A message from

Fr. Mark Murphy



Dear Parishioners,

Today we celebrate the conclusion of the Christmas Season with the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord. In our second reading today from the Letter of Saint Paul to Titus, we hear God "saved us through the bath of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit." In today's Gospel, there's also a reference to the Holy Spirit's role in baptism: "Jesus also had been baptized and was praying, heaven was opened and the Holy Spirit descended upon him in bodily form like a dove."

These references to the Holy Spirit remind me of the great prayer often used to bless water in the celebration of the Sacrament of Baptism. This prayer concludes with a reference to the Holy Spirit:

May the power of the Holy Spirit, O Lord, we pray, come down through your Son into the fullness of this font, so that all who have been buried with Christ by Baptism into death may rise again to life with him. Who lives and reigns for ever and ever. ~ Order of Baptism of Children, #91

Prior to this part of the prayer for the blessing of the water, the prayer itself references how God used water throughout salvation history; namely:

- God used water in the flood during the time of Noah to cleanse us of sin.
- God used water to rescue the children of Abraham from slavery in Egypt via the Red Sea.
- Blood and water poured from the pierced side of Jesus on the cross, symbolizing the great sacraments of Baptism and Eucharist.
- And finally, after His resurrection, Jesus himself commanded his disciples to teach all nations and baptize them.

God has used and continues to use water for salvation, especially through baptism when water and th Holy Spirit are at work together.

Our second reading today reminds us that our baptism is our bath of rebirth. I readily know the date of my birthday, and of my ordinations as a deacon and then later as a priest. But I don't as readily know my baptism date. How many of us know the date we were reborn by the Holy Spirit at our baptism? And if we know, or if we call the church of our baptism to find that date, what do we do to celebrate the feast of our own baptism? It is the feast day when we first became brothers and sisters of Jesus and inheritors of eternal life.

HOW TO WORSHIP AT HOLY MASS

A series of short articles about the Mass, written by Archbishop Jackels, will be republished weekly in our bulletin. We invite you to read and to reflect on the following article as one way to grow in the faith.

Week 21: Liturgy of the Word - Homily

After the gospel comes the homily, which is intended to make biblical teaching understood and relevant to life outside of church, on weekdays, at home, school, or work ... wherever we live our lives.

For this to happen, we have to make a conscious effort to listen to the readings and the homily, and try to take away at least one thought to ponder and put into practice.

These are part of the "daily bread" that Jesus gives to his followers. That is why the Church speaks of this first part of the Mass as the "Table of God's Word."

The preacher, for his part, makes an effort to listen for the principle message of the readings, as well as the questions and concerns of the hearers, trying to connect the two in the homily.

There is no standard length for a homily. But the preacher should take care that the homily is not too long, lest it negatively affect the balance and rhythm of the Mass, or test the ear and the rear of the hearer.

60 Second Catechism

Catechism of the Catholic Church (CCC) #496-510

Was Mary really a virgin her whole life?

Yes, the Catholic Church has consistently taught for the last 2,000 years that Mary was a virgin her whole life, even when this led to mockery and opposition from unbelievers. But isn't there a Gospel story that Jesus had brothers and sisters?

Mark 6:3 says, "Is [Jesus] not the carpenter, the son of Mary, and the brother of James and Joses and Judas and Simon? And are not his sisters here with us?"

We need to realize a few things here about these "brothers and sisters." First, there was no word for cousin, or for nephew or niece, or for aunt or uncle in ancient Hebrew or Aramaic – the words used in all those instances were "brother" or "sister." An example of this can be seen in Genesis 14:14, where Lot, who was Abraham's nephew, is sometimes called his brother.

Another point to consider is from the Gospel of John 19:26-27: If Jesus had had any brothers, if Mary had had any other sons, it's hard to believe the last thing Jesus did from the cross was entrust the care of his mother to the beloved disciple, John, instead of one of his possible brothers.

Also, we see from Matthew 27:55-56 that the James and Joses mentioned in Mark 6:3 as the "brothers" of Jesus are actually the sons of another Mary.

As we conclude the Christmas season, we acknowledge Mary as "ever-virgin." Therefore, she is able to be the spiritual mother of us all and help us with a mother's love when we seek her intercession.

Mother Mary, ever virgin, pray for us!



Chrism oil is used for anointing at Baptism & Confirmation. Chrism, is made by mixing the oil "with fragrances or other aromatic material" (OBO, no. 4), usually balsam. The Chrism may be prepared privately "or by the bishop during the liturgical action" (OBO, no. 5).
