

Before I Forget



A few years after the tragedy of World War II left fifty-one million people dead and countless others without countries, homes, families, or hope, the Catholic Church proclaimed the dogma of the Assumption, which declares that Mary, the Mother of God, was assumed into heaven after her time on earth was finished. This dogma recognizes the infinite value God places on the human body of his mother, and through her on all our bodies. This dogma celebrates the reality of the call of humanity to share in the life of God.

Does the timing of the proclamation of this mystery of Mary's assumption and God's desire to share eternity with humanity seem unusual after the massive disregard for humanity that the world experienced during the war? Since the time of Mary's death, the tradition among the faithful has always been that Mary's body was assumed into heaven. Why, after all this time of general belief in the fact of the assumption, did the Church now decide to state this ancient belief?

The Spirit of God blows when it will, and we ponder the ways of the Spirit to better cooperate with them. Perhaps after all the sin and pain of World War II and the years immediately preceding and following it, the universal cry of despair and disregard for the sacredness of the human body (human life) were met by God's cry of hope and restoration of the dignity of the human body (human person).

Now we are seventy-six years away from World War II. We have had other wars in many foreign countries and continue to settle most international conflicts with guns and bombs. Violence is in our cities. Injustice and the lack of compassion leave many to starve physically and emotionally. Hatred claims its victims daily. Yet we celebrate in these same times the assumption of Mary, body and soul, into heaven. This feast is not a denial of evil done by humanity but a declaration of our potential holiness/wholeness. As Christians, we live out this holiness by supporting life in all its stages and forms and by working against its destruction by any means.

God created us male and female, and made us stewards of all creation. Even all the beauty and wonder of creation are as nothing compared with the beauty and wonder of a single person. Each of us was made "a little lower than God" (Psalm 8:15). All the sin and pain of the world cannot take that reality from us. All the sin and pain of the world cannot take from us the realization that one of us was assumed into heaven. Mary was sinless but she was still fully human. Her assumption gives dignity to all humanity.

She who was the lowly one of God, who surrendered totally with the words "Here am I, the servant of the Lord" (Luke 1:38) is the one who is brought into heaven in glory. With Mary, all of us are also brought to God. Her assumption into heaven was the visible expression of the final surrender to God. What we celebrate in Mary on the Feast of the Assumption we anticipate in our own lives. Like Mary, we are created to be fulfilled, to see God face to face, to be one with God forever, and to live eternally in our 'resurrected bodies' in the presence of God.

On this Feast of the Assumption, we celebrate what has already been and what will be. We celebrate Mary's assumption; we celebrate all those who have gone before us and who are now experiencing perfect wholeness and happiness. We anticipate our own time of resurrection.

"Creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God." (Romans 8:19). The glory awaits us.



WHO IS READY FOR IN-PERSON CHOIR EXPERIENCES?

The first rehearsal of the Christ the King choir will be on Wednesday, September 15, 7-8:30 pm, followed by a rehearsal on Sunday, September 19 at 8:30 AM in preparation for the 9:30 AM Mass that day.

The ongoing choir schedule will develop according to the interest and availability of singers. During the academic program year, we will probably be rehearsing some Wednesday evenings and most Sunday mornings for one hour prior to the 9:30 AM beginning that middle week of September.

If you want to sing with the ensemble, please contact Moya (mmmathews@ctkmpls.org) at least three days prior to a rehearsal or liturgy and she will send you electronic copies of the music needed for the event.

Because of the current situation with Covid cases locally and the spread of the Delta variant, for the sake of the health of all the singers and of the public health, **all participants in the choir must be vaccinated.** Vaccination is on the honor system. We trust that no one would be untruthful about vaccination status to sing in a church choir.

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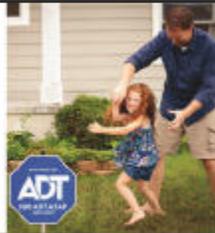
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
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
