BEFORE I FORGET



We celebrate the Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ this weekend. My wish is that you concentrate on one word. And, I hope that you keep that word in your hearts and in your minds. Think about this word. See how you are living this word, and where you would like to go with it. The word I want you to remember is: **presence**. Not presents, as in gifts you give to others, but **presence** as in being with someone else or having someone else be with you.

Now it wouldn't be such a bad thing if you thought about presence as a present or a gift. In fact, presence is a gift; so thinking about it that way might help you remember that it is freely given and freely received.

There is so much that we could reflect upon on the Feast of the Body and Blood of Christ, but the word 'presence' might help to center our thoughts. In the person of Jesus, God became present to us in a totally new way. Jesus promised us that he would always remain present to us even to the end of time. Jesus is truly and really present in the Eucharist and offers that presence to us. We, in turn, are asked to bring that loving presence to one another.

Divine presence and human presence are so important to all of us. The Eucharist is the most important prayer celebration in our lives because it is in the Eucharist that we meet the Lord and one another at a very deep level.

What can help us meet the Lord and one another so that the Eucharist becomes the central religious event in our lives? For purpose of reflection, let's look at the before and during of our Eucharistic celebration.

Anyone who has taken music lessons knows what a great difference there is in the quality of the lesson when you have practiced during the week. Each day you have to put aside some time to concentrate on learning the musical assignments you were given during the previous lesson. If you have really worked at it, then coming to the lesson has some excitement about it. You're anxious to bring your new skills to the teacher, and to learn something new about how to keep on improving your musical life.

But if you haven't touched that guitar, piano, flute or whatever instrument you are working on, then coming to see the teacher is not a very pleasant experience. You really don't bring anything to the lesson. In fact, you're quite uncomfortable being there because you really didn't make any effort to move forward with your music.

All of this is not unlike coming to Mass without having prayed or thought about God's goodness all week long. This is when going to Mass feels more like an obligation than a celebration. It seems out of place. It doesn't seem to fit in with your daily life because it doesn't connect with what has been going on in your day-to-day routine.

Our day-to-day awareness or non-awareness of God and one another will help or hinder our entering into the Sunday Eucharist. If, during the week, we never pray or thank God for the gifts we are always receiving from God, then our awareness of God's presence in our lives will probably not be very high as we enter the church doors. But, on the other hand, if we try to have prayer and reflection as a natural part of our lives, then when we walk through those doors, it will be like a homecoming.

PRESENCE – let it remind you of the gift of the Eucharist and the gift of one another.

Ongoing General Safety Protocols

If you are sick, stay at home. Please take care of yourself, and do your part to protect others from becoming infected.

Do what you are comfortable doing. You may always individually practice more restrictive face mask and social distance standards than are required.

Sanitization is effective. Regularly washing hands with soap and water and using hand sanitizer helps avoid both contracting and spreading infection.

WE REMEMBER JUNETEENTH



Juneteenth Emancipation Day, June 19, 1900, Texas

Juneteenth, which is celebrated on June 19, commemorates the day that Union soldiers in 1865 told the 250,000 enslaved people in Texas - the last remaining enslaved African Americans in the Confederacy - that the Civil War had ended and they were free. This was over two years after the formal issuance of the Emancipation Proclamation. The holiday has become a time to reflect on the racial injustice and trauma our country has experienced the last 400 years.

Hennepin County and the City of Minneapolis, as well as many companies like Target, Best Buy, and U.S. Bank, are making Juneteenth a paid holiday for employees. The holiday will be observed on Friday, June 18.

The Racial Justice Discussion group at CTK encourages all families to celebrate Juneteenth by making this day an opportunity to become informed of racial disparities. Watch one of the many documentaries on the history of racial injustice or read some of the in-depth articles offered this week in the local publications on this issue.

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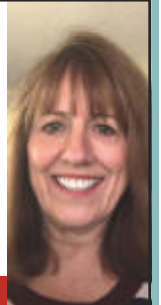
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
