FATHER CARL'S CORNER

Sister JoAnn Persch and Sister Pat Murphy are members of

the Sisters of Mercy. For the past 40 years they have had a ministry of persistence. There motto is, "We do things peacefully and respectfully. But we never take no for an answer." These sisters have allowed their lives to be inconvenienced by the concerns of others, especially immigrants. For 12 years they set up a sacred space in the library at the McHenry County Jail in Woodstock for detainees.

They cooperate with ICE officials and, with immigration attorneys, seek justice together. One of their former clients now works for an airline at O'Hare airport. Sister JoAnn spoke in an interview about how at first, the correctional officers were suspicious of them. They would patrol the jail library, walking around the edges of the room keeping an eye on them. Once the officers became accustomed to their homemade cookies and the wrapped candy canes that they would bring around the holidays, they eased up on them. And sometimes, the ICE agents would pray with the sisters who are now 90 and 95. The story of Sister JoAnn and Sister Pat challenges each of us to answer the question, what inspires and motivates you in faith?

Today, we hear three inspiring stories of people with limited resources or skills who persevere in their tasks. One is from the battlefield, the second from the Church, and

the third from the courtroom. Each story signifies persistent faith even when it is inconvenient. In these times of division, with the injustice we are seeing, along with the polarization in our country, and even in the Church, how do we remain persistent in faith and hope?

One way is to stay rooted in prayer and in community. Isolation breeds despair, but shared faith restores perspective. Staying connected to God and to others who share your values helps you remember that you're not alone in your longing for justice and peace.

Another important thing to do is live hope through action!
Persistence in faith and hope are not passive; they grow when we embody them. Even small acts of kindness, compassion, service or advocacy are ways of declaring that light is stronger than darkness. Listening across divides, showing empathy to someone who disagrees with you, or welcoming a stranger are powerful acts of hope.

There is great fear and pain in many of our communities today for a variety of reasons. I encourage all to remember that faith and hope aren't about ignoring pain; they are about believing that love, truth, and justice still have power. May sharing in Eucharist help us to stay persistent in living as though that's true.

Have a blest and safe week ahead.

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

On this World Mission Sunday, we are sent forth to be messengers and builders of the hope of Christ. As members of the family of God, united in mission, we celebrate with churches on every continent. Inspired by the Holy Spirit, let us open our arms to the world and offer our prayers and generosity.

We are especially blessed this year as our beloved Pope Francis chose our theme for the Jubilee Year: Missionaries of Hope Among All Peoples. He encouraged individual Christians and the entire Church to set out in the footsteps of the Lord Jesus and become artisans of hope for our troubled world. We have seen this hope that does not disappoint in the election of Pope Leo XIV. 


THE NEXT SPIRITUAL CLASSICS: MR. Blue, A NOVEL ABOUT A MODERN SAINT FRANCIS

Come to the next Spiritual Classics gathering on Tuesday, November 4 at 7:00 PM in the Ascension Parish Center Dining Room, when we wiil discuss Myles Connolly's intriguing novel, *Mr. Blue*. Donna loppolo will lead the discussion. All Oak Park parishes are welcome.

Have you ever wondered what it would be like if Saint Francis of Assisi lived today? What would he think about today's large cities, the sight of poor and homeless people, the unimaginable riches of the wealthy, and the tech gadgets that fill our lives? Myles Connolly envisioned a modern-day Saint Francis when he wrote Mr. Blue, a novel about a young man who decides to take Christianity seriously.

In the novel, the mysterious Mr. Blue lives in a packing box on a New York City rooftop, embraces the poor as his wisest companions, and distrusts modern technology's promise. He foregoes money and power and serves the poor. The novel explores how self-giving is possible and still inspires readers today, almost a century after it was first published in 1928.


its own. The 7th Grade was there to offer guidance and promote collaboration amongst the grades in order to complete the projects.


LIVE PEACE...

If someone confides that they've been abused, turning to you for assistance:

- DO believe them. The description of violence is most likely understated.
- DO remove fault. Abuse is the responsibility of the abuser.
- DO affirm their worth and dignity. No one deserves to be hurt. No one should live in fear.
- DO encourage a safety plan. Do not minimize danger.
- DO give referral information and suggest resources available. Provide options. Empower.
- DO respect their choices and decisions. The individual must decide what is best for her/him.
- DO offer to maintain contact. Victims of abuse are often isolated.
- DO NOT suggest couples counseling. (Not appropriate for DV; Can further endanger the abused.)
- DO NOT do nothing. You have been trusted.

What you can say:

- I believe you. Everyone deserves to be safe.
- I will encourage you and support you, but you are the one who knows best when and how to act.
- If you just need someone to listen to you, I will do that.
- Everything you tell me will be treated confidentially.
- If you need practical help, I will help you find it.
- If you need time to think about choices or what you need, I will give you all the time you need. I will not become impatient, no matter how much time you need.
- I will not lose hope for you. You deserve a life without fear. Our God is a God of life and hope. God doesn't hate you or want you to live this way.

Climate and Protecting the Unborn

Yet another downside to a warming climate is the impact on pregnant women. A growing concern is that as temperatures warm, it enables malaria-carrying mosquitoes to expand their range. Pregnant women are three times more likely to develop severe malaria compared to nonpregnant women. The disease can produce severe maternal anemia, and can spread to the kidneys and the lungs, harming the mother. The disease also attacks the placenta, making it up to four times more likely a mother would miscarry. Babies born to mothers sick with malaria come out of the womb malnourished and underweight. About half of all pregnancies worldwide occur in areas where people are at risk of contracting malaria. A 2023 study estimated that 16 million of these pregnancies ended in miscarriage, and 1.4 million in stillbirth. Promoting a consistent ethic of life suggests supporting preventative care for pregnant women likely to be exposed to malaria, and taking action to reduce fossil fuel consumption that is a driver of global warming. 
