

Reflections by Fr. Tomek Puslecki

March 2, 2025

Dear Friends,

Today in the Gospel we hear the powerful words of Jesus: "Hypocrite, first take the beam out of your own eye, and then you will see clearly to remove the speck from your brother's eye." Jesus uses the image of the beam and the speck to show a negative attitude toward life, one which has two different standards. However, the question may arise: Do we have the moral right to admonish another person in the face of such words from Jesus? Isn't it better to turn a blind eye to their behavior because, after all, none of us is perfect? In the Gospel, Jesus presents His metaphor for the teacher-disciple relationship. The former calls the latter "brother." Although the word brother itself has a positive meaning, it introduces a certain disorder here. The teacher should be a master for the disciple -- a person who is not equal to the disciple, but superior to him. However, this is not superiority to show contempt. This superiority is to teach and improve abilities and virtues. In order for this to be possible, a teacher, if he wants to be a good teacher, must first remove the beam from his own eye. Therefore, he must be transformed for the better. You cannot be a role model for someone if you do not work on your own flaws and weaknesses.

The British conservative writer and journalist Paul Johnson writes in his book *Intellectuals* that Karl Marx was concerned about the fate of all the workers in the world. Meanwhile, he never paid a single penny to his maid. When she became pregnant by him, he denied that he was the father of the child, and she had to give the child to a strange family. Marx did not want to meet his son, who, when visiting his mother, had to climb the servants' stairs and meet her in the kitchen.

The admonition of the brother can only be true when the teacher himself sees the mistakes in his own life and wants to correct them. A false teacher is unable to stand the truth. He wears a mask of hypocritical perfection. He does not accept that his teaching will only be true if his life confirms his words. So, if we want to admonish others on how to live, let us live in such a way that our lives are a good guide for those who are going astray.

Today, the Gospel sets us a difficult task. This task is the ability to admonish another person. For some people, this is no problem at all, because they can point out someone's mistakes without batting an eyelid. For most of us, however, admonishing others is not an easy task. In Christian admonition, we need to be aware of our weaknesses. Without humility, we cannot truly admonish another person. My admonition must consist in the fact that before I see the imperfections of another, I first see them in myself.

When John Paul II was still an archbishop in Krakow, he disciplined priests in a special way. Once, one of the vicars committed a serious offense. Cardinal Wojtyła spoke decisively about the seriousness of his guilt and reprimanded him severely. Then he took him to the chapel and said: "Would you be so kind as to hear my confession now?"... a reminder that is aimed at the good of another person and is given with love has enormous power. And it breaks down the walls that are based on the most hardened hearts.

In a few days, on Ash Wednesday, we will have a great opportunity to once again "crush our hearts" not only before Jesus, but perhaps most of all before ourselves, to see our own imperfections.

How is your Spiritual-Self?

Lent begins on Wednesday March 5th -

I hope that you are excited! If not – then let me share why we should be. Lent for so many of us is like us keeping New Years resolutions. We start out strong, but by the third week we have pretty much given up.

Most of us know the basics: Lent is 40 days – because Jesus prayed and fasted in the desert for 40 days. Jesus was led into the desert – by the Holy Spirit - immediately following His being baptized by John the Baptist. After 40 days in the desert Jesus was tempted/tested by Satan. And after being tested, the devil fled, and Jesus was attended to by angels. – Matthew 4: 1-11

Have you ever stopped to ask 'why' Jesus was led to pray and fast for 40 days? If not, you should. Because this is what Lent is about! Why did Jesus 'need' this time of silence and solitude? And if Jesus 'needed' time such as this, don't we? If Jesus 'needed' this time of being with His Heavenly Father in this special way, how much more so we?







Lent is meant to be a time of assessing. It is a time of dampening and disciplining the demands of the physical self, and the soulish self, and paying particular attention to the spiritual part of ourselves.

So where to start? Start with basic questions: Where is God in my life? - (really!?) How much of my time does God get from me each day? How much of my attention do I set upon Him? How attentive am I to His Voice? How tender and receptive is my heart towards God? Towards what God reveals to me? What He asks of Me? Is my Spiritual-self in alignment with my Heavenly Father in such a way – that He can ask whatever He may, and I am open, willing and desirous to do His Will.

Start simply. Start your day with God. I share from my own experience; I have *never* regretted making the time to be with God. I may feel the demands of the day pressing in, I may feel too tired, but I have learned the wisdom of putting God first in my day. Period. And I have learned, that to forego this time with God, is not only unwise, but foolhardy. I cannot muster the peace, the grace, the understanding that I need for each day and its trials on my own. And it is foolishness to try to do so.

This is the purpose of Lent. Lent is a time of slowing, a time of intentionality. Where we *honestly* ask these questions, AND we trust God's great Love for us. Lent is a time of seeking God and allowing God to transform us and fashion us into daughters and sons, who reflect His character. Who respond with *His* responses and seek His purposes. This is also the challenge of Lent.

My prayer for each of us is that this Lent will be a time of assessing the true health of our Spiritual self. That this Lent we are bold enough to be intentional with our time with Our Heavenly Father. That we seek God in a new, fresh and adoring way. And may we too be transformed from our 40 days of being with God in the desert of His choosing. May we come to this season of Lent with an expectant heart. And I hope with a sense of excitement.

So ... Are you open to being transformed? Are you desiring to know God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit in a deeper way than ever before? **Then you are ready for Lent!**

Our Lady of Hope's Transition to PushPay

The staff at Our Lady of Hope are excited to share an important update about how we manage giving, communication, and parish records at Our Lady of Hope. To better serve our community, we are transitioning from GiveCentral, Flocknote, and PDS to a single, unified platform: Pushpay.

Why the Change?

Currently, we use multiple systems for online giving, communication, and parish records. This has presented challenges including ongoing maintenance, legacy applications no longer offering support, and rising costs to maintain outdated legacy systems. By transitioning to **Pushpay**, we will have a **single**, **integrated system** that enhances your experience and simplifies our church's operations. This transition is also a strategic move to set our organization ahead of the game in the church operations landscape as we continue in our new reality. The Pushpay platform is used widely across the Archdiocese of Chicago.

Our Lady of Hope Mission will take a phased approach in our transition, and status updates on the progress of the transition will be provided frequently via bulletin, announcements, our website, and email communications.

LENTEN DISCIPLINES OF **FASTING & ABSTINENCE**

Catholics in good health ages 18 to 59 are required to fast and to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Fasting consts of eating only one meal, with the possibility of two smaller snacks that do not add up to a single full meal. Catholics age 14 and older are to abstain from meat on all Fridays in Lent.

Both Geri and Connor have been a tremendous blessing to Our Lady of Hope Mission, and we are excited to have them serving in these new roles.



This year, Mary, Seat of Wisdom's Faith Formation Team has been participating in one of 20 cohorts from across the United States to explore the best ways to strengthen Catholic parents and their families in passing on the faith to their children at home. MSW is being guided through this process with the help of the National Community of Catechetical Leaders (NCCL) and the resources they have garnered through the Christian Parenting & Caregiver Initiative, funded by Lilly Endowment Inc.

These efforts are intended to inform parish communities, while intentionally accompanying and supporting parents, caregivers, and the whole family in handing on the faith. In the fall, with the help of NCCL, MSW participated in a parent survey and parent cafés with various parent groups. At the end of January, several members of the MSW Faith Formation Team (Chris Ciaston, AJ Conroy, Charlene Dziedzic, Mary Ellen Fasolo, Antonia Hays, Monica Key, Shari Lenz, and Nate Stortzum) joined Dolly Pointner at St. John of the Cross in Western Springs for an all-day workshop to review the data collected from our parish and compare it to the national data collected thus far.

At the workshop, the team used this data, along with their personal experiences, to develop a SWOT (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats) analysis for families attempting to catechize their children in the first two decades of their life. The team will continue to meet over the next two years to develop a plan to best support our families as they hand on the faith. The next meeting with the NCCL cohort will be on May 31, 2025. I soon decided if your parish asks you to do something and your wife asks you to do something, you should probably do it.

We showed up on week one, were greeted warmly by the Alpha team and served a delicious dinner. I thought, "That was great." We watched the first Alpha video. I thought, "That was great." We had a small group discussion after the video and I thought. "That was a great discussion."

I enthusiastically came back for week two and following weeks but I ended up missing several of the Alpha sessions due to business travel. The sessions and videos were so impressive I wanted to catch up on the weeks I missed so when the Alpha team mentioned you essentially go through Alpha again when you volunteer with the team, I volunteered for the next Alpha program and have been on the team ever since.

Why should we go through Alpha? We're already here. We already have faith in God and Jesus Christ and are gathered here to worship God and prepare for eternity.

Alpha is ultimately not for us. I believe you will find it enjoyable, as Alpha implies you go back to the beginning and get a fresh reboot of your Christian faith. You will also meet new people, and eat great food. However, we really sign up for those family members, friends, coworkers and neighbors that are not here, not practicing their faith, and not preparing for eternity.

We go through Alpha because at some point in the course, we think of one or more of those people in our life that we want to bring along on our faith journey, because Alpha is an easy, comfortable invite to start that journey. It's such an easy invite, in fact, that I've actually knocked on neighbors' doors to invite them. Imagine that!

So, Alpha starts March 6th at 6:30 pm and runs till around 8:30pm. Come for the first 2-3 weeks, give it a try. If you don't like it, you don't have to return. Come for dinner, bring a friend and consider it time for the two of you to catch up. Go as a couple, think of it as a date night. Sign up and Come and See what it is all about!


