The Church of St. Helena

Thirtieth Sunday in Ordinary Time
October 24, 2021

Jesus said to him in reply, “What do you want me to do for you?” The blind man replied to him, “Master, I want to see.” Jesus told him, “Go your way; your faith has saved you.” Immediately he received his sight and followed him on the way.

—Mk 10: 51–52



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THE WORD

One of the intriguing phenomenon of the Catholic Church is that she named St. Therese of Lisieux (the Little Flower of Jesus) a Doctor of the Church. St. Therese had a formal education barely equivalent to a high school education, yet she is ranked with the great theologians and recommended by the Church to be read for a deeper understanding of the Gospel.

The reason is that our Lord promised His Father's working in those who are simple and open to Him that He would reveal the depths of His wisdom. As our Lord declared, "I thank thee, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, that thou has hidden these things from the wise and understanding and revealed them to babes; yea, Father, for such was thy gracious will." (Matthew 11:25-26)

In a sense, St. Therese's eyes of faith were given the power lenses to see the mysteries of faith because of her childlike simplicity. But, in fact, every person who is baptized has their eyes opened, because that sacrament gives us the gift of faith which enables us to know and accept the truths which we cannot see with our eyes. And, childlike simplicity enables God to further open our eyes of faith to penetrate the riches of that gift

In this Sunday's Gospel, we hear about Bartimaeus, a blind man, who cries out to the Lord so that he be

given sight. We were all spiritually blind until we were baptized and given the gift of faith. That faith enables us to understand (see) realities that are otherwise unknown or incomprehensible to our minds.

St. Augustine of Hippo had a phrase, "*credo ut intelligam*" which means that I believe in order that I may understand. For instance, without faith I would have no understanding that there are three Persons in one God or that the Holy Eucharist is really the Body and Blood of Jesus. Because of Baptism and faith, I, like Bartimaeus, can have knowledge and understand (see) the inner life of God and the reality of the Holy Eucharist.

So, what's the lesson of this Sunday's Gospel? If we are lacking faith, cry out to the Lord for a strengthening of that gift (and cry out to the Lord on behalf of others who are blind to the Faith). If we are strong in the Faith, be grateful to the Lord, because faith is a gift. And, like St. Therese of Lisieux, be simple and childlike, so our Lord can deepen our appreciation of the truths He has revealed to us.

ST. HELENA SCHOOL NEWS

Middle school language arts is off to a swift start this year as we begin year number two with our new curriculum. Students are enjoying learning about rites of passage, triumphs of childhood, and looking at what we can learn from different generations. Additionally, the middle schoolers learned about Hispanic Heritage Month and spent some time researching the history of the celebration. After initial research, students got to select a figure important to Hispanic-American culture to research and create a poster. The students were able to refresh their informational text skills while also learning about people who have shaped both Hispanic and American culture.

Now, after completion of that project, students are beginning or wrapping up their first essays of the year. 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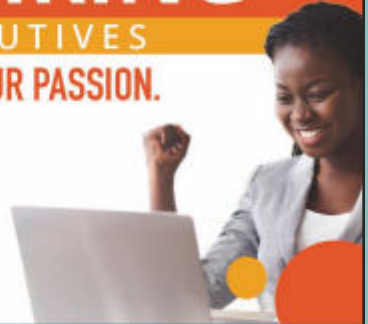
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
