The original feast of the Eucharist is Holy Thursday and since it is tainted with the sorrow of Good Friday the Church instituted in the 1200's this feast of Corpus Christi, The Body and Blood of Christ. It was St. Juliana from Belgium who had a great devotion to the Blessed Sacrament and was inspired to promote the feast which we now celebrate. Some of the devotions to the Blessed Sacrament such as processions, Benediction, 40 Hours Devotion fell out of favor since the 1960's. Pope Benedict XVI reminds us that this was a mistake and he encourages us to foster devotion to the Eucharist. Benedict XVI mentioned one of the more moving moments of the Synod on the Eucharist in 2005 in Rome was when all the bishops and a great number of the faithful gathered for Eucharistic adoration. St. Augustine used to say that no one eats the flesh of Christ without first adoring it and that we would sin if we did not first adore it.

To receive the Eucharist means adoring Him whom we receive. Only in this way do we become one with Him and we are given a foretaste of the beauty of heaven. Adoration outside of Mass prolongs and intensifies all that takes place during the Mass itself and it makes possible a personal encounter with the Lord. "I heartily recommend to the Church's pastors and to the People of God the practice of Eucharistic adoration, both individually and in community. Great benefit would ensue from a suitable catechesis explaining the importance of this act of worship, which enables the faithful to experience the liturgical celebration more fully and more fruitfully," said Benedict XVI.

So please join us this Sunday after the 10:30 AM Mass when we will make a beautiful procession with the Blessed Sacrament in the monstrance around the streets. After the procession we finish in the church with Benediction of the Lord upon all of us and our parish. We invite you all to come and worship the Lord in this way.

THE MOST SACRED HEART OF JESUS, JUNE 24

Devotion to the heart pierced on Calvary is nearly as old as Christianity, but it has undergone many changes over the centuries. Patristic writers saw in the blood and water issuing from the crucified Lord's side the fulfillment of his promise to give living water, the fountain from which the Spirit flows upon the Church. Medieval piety placed less emphasis on Jesus' heart as the source of grace and moved toward more personal and sentimental devotion.

The public worship of the Sacred Heart celebrated today began in the seventeenth century, when Saint John Eudes pressed for a liturgy of the Sacred Heart. Toward the end of that century, Saint Mary Margaret Alacoque received visions of the Lord exposing his heart and urging public devotion. Her apparitions gave impetus to the devotion and shape to its purpose: to promote greater use of the sacrament of penance to offset indifference to the Blessed Sacrament.

Pope Pius VI saw the devotion as a means of refuting Jansenism, which rejected the doctrine that Christ died for all people. Clement XIII first granted the petition for a liturgical observance to the Polish bishops and the Roman Archconfraternity of the Sacred Heart in 1765. Pius IX extended the observance to the universal Church in 1856 and, late in the nineteenth century, Pope Leo XIII raised its rank to a feast.

A Jewish midrash or story on the Exodus account of Moses' encounter with God compares the burning bush to the human heart: the only created thing which can burn without being consumed. Yet nothing seems to be harder for human beings to believe in than unconditional love—love that is neither deserved nor earned. The Sacred Heart of Jesus, aflame with an unquenchable fire, stands today against lingering traces of Jansenism (saving ourselves by our own efforts) as a powerful symbol of Christ's unquenchable love for the whole human race.

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
