

THE WORD

Remaining close to Jesus, staying connected with Jesus, being a friend and companion of Jesus, thinking about Jesus and loving Jesus, making Jesus known to others, loving others as Jesus has loved us, are just some of the ways that we remain with Jesus and Jesus remains with us. It becomes a way of life for us, not unknown to us personally and not unseen by others. Jesus tells us in today's gospel: Remain in me, as I remain in you . . . Just as a branch cannot bear fruit on its own unless it remains on the vine, so neither can you unless you remain in me . . . I am the vine, you are the branches.

How do we know that we remain with Jesus and Jesus with us? It's a big question with many answers from lots of people. In spite of what others say and do, the indicators from the gospel are rather simple and direct. The first indicator that we remain close to Jesus and Jesus to us is that we keep the commandments of God, the word that Jesus has spoken and remains forever. Keeping the commandments, all of them, not just some of them, is the primary sign of our connection with God and God's connection with us, revealed in Jesus Christ. We remain with God, and God remains with us. To keep his commandments and to do what pleases God is the way we remain in God and God in us. To the degree that we distance ourselves from the commandments, the

word of God, to that degree do we distance ourselves from God and Jesus.

A second indicator of our connection with Jesus is the law of charity, the love of God and the love of neighbor. How do we show our love for God and our love for neighbor? It can't be one or the other. It wasn't for Jesus and it can't be for us. How do we show or express our love for God on a daily basis, and how do we show or express our love for our neighbor on a daily basis? It is a way of life, without which we become self-centered, isolated, and disconnected from loved ones and those around us; and from Jesus.

The great indicator of Jesus remaining with us and us remaining with Jesus, in the words of Jesus himself, is Holy Communion. In John's gospel (chapter 6) Jesus tells us that he is the living bread of life: I myself am the living bread come from heaven; if anyone eats this bread he shall live forever; the bread I will give is my flesh, for the life of the world...the person who feeds on my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me, and I in him. Holy Communion is the way Jesus remains with us and we remain with him. It doesn't get any better.

Spotlight on Kindergarten

This month in Kindergarten we adopted some caterpillars. In honor of our new friends each student got to pick a caterpillar that they will observe inside the kinder classroom. The students each gave their caterpillar a name. Some of these names included Jack, Elsa, Mighty, Sunny, and Lisa. In science we are learning about the life cycle of a butterfly. At the end of the school year we will have a butterfly release into the wild celebration. Be on the lookout for butterflies in your area.

I am beyond impressed with the leaps and bounds that the students have made in Kindergarten. Each student is working diligently with the Believe and Read curriculum. Students are able to recognize beginning, middle and end sounds in words. They have been sounding out words on their own and spelling words as well. Some have been reading books on their own. It has been such a treat to watch the kindergarteners grow and learn this year.

In math we are currently working on 3-Dimensional shapes and their characteristics (vertices, edges, and faces). We have been using our math vocabulary to describe everyday objects. Kindergarten has also been working with the subtraction symbol and solving subtraction problems within ten. In their spare time they have been making math scrolls.

On top of all of the fun shenanigans we have planned in Kindergarten, we are also preparing for our ABC count-down. During this time we will have fun events planned and we will be preparing for our end of the year Kindergarten graduation.

I am so thankful for the wonderful community that has been built within our kindergarten classroom and I am excited for all of the adventures my kinder students will go on throughout their years in elementary school.
