhile to come together to worship as a community, Catholics are not obligated to attend these celebrations. As the Catechism of the Catholic Church notes, the only times that we are obligated to participate in celebrations of the Eucharist are on Sundays and holy days of obligation:

The first precept ("You shall attend Mass on Sundays and holy days of obligation and rest from servile labor") requires the faithful to sanctify the day commemorating the Resurrection of the Lord as well as the principal liturgical feasts honoring the mysteries of the Lord, the Blessed Virgin Mary, and the saints; in the first place, by participating in the Eucharistic celebration, in which the Christian community is gathered, and by resting from those works and activities which could impede such a sanctification of these days.




