BEING DISCIPLES OF JESUS

A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

So I bet that you never thought that there were this many "secret prayers" involved in the celebration of the Eucharist. But, there are several more that happen right before and after receiving Communion.

After the Lamb of God, the priest bows at the altar and prays silently:

Lord Jesus Christ, Son of the living God,

who, by the will of the Father, and the work of the Holy Spirit, through your Death gave life to the world, free me by this, your most holy Body and Blood, from all my sins and from every evil; keep me always faithful to your commandments, and never let me be parted from you.

This prayer acknowledges a couple of things. One, the bread and wine at that point are no longer bread and wine. Rather, they have become the Body and Blood of Jesus. Secondly, it is a confession of the priest's own unworthiness to receive Holy Communion. But, because of his role as the mediator and the one who offered the sacrifice, he is bound to receive Jesus' Body and Blood despite his personal sinfulness. The priest's personal sins does not prevent the Eucharist from being validly celebrated for the benefit of the faithful.

Then, right before receiving Communion himself, the priest prays silently:

May the Body of Christ keep me safe for eternal life.

Likewise, with the chalice, the priest prays:

May the Blood of Christ keep me safe for eternal life.

These simple phrases are a strong prayer of trust that it is only the grace of God that the priest — and indeed all the faithful — will be brought to eternal life. The priest prays that receiving Holy Communion with Jesus' Body and Blood will keep himself on the path that will lead him to eternal life. This is a reminder to us that even though the path to salvation has been clearly paved out for us by Jesus himself, we, by our own will, can choose to stray from that path. When we stray from that path, we can lose the gift of eternal life.

Then, at the end of Communion, the priest purifies the sacred vessels. In essence, the priest is "washing the dishes after the meal." This is his responsibility and, even though the purification can be postponed until after Mass, doing so in front of the people conveys a simple yet powerful message. The priest is not above "doing the dishes after the meal." For this very reason, purifying the sacred vessels at the altar immediately after Communion sends the message that the priest has been conformed to imitate the life of Jesus who came to "serve and not to be served."

The remaining "secret prayers" will be part of next weekend's article. For now, I hope that this has helped you to learn some things about the Eucharistic liturgy and grow in appreciation for the 2,000+ year Tradition of how the Church has celebrated it.

The Lord has one and the same purpose for whatever He asks of us and whatever He permits to happen in our lives: to lead us to Christian wisdom and maturity. When He teaches us,

through the trustworthy magisterium of His Church, that abortion is always wrong because it directly kills an innocent human life; when He teaches us that artificial contraception poisons the relationship between husband and wife because it separates the two meanings [unitive and procreative, or unifying and life-giving] that He Himself built into sexual intercourse; when He teaches us that the meaning of life is not to be found in pleasure, possessions, or popularity, and that each one of us has the responsibility to invest our time, treasure, and talents in the good not just of ourselves but of our neighbors; when He teaches us all these things, He is not just trying to complicate our lives. No! Our Lord wills the salvation of all people. His heart vearns for us to experience life as He meant it to be lived. That is why He points out the dead-end roads of comfort and self-indulgence that contemporary culture decorates, praises, and makes look so inviting. Jesus is reminding us today, by this miraculous cure of the demon-possessed girl, that His heart beats for us. His is history's most selfless heart. He demands great things of us because He loves us so greatly. Let us resolve to renew our faith in His love, our commitment to be faithful to His commandments, so that we never find ourselves stuck at a spiritual dead-end.

CHAPTER TWO

I Believe in Jesus Christ, the Only Son of God

90. Did the incarnate Son of God have a soul with human knowledge? 470-474; 482 The Son of God assumed a body animated by a rational human soul. With his human intellect Jesus learned many things by way of experience; but also as man the Son of God had an intimate and immediate knowledge of God his Father. He likewise understood people's secret thoughts and he knew fully the eternal plans which he had come to reveal.

91. How did the two wills of the incarnate Word cooperate? 475; 482 Jesus had a divine will and a human will. In his earthly life the Son of God humanly willed all that he had divinely decided with the Father and the Holy Spirit for our salvation. The human will of Christ followed without opposition or reluctance the divine will or, in other words, it was subject to it.

92. Did Christ have a true human body?

476-477 Christ assumed a true human body by means of which the invisible God became visible. This is the reason why Christ can be represented and venerated in sacred images.

93. What does the heart of Jesus

exemplify? 478 Jesus knew us and loved us with a human heart. His Heart, pierced for our salvation, is the symbol of that infinite love with which he loves the Father and each one of us.

CATHOLIC REFLECTION OF THE WEEK:

The suffering of a child symbolizes uniquely terrible evil as well as despair about the future. This week's Gospel gives a "limit" case in which Jesus encounters this evil in the form of a mother with a suffering daughter. What he does is stunning and massively helpful for us if we bravely ponder the details.

The Canaanite woman comes to Jesus and begs his mercy. "My daughter is tormented by a demon," she declares to him. Shockingly, he responds first with silence, then with a dismissive comment, and only then finally accedes to her third request. Is this simply a lesson in perseverance in our petitions to God, who is like a genie in a bottle? Does that justify the humiliation and pain this woman suffers? Is the Lord cruel?

I don't think so. Notice how the encounter ends. She compares herself to a dog at the table of a master. Jesus responds by praising her great faith and fulfills her deep desire. Somehow this non-Israelite woman intuits that this harrowing situation is not dumb suffering. She senses that the door of God's family is, in Jesus, being opened to her and her loved ones. She trusts she is at the Lord's table, and her desires will be fulfilled and that all her sufferings — and her daughter's, too — will lead a great banquet. In our sufferings this week, the Lord wants us to treat him less like a genie in a bottle and more like the Master who has taken us — lost little dogs that we are — into his home forever. Trust that and keep praying in the face — Father John Muir of evil. ©LPi

Care for Creation THIS WEEK'S STEWARDSHIP RECOMMENDATION: Faith, Urgency & Action

Climate stories have been dominating the news cycle lately. Record breaking heat waves, droughts, wildfires and related air quality issues are getting progressively worse. Warming average temperatures are contributing to more extreme weather events. As to the root cause of the warming temperatures, Pope Francis reminds us that the scientific consensus is that burning fossil fuels is the primary driver.

Our faith calls us to be good stewards of Creation and obligates us to act. God has given us the intelligence to address the problem before irreversible damage is done. Francis, in his World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation tells us we **"must listen to science and institute a rapid and equitable transition to end the era of fossil fuels."**

Let us act individually with a sense of urgency to do what we can to mitigate the problem. Let's also join with larger groups to amplify our power and to influence our representatives, civic and religious leaders to act.
