THE WORD

The Battle of Lepanto was a famous sea battle in which Christian Europe was being attacked in 1571 by a Turkish naval fleet. The Turks had the advantage but a wind miraculously helped the Christian fleet win the battle. The Pope, St. Pius V, put the battle under the patronage of the Blessed Virgin, which is why the feast of the Holy Rosary is celebrated on October 7, the anniversary of the victory. As one commentator said that had that battle been lost, Europe may have been Muslim.

Our Lord through the intercession of Our Lady saved His Church and European civilization from near disaster. In a sense, this event echoes this Sunday's Gospel when the Apostles were in a boat crossing the sea at night. A storm came up in the evening and "waves were breaking over the boat so that it was already filling up." Our Lord sleeps through the storm, but the apostles wake Him and get upset with the Lord: "Teacher, do you not care that we are perishing?"

The Lord quiets the storm and asks "Why are you terrified? Do you not yet have faith?" Much like Lepanto, while at sea, He saves the Church (the disciples) from peril. The Lord saves the Church in its beginning, He saves the Church throughout history, and He will continue to save the Church in the future.

The problem is we are many times like the disciples in the boat—fearful and afraid the boat (which represents the Church) is going to be overcome by the waves of confusion, corruption, heresy, or her enemies. We seem to forget that the Lord has promised to be with His Church until the end of time and He promised that the gates of Hell shall not prevail against it.

If you look at history, time and again, it seems like a heresy or schism or political leader will surely topple the

Church, when all of a sudden, a saint or Pope or political leader will change the course away from destruction. And in the process, great saints are made.

A recent book, *From Christendom to Apostolic Mission*, published by the University of Mary, talks about the phenomenon of the Church in France in the 1800s. "A sympathetic observer of the state of the French church around the year 1810 or 1815 would have seen nothing but wreckage and, given simple sociological data, would have predicted vocational disaster into the future with everything that implies. What happened was something different. In 1808 there were 12,300 religious sisters in France. In 1878 there were 135,000. In 1830 there were some 3,000 priests of all kinds serving the French Church. In 1878 there were around 30,000, a ten-fold increase in sixty years, and their median age in 1878 was significantly younger than it had been sixty years earlier. Whatever might be said of the Church's fortunes at that time, it was evident that it wasn't about to disappear. All of this was a great surprise to the Church's enemies, especially to those who were developing the discipline of sociology as a kind of replacement for theology and who were happily predicting, under its methodology, the demise of the Church. According to their logic, none of this should have happened. The point is that the Church has great powers of regeneration." (page 41)

Those powers of came from our Lord—the same Lord Who calmed the waters, the same Lord Who's in charge of the Church (His Bride). We can never lose confidence in the Lord. That hope can be the basis for becoming a saint. It's happened before, and it can happen again.

ST. HELENA SCHOOL NEWS**Spotlight on Fourth Grade**

Fourth grade would like to share what we learned and did at the end of the school year with you. We had a busy year filled with lots of learning and opportunities for growth. One of our big focuses for the end of the year was on conservation and taking care of the Earth. In Language Arts, we learned about and analyzed argumentative texts as we read about different forms of energy on the planet and the importance of reducing, reusing, and recycling. In Science, we learned about the water cycle and the importance of avoiding water pollution for the health of the whole planet. Students then thought about what would motivate others to want to recycle and help the planet.

In Social Studies, we wrapped up our study of the geography and history of the different regions of the United States. Our last region to cover was the West.
