

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

Dear friends,

What will God provide for us in 2022? We are about to enter into a third year of the COVID pandemic. Who would have thought that it would last this long? But it is what it is. I think we are all experiencing COVID fatigue. We are tired of it. We want it to be over and done with. We are tired of wearing masks. We are tired of all the inconveniences. But wishing it to go away will not make it go away. We must actively do our part to combat this pandemic.

On this past Monday, Pope Francis said to international diplomats: "It is important to continue the effort to immunize the general population as much as possible. This calls for a manifold commitment on the personal, political and international levels. First, on the personal level. Each of us has a responsibility to care for ourselves and our health, and this translates into respect for the health of those around us. **Health care is a moral obligation.** Sadly, we are finding increasingly that we live in a world of strong ideological divides. Frequently people let themselves be influenced by the ideology of the moment, often bolstered by baseless information or poorly documented facts. Every ideological statement severs the bond of human reason with the objective reality of things. The pandemic, on the other hand, urges us to adopt a sort of "reality therapy" that makes us confront the problem head on and adopt suitable remedies to resolve it. Vaccines are not a magical means of healing, yet surely they represent, in addition to other treatments that need to be developed, the most reasonable solution for the prevention of the disease."

Wear your mask in public places where you are among strangers, *especially here in church*. Get vaccinated. Archbishop Vincenzo Paglia, president of the Pontifical Academy for Life, says that authorized COVID vaccines present no ethical dilemma. And Archbishop Jackels has reflected that as Jesus was pierced with nails and a lance to save humanity, we should at least be willing to be pierced with a needle for the sake of humanity's bodily health.

The pandemic is real. There is no denying its seriousness. Worldwide, 5¹/₂ million people have died from it. In the United States, the death toll is over 800,00, and in Iowa it is over 8,000. COVID has reduced life expectancy in America by almost two years.

Make it a New Year's resolution to live responsibly and unselfishly. Be concerned with the common good.


