

Pastor's Pen Fr. David O'Connor **35 Years. Where Has the Time Gone?**—It seems like a blink of an eye and thirtyfive years have passed since I was ordained a priest on July 19, 1986. For me, anniversaries that end in "5" and "0," like for example, 30 or 35, give me pause for greater reflection upon the priesthood. I was just 26 years old when ordained, and I couldn't imagine how my priesthood would unfold over the years. The saying is true, "I wish I would have known then what I know now." I don't offer that disparagingly, but I imagine it would have been helpful to begin my

priesthood with all that I have experienced and learned over the past thirty-five years. But, if that had occurred, I think I would have known more, but my heart would not have been formed into the priest I am today. The formation of the heart occurs through learning, prayer and the lived experiences one has as a priest. It takes the grace of God to form a priest and continue his formation after ordination. This is a much richer gift than simply knowing more and applying it to your ministry.

I am at a point in my life that I have begun to think of retirement, which for priests is 70 years of age. I think about it and then the thoughts yield to what is more pressing and important at the moment. There's more to do and be as a priest than retiring. I do live life at a different pace than I did even ten years ago, but that comes with age and is to be expected. The work and ministry of a priest, however, doesn't slow down and the challenges, unique to the time and space in which one lives, never end. By the will and grace of God, I desire to keep on going in service as a priest until I am not able to anymore. Thanks for the opportunity to serve you here at St. Joseph. Please pray for me as I do for you. And, indeed, please continue asking God to raise up more vocations to the priesthood, especially here at St. Joseph.

<u>Your Good Stewardship at Work</u>—Next week, if all goes well, the parking lot will be resurfaced and restriped. These are the things that will have been done once the parking lot project has been completed: The cracks sealed in the lot, concrete poured around the drains, and the entire lot resurfaced and restriped. We deferred this project from 2020 because of the pandemic and not knowing what the financial status of the parish would be. But, because of your good stewardship through the generosity of your financial resources and prayers, and because of the teamwork done with the Finance Council, the Business Manager and myself, the project is moving forward to completion. The cost is estimated to be around \$ 30,000. Thank you for the part you have played in this project!
