

THE WORD

Two of the most prominent Catholic evangelists in recent times have been St. (Mother) Teresa of Calcutta and Mother Angelica of the Eternal Word Television Network. St. Teresa through her works of charity to the poorest of the poor attracted the attention of thousands of people throughout out the world. Yes, she spoke about the Lord, but it was her authentic love of the poor that warmed the hearts of many, which in turn enabled them to listen to her words about Jesus and His Church.

Mother Angelica, on the other hand, was a contemplative nun who spoke to the world in her peppery, straightforward, and joyous manner on her weekly TV programs. She deliberately wanted to reach millions through her television network with her messages of hope, and she did just that by building an empire of the world's largest religious media network – without a dime to her name.

This Sunday, we celebrate the feast of the Epiphany of our Lord commemorating the Magi coming to Bethlehem and our Lord manifesting Himself to the nations for the first time symbolically through the Magi. The Christ Child was not meant to be the salvation of just the Jewish people but of the entire world. From early on in His life, then, He pointed to that truth.

So, what's that mean for us? Jesus, Who is both God and man, is our salvation, and we are to bring that truth to the nations, that is, to everyone. That's our job! Our Lord has man-

FR. DALY BREAD—Wise men still seek Him?

On the feast of the Epiphany, the Church sings, *O wise* men from afar, *O kings, where are you going in such* haste? These simple words evoke one of the deepest truths about man—that of his incessant search for God. All our restless New Year's resolutions for health, wealth, and happiness seem to be motivated by a search to find wholeness and perfection. Without God, this is impossible for our weak human nature...but, with God, seek and you shall find.

Whatever the age, culture, civilization, or nation, **wise men** *still* **seek God**. We are created out of Love, for Love, and this ache of love drives us on! We seek God because we bear his image within ourselves, so "our hearts are restless until they rest in God," says St. Augustine. It is *God alone* who makes us whole and completes our body and soul.

And when we find *the one my heart loves*, a liturgical hymn of the Eastern Church explores, "What can we offer you, O Christ, for having been born for us on earth as a Man? Each creature, the work of your hands, offers you a sign of gratitude: the angels, their hymn; the heavens, the star; the Magi, their gifts; the shepherds, their admiration; and the earth, the cave. What can we offer you, O Christ?"

An infant needs everything: our voices must be modulated,

dated that to us, and we cannot escape that fact. In reality, we will only be fulfilled as human beings if we are loving both our Lord and others and the finest way to love anyone is to help them realize that their salvation is found in the Lord and His Church.


The ways and means of accomplishing this task are many and varied. We need to figure out how the Lord is calling us to that task, which will be in both our words and deeds. St. Teresa of Calcutta did this primarily through her deeds, but she also spoke about our Lord, and Mother Angelica accomplished her works of evangelization through her words, but she also did great works.

Think about it. Pray about it. Are there people in your life that you can bring closer to the Lord and His Church? Your spouse? Your children or grandchildren? Friends, neighbors, coworkers? Write down their names.

In 2022, how will you manifest the Lord to those specific people in your words and deeds? What concrete ways will I do that? Prayer? Messages? Specific deeds of kindness, service, mercy? Write it down.

Then, pray for them daily—we need to do that. In fact, the Lord is the One, Who will move their hearts. And, our Lord always answers our prayers—maybe in a different way than we think He should—but He answers our prayers nonetheless. These Magi in our lives are searching for the Lord.

ST. HELENA SCHOOL NEWS

Merry Christmas from Middle School Religion!

As we approached Christmas, middle school classes worked on daily Advent activities and learning traditional Catholic prayers. In addition, the following are highlights of current study topics for the middle school.

The fifth graders learned about angels. They can define them, note the types of angels, and their order. Studies included demons, their origins, and mission. They have discussed what it means to be created in God's image, the fall from grace of Adam and Eve, and original sin.

Sixth grade centered on prayer and saints. They studied the types and purpose of prayer while focusing on the Rosary. They can define a saint and the process of becoming one. They have learned how saints can intercede for us and studied the conversion process for many of our great saints. They can identify patron saints and their causes.

The seven graders are studying God's plan of salvation. They have learned about covenants and God's covenant with Abraham, the sacrifice of Isaac, and how it prefigured the sacrifice of Jesus on the Cross. In addition they looked at how the prophets have played a major role in God's revelation. They studied the story of Moses and how he delivered God's people from slavery and how he received the Ten Commandments.

Lastly, our eighth graders are preparing for the Sacrament of Confirmation. Topics that they have covered so far are salvation history, divine revelation, the Church Jesus founded, the power and purpose of the Sacraments, and the gifts and fruits of the Holy Spirit. Remember the eighth graders in your prayers. We are looking forward to new topics when school resumes.
